I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Regular Meeting of the Alamosa City Council was called to order by Mayor Josef Lucero at 7:00 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

II. ROLL CALL

Present all roll call: Mayor Josef Lucero, Councilors Charles Griego, Kristina Daniel, Michael Stefano, Ty Coleman, Liz Hensley, and Jan Vigil. A quorum was declared. Also present: City Manager Heather Brooks, City Attorney Erich Schwiesow, and City Clerk Holly Martinez.

III. AGENDA APPROVAL

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to approve the agenda as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

IV. CITIZEN COMMENT

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Hensley to approve Consent Calendar A as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

VII. REGULAR BUSINESS

A. Presentations from Outside Agencies

1. 2017 Round-Up

Dawn and Jerry Honeycutt presented information to Council on the Alamosa Round-Up rodeo, providing statistics regarding the impact the rodeo has on Alamosa. They also provided the schedule of the Round-Up activities this year.

The Honeycutt's provided the budget for the Round-Up and informed Council that since they did make some money last year, they have lowered their request of the amount of money they are requesting for sponsorship. They requested funding in the amount of \$4,000 from the City of Alamosa for this year's round-up.

Council further discussed this item.

Councilor Coleman moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to fund the Alamosa Round-Up rodeo a sponsorship of \$4,000. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Business Brought Forward by City Staff

1. City Manager/Legal

a. First Reading, Ordinance No. 8-2017, an ordinance amending sec. 2-17 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa to confirm the ability of Council to cancel meetings at which there will not be a quorum present and increasing the notice required for special meetings.

Counselor Schwiesow presented information regarding this ordinance to Council. Section 2-17 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa_*directs the Council to meet on the first and third Wednesdays of every month, will allowance for changing the time and place of the meeting by resolution. There are times when Council knows that for varying reasons sufficient Councilors to defeat a quorum will be excused from or otherwise unable to attend a regularly scheduled meeting, such as when the meeting date falls during the annual Colorado Municipal League conference, as has regularly occurred.

Council has in the past addressed such scheduling conflicts by rescheduling the meeting to be held concurrently with the next regular meeting, but such a practice is less than straightforward. Additionally, the ordinance currently provides for calling a special meeting upon one-hour's written notice, which is not a practice that comports with reasonable management of schedules, the Colorado Open Meetings Act, nor with Council's practice, and Council desires to make the process for calling special meetings provide for more adequate notice of such meetings. This Ordinance brings Section 2-17 into compliance with Council practice and the Open Meetings Act.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to approve Ordinance No. 8-2017 on first reading and set for a public hearing on Wednesday, April 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

b. First Reading, Ordinance No. 9-2017, An ordinance extending the existing temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the city of Alamosa other than in mobile home parks through September 30, 2017

Counselor Schwiesow presented information on this ordinance to Council. On December 21, 2016 through enactment of Ordinance 21-2016, the City Council of the City of Alamosa established a temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the City through May 30, 2017, noting that the City was in the process of reviewing and revising its zoning code, part of which process is considering the appropriateness of manufactured housing with the City. The process of reviewing the zoning code is ongoing, and it does not appear that the committee working on the code will have a recommendation for Council to consider and enact in advance of the expiration of the existing moratorium.

An extension of the moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks will allow City staff, the Planning Commission, and City Council an opportunity to consider and develop regulations concerning the placement of such homes. Extending the moratorium through September 30, 2017, is a reasonable length of time to allow for the consideration, and if appropriate, development of such regulations.

Councilor Stefano moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to approve Ordinance No. 9-2017 on first reading and set for a public hearing on Wednesday, April 19, 2017 or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

c. First Reading, Ordinance No. 10-2017, An ordinance amending Sec. 20-83 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* to recognize the ability of non-city haulers to haul commercial solid waste.

Heather Brooks presented information to Council. Section 20-83 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* prohibits anyone who is not an agent or employee of the City of Alamosa from collecting and disposing of solid waste within the City of Alamosa. However, the City has not enforced this ordinance with respect to commercial properties or residences of eight or more units, because C.R.S. §30-15-401 prohibits municipalities from compelling industrial or commercial establishments, or multi-family residences of eight or more units, to use or pay user charges for waste services provided by the municipality rather than by a private person. The conflict recently caused confusion when notices of the new trash rates were sent out. The Ordinance should be aligned with State law and with the current practice of the City.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to approve Ordinance No. 10-2017 on first reading and set for public hearing on Wednesday, April 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

d. Second reading and public hearing, Ordinance No. 7-2017, An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 4-2017 to include additional capital improvement projects related to water and sewer infrastructure and the Alamosa levee.

Heather Brooks reviewed this ordinance with Council, which was explained in further detail at the first reading of the ordinance on March 15, 2017.

Mayor Lucero opened the public hearing at 7:56 p.m. and asked for those wishing to speak on this ordinance.

There being no one wishing to speak, the hearing closed at 7:56 p.m.

Councilor Daniel thanked staff for the time and energy staff put into the changes that were discussed at the previous meeting.

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to finally adopt Ordinance No. 7-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

e. Resolution No. 10- 2017, A resolution identifying the portion of the Alamosa ranch as the Leased Property to be leased to and subleased from the Alamosa Capital Leasing Corporation by the City under a Site Lease and Lease Purchase Agreement

Counselor Schwiesow spoke in regards to this resolution. This resolution identifies the portion of the Alamosa Ranch as the Leased Property to be leased to and subleased from the Alamosa Capital Leasing Corporation by the City under a Site Lease and Lease Purchase Agreement.

The plat version of the parcel that is part of this resolution was displayed. Public Works still needs to develop the legal description that will follow the plat but if the resolution is approved, the plat displayed will be the exhibit attached to the resolution and the legal description developed from that will be used in all of the documentation for the lease purchase agreement.

Councilor Vigil moved, second by Councilor Stefano to pass Resolution No. 10-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

C. Committee Reports

Councilor Vigil spoke in regards to the Alamosa School Board meeting that he attended.

Councilor Daniel spoke in regard to the Tree Board meeting that occurred today, which she was unable to attend but informed the Council that they will be at the next meeting.

Councilor Vigil also mentioned that the Library Board's 115th Birthday Celebration was held this past Sunday.

D. Staff Announcements

Heather Brooks informed Council of the following:

- Dog Park public forum is next week at the Rec Center.
- Financing for the augmentation and closing is the 18th.

• ACLC will meet next week to consider documents.

Holly Martinez asked for guidance from Council on what they would like to do with the receiving of two new board applications. Ms. Martinez received two applications for different board. One is for the Planning Commission and one is for the Library Board, that were both received before the board recruitment process went out. Council can either interview prior to the deadline of the recruitment process or if they would like to hold the applications and hold interviews all at the same time. Council directed Ms. Martinez to hold the applications until the deadline time and conduct interviews all at one time.

VIII. LOCAL LIQUOR LICENSING AUTHORITY ACTIONS

A. Decision, New Application, Hotel/Restaurant License, Thai Hut LLC d/b/a Thai Hut

Counselor Schwiesow informed Council that as is their practice, he has prepared the draft findings with regards to the Thai Hut, one providing the granting of the license, and one providing for the denial of the license. He also reminded Council that at the public hearing, no one spoke either for or against the issuance of this license other than the applicant himself who provided a petition with a total of 151 signatures.

Councilor Stefano moved, seconded by Councilor Hensley to approve the license for the Thai Hut. The motion carried unanimously.

B. Needs and Desires Hearing on the application of Wize Apples/Linda Cade, d/b/a Wize Apples, for a Hotel/Restaurant License at 408 4th Street

The applicant of this license is Linda Cade, representing Wize Apples/Linda Cade d/b/a Wize Apples.

Mrs.Cade presented the following information regarding the application.

- Mrs. Cade is the owner of Wize Apples, which has been open since 2008.
- She has held a liquor license since 2008 between the City of Alamosa and the County of Alamosa.
- She has never had an infraction on her license and has always practiced due diligence while having a license.
- Wize Apples is family restaurant open until 9:00 p.m. and the license would provide availability of enhancing people's meals.

Counselor Schwiesow gave an overview of the hearing procedure, and the licensee's obligation to affirmatively prove the needs of the neighborhood and the desires of the adult inhabitants of the neighborhood. The City's presumptive neighborhood is the city limits plus a one-mile radius. No request has been made to consider different boundaries, so this neighborhood will apply to this hearing.

Mrs. Cade presented the poster giving notice of the application and hearing that was posted at the establishment, which is identified as Exhibit A. The hearing

notice was posted on February 23, 2017. The legal notice was published in the Valley Courier on March 28, 2017.

Mrs. Cade also presented signed petitions in support of the hotel/restaurant license at this establishment, identified as Exhibit B. Mrs. Cade stated that the petitions were posted at the restaurant so that way returning customers and new customers would have the opportunity to sign the petition. There were approximately 300 signatures were obtained, all of which were in support of this license at this address. There were 7 petition pages of signature pages.

Mayor Lucero opened up the public hearing for those wishing to speak on this application at 8:16 p.m.

Jerry Honeycutt spoke in support of this license.

There being no one else wishing to speak, the hearing closed at 8:17 p.m.

Counselor Schwiesow informed council of the process of him preparing proposed findings of the license and also let them know that they would be able not only vote for or against the license, but could also change anything within those findings. He also made Council aware that they could also make a decision and direct him to prepare findings consistent with that decision. Typically the reason that proposed findings are prepared are due to Council not being ready to make a decision while they are sitting there right after they are conducting the hearing.

Councilor Coleman asked what the petition requirements were for liquor licenses. Counselor Schwiesow stated that the petition should recognize what the desires of the neighborhood are and residents of the neighborhood are typically the people who would address their desires to Council. The City does not confirm the address of people who sign these petitions as they are not the same as a petition for an election.

Councilor Daniel asked the applicant to provide information on how not having a liquor license has affected the business at Wize Apples since they're been open in the City. Mrs. Cade informed Council that she is asked on a daily basis when she is going to get her license and has had some customers leave due to not having a license.

Councilor Griego asked Mrs. Cade to provide information on the days that Wize Apples is open. Mrs. Cade confirmed that Wize Apples is Monday through Saturday; opening at 11:00 a.m. and closing at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday; and closing at 9:00 p.m. on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Councilor Hensley asked Mrs. Cade if there are any concerns with the patio part of the license. Mrs. Cade stated that if there is something that would be done on the patio, it would only be on certain days or special things because she is also concerned with this due to the stairwell and would like to have someone up there at all times if they were to use it. Councilor Stefano moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to approve the license for Wize Apples since Mrs. Cade has held a liquor license before and has not had any infractions. Counselor Schwiesow will still prepare written findings and the applicant will know what the decision will be. The motion carried unanimously.

C. Approval of Colorado Liquor Sales Room for Square Peg Brewerks LLC

Counselor Schwiesow provided information for Council. This application is one Council is dealing with in their Liquor Licensing Authority but unlike a typical licensing process that they've been through before. This license is very limited in scope for a Liquor Sales Room and is handled the by the State Liquor Licensing Authority.

Council's role is limited to consideration of whether there might be particular impacts in the City because of this license. Those impacts that need to be considered are an impact on traffic, noise or other neighborhood concerns that would be inconsistent with local regulations or ordinances; or that the permit would result in violation of the Colorado liquor code or laws of the local government and those must be specified; or if this license would violate local zoning laws.

Public Works has reviewed this application with respect to those conditions and does not believe any of them are applicable.

The applicants of this license were present and provided Council with more information regarding this license.

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Hensley to approve the application for the Liquor Sales Room for Square Peg Brewerks. Counselor Schwiesow asked for an amendment to the motion to include the direction of the Mayor signing the approval form. Councilor Griego amended his motion to include this and Councilor Hensley seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

Councilor Coleman thanked the applicants of the Early Iron for bringing this event to Alamosa and enhancing quality of life.

Councilor Daniel stated that she will not be at the meeting on the 19th as she will be at a meeting and asked to be excused.

Councilor Greigo spoke in regards to the upcoming County Commissioners Meeting. Council further discussed this issue. Councilor Griego also spoke in regards to the decision on which bank was awarded the bid for the proposal. Heather Brooks provided background information to Council on the reasoning for why this was chosen and done this way.

Council Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to enter into Executive Session (9:05 p.m.) pursuant to C.R.S. §24-6-402(4)(f) for Personnel Matters to discuss the Evaluation of the City Clerk. The motion carried unanimously.

Recommendation

Background

General Fund Revenue

Total revenue for the General Fund for the month was \$804,525.32. The City received payment for the 1.2% Sales Tax from the County in the amount of \$288,986.91. Sales Tax (general) revenue for the month total was \$195,050.20. Total revenue year to date total is \$2,092,705.80.

General Fund Expenditures

Total expenditures for the General Fund for the month were \$899,952.37. Total expenditures year to date are \$1,831,668.98.

Enterprise Fund Revenue

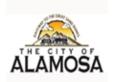
Revenue for the Enterprise Fund for the month was \$289,363.83. Year to date revenue is \$770,339.57.

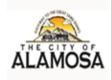

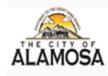

City of Alamosa Monthly Activities Report March 2017 Public Works Department

Streets: Conducted winter clean up sweeping operations with two sweepers. Repaired and replaced signs as needed. Patched a toter of 877 potholes with cold mix, bagged perma-patch and began use of spray injection patching. Addressed calls and complaints as needed. Bladed all alleys. Assisted recycling with yard waste haul. Replaced planters at May-Wa restaurant that were removed for Ice Fest. Cleaned Hickory Jackson Ditch. Conducted traffic study on Weber Drive. Cleaned and opened up culverts on 20th St. Conducted interviews for street supervisor position.

Solid Waste: Commercial waste hauled totaled 314 T.; residential waste hauled totaled 179 T. Twenty one special pick-ups were completed. Two toters were delivered. Five toters were repaired and seven dumpsters.

Recycling: A total of sixty nine bales of various materials were made. Seventy two bales (38.41 T.) were shipped. A total of 6.4 T. of glass were made. Land fill savings totaled \$656.81. Revenues totaled \$917.39. Five yard waste containers were delivered.

Building Inspection: Twenty building permits were issued for a total valuation of \$1,126,327.72. Building permit fees totaled \$7,060.00 and construction use tax totaled \$3,806.40. Plan review fees were \$370.88. A total of 25 various inspections were conducted. Four general contractor licenses were issued and one limited license. Four certificates of occupancy were issued for single family dwellings.

Water: A total of 34,713,000 gallons of water were pumped for municipal use. Water treatment plant production was 32,497,416 gallons. Turn off /ons for occupant change and repairs totaled 34. Twelve meters were re-read. Fifteen curb stops were cleaned out. Ten bad order meters were repaired at the shop. There were four call outs after hours on water related issues. Two fire hydrants were repaired and two broken meter pits were repaired. Eight new water services were installed. Continued flushing dead end water mains. Maguire Iron completed work on the Craft Water Tower and it is back on line. Delivered 2" meters to Sunset Motel and the Kiva Apartments. Cleaned all well houses and changed oil in the pump motors. Emergency locates were done on West 8th St. for gas leak. Repaired damaged fire hydrant at 323 Edison Ave. that was hit by vehicle.

Wastewater: Total discharge for the month was 37.57 million gallons. All routine testing was completed. Received passing results on First Quarter wet test. Sprayed down clarifier #1. Put parts together for biolac system. Completed paperwork for DMR QA study. Received Ph sample from ERA. Attended weekly safety meetings and Google webinar. Assisted the Water Dept. with delivery of back flow prevention notices. Zinc sampling was done at various locations. Cleaned the UV sleeves. Backflow prevention devices were tested.

East Alamosa: A total of 2,401,189 gallons of water were treated and supplied to East Alamosa. Ten sanitary sewers were checked for plugs; three unplugged. Pulled pumps at Price, McKinney, McQuerry and Rodeo lift stations and cleaned impellers of debris. Cleaned Sunnyside, Blanca and Rodeo lift stations. Installed new guide bracket on Pump #2 at McKinney lift station. Checked for leak at 498 Haniver for high consumption-no leak detected.

Sewer: Nineteen sewers were checked at customers' requests, twelve were unplugged. Seventy five sanitary sewers were inspected; fifteen blocks of sewer line were cleaned. Eight sewers were cleaned and flushed and ten manholes were cleaned out. Completed flushing dead end sewer lines. Two manholes were raised. Eight new sewer services were installed. Checked all lift

stations daily. Hauled off grit and cleaned the splitter box at the WWTP. Cleaned Maroon, Riverwood, McDonald's, Monroe and Tremont lift stations. There were four call outs after hours for sewer related problems. Assisted with the cleaning of the clarifiers and UV bulbs at the WWTP.

Below is a statement regarding major issues covered by the City IT Department:

March 2017 Report

- GeoVision Camera Server:
 - o Troubleshoot server not consistently recording
 - o Troubleshoot server performance
 - o Ordered New Server
- Google Migration:
 - o Attended all the Google training sessions provided by our transition team.
 - o IT finished the process of moving the entire City over to a Google platform. The email portion of our transition is over, and all users are now on Google.
 - o IT will be moving user data files to the cloud over the next several months.
- Installed and programmed the pilot Allegion NDE lock at the PD Training Center, this type of lock will be utilized to replace our existing outdoor locks in the future.
- Ordered, received and programmed an additional lock for the rear door of the PD Training Center.
- Assisted Public Works and the HVAC vendor in installing troubleshooting software on the HVAC system.
- Purchased a new computer system for the GIS position and installed the workstation. Additionally we provided the new hire a temporary laptop with the necessary software to train on the the software.
- Created a wireless training aid for the Streets Department. The department can now utilize their newly replaced tablet to stream training videos directly to

a screen. Previously their training videos were mailed on a VHS tape and then need to be returned.

- We experienced a major network outage at City Hall when one of our primary switches failed. This switch shutdown internet and phone services for most of City Hall. IT rewired most users within the first 2 hours of the reported outage and was able to restore services until a replacement switch was shipped by the manufacturer as a warranty replacement. We also discovered several dead ports our secondary switch. The new switches were then installed with minimum impact to the users, all services have been restored.
- Attended the Brazos deliverables meeting. This was the kickoff meeting for the e-ticketing pilot project we are running this spring.
- Sent out monthly Phishing and Virus reports to all network users.
- Worked with our Internet Service Provider (ISP) to upgrade our existing fiber internet system. This upgrade was necessary to address issues of random outages.
- Attended The COG Steering Committee Broadband meeting and the SLV Broadband Symposium.
- Met with the Alamosa airport manager and UAS Colorado regarding regulations on flying a UAS aircraft in Class E airspace.
- Registered our UAS with the FAA.
- Brandon Gallegos attended online training, tested and received his part 107 Pilot's license. This license allows the City of Alamosa to perform flights with our UAS.
- Installed a new card printer for the Rec Center.
- Adjusted temp sensor to higher threshold at the Rec Center to avoid false reporting.
- Reviewed the security logs created by the Security Audit system. The system allows IT to review potential physical security breach attempts of the entire network in one comprehensive location.
- Patched all City owned computers to the latest patch and vulnerability fixes from Microsoft. This monthly patching helps protect our computers from malicious software, resolve general windows issues/bugs, and provide access to new windows features.

In Monte Vista, we performed the following items:

- Watchguard
 - Worked with the vendor to install their Cloud Share product. Allowing videos to be shared with the DA via a link instead of creating a CD.
 - o Replaced one Vista body cams for a broken clip.
 - Verified that the warranty on our body cams expire on May 17th 2017.
 There is no extended warranty service available. Any additional problems with the cameras will result in the need to buy a replacement.
- Setup projector city council meeting and other presentations.
- Attended the monthly Department Head meeting.
- Reworked the expenses for IT for 2017 to prioritize projects.
- Began the process of organizing the patch cables in the IT server room.

- Worked with Viaero to get the generator functional at City Hall. Viaero and IT identified a need for a mini tower next to City Hall in order to better support our City Cellular phones. In do so, Viaero offered to fix our aging generator, install a new transfer switch, and repair our main power fuses in exchange for power to the sight. I'm happy to report that the entire project is now done. We now have much better cellular service, and a newly reconditioned generator at City Hall. We now have the ability to act as an Emergency Operations Center (EOC), for local emergencies.

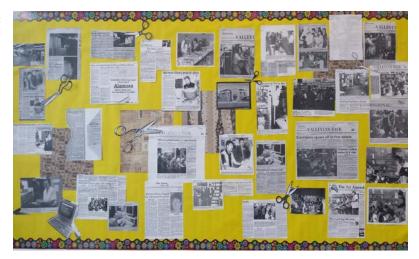
> Displays

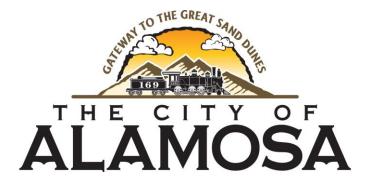

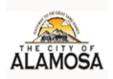

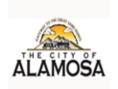

Award of Bid, 2017 Parks and Cemetery Building

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council award the contract to Alcon Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$352,212.00 (three hundred fifty two thousand two hundred twelve dollars) as the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

Background:

The Alamosa Cemetery is used by people throughout the San Luis Valley, and the nation. There are currently nearly 8,000 graves on-site with an average increase of 60-70 per year. These 60 to 70 new graves annually require record keeping, funeral planning, and plot purchasing. Our existing facilities do not allow us to provide family members the privacy they require when performing these activities, nor do they allow our employees to operate as safely and efficiently as possible. The existing building will be converted to storage so that the new office will have a much more professional and welcoming atmosphere for the general public.

This project is necessary to provide safe and accessible facilities to city employees and the general public. Our current building lacks many features that are necessary for the safe and efficient completion of the City's mission to provide those services expected of a full service municipal government. A recent safety and access inspection completed by Donna Frost, a Safety Consultant for Pinnacol Assurance identified many specific safety and access concerns that will need to be addressed if the new construction is not completed. Costs for these required improvements have not yet been determined but will surely be significant and disruptive to existing and necessary services.

In early 2016 staff released an RFP for the construction of this building but bids came in well over budget. We pursued and were granted a DOLA grant in the amount of \$200,000 to bolster our existing budget and made changes to the design in an effort to minimize bid prices while still providing a facility that meets the needs of the community.

In late March of this year staff released another RFP and received two qualified bids, both from local bidders. Those results are listed below for your review and consideration.

Alcon Construction, LLC	\$352,212.00
Van Iwaarden Builders, Inc.	\$362,980.00

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to award the contract to Alcon Construction, Inc. in the amount of \$352,212.00 (three hundred fifty two thousand two hundred twelve dollars) as the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

Alternatives:

Council may award the bid to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder, Council may award the contract to the other bidder, or Council may reject all bids and provide staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

\$400,000 was budgeted for this project, approximately \$12,000 has been paid to the architect for design and bid services. The low bid will leave approximately \$35,800 in the project budget, while representing a big portion of the additional aspects of construction, things like the parking lot, sidewalks, electric and gas services, water and sewer services, and geotechnical services are expected to run the project approximately \$20,000 over budget. Staff recommends a future budget amendment to transfer these funds from the general fund balance to cover the actual overruns.

Legal Opinion:

City Attorney will be present for comment.

Conclusion:

The construction of a new, OSHA and ADA compliant Parks and Cemetery office will address current needs specific to accessibility, safety, and operational efficiencies that have proven to be cost prohibitive at our current facility. In addition to providing a safe and efficient work environment for our Parks and Cemetery staff, the new facility will offer a clean, modern, private, and handicapped accessible location to the general public for funeral planning, and cemetery research. It will also provide public handicapped accessible restroom facilities for cemetery visitors.

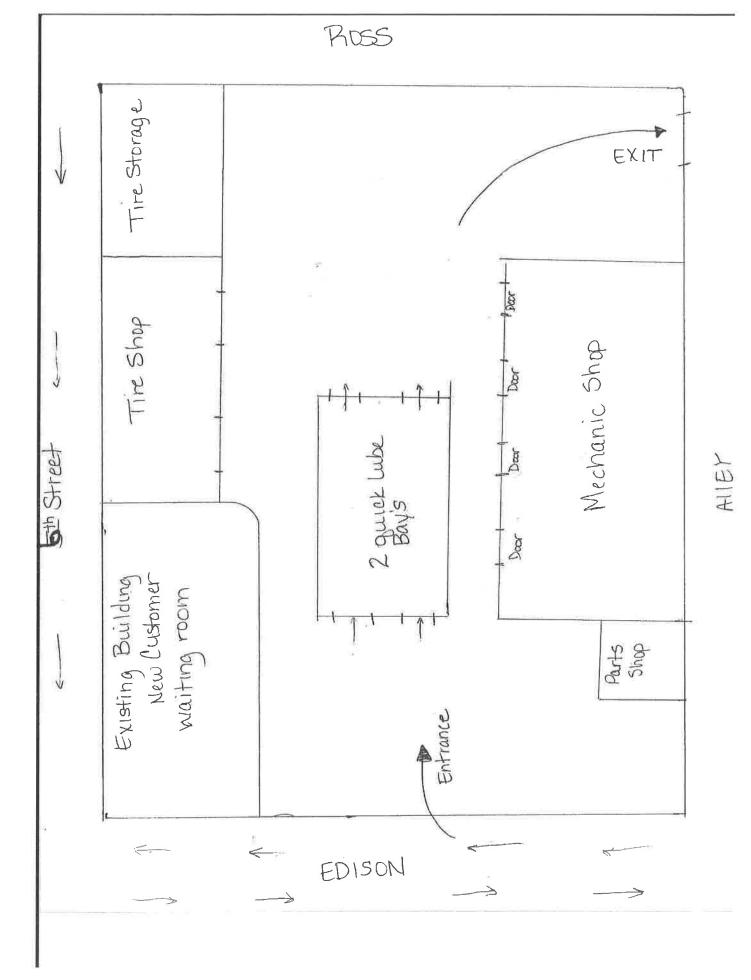

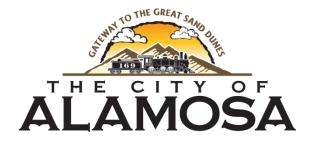

Award of Bid, 2017 Street Maintenance and Partial Street Improvement Program

Recommended Action:

That Council award the 2017 Street Maintenance and Partial Street Improvement Program to Asphalt Constructors, Inc. in the amount of \$471,332 as the only bidder.

Background:

In 2014, recognizing a need for increased street maintenance funds, Council created a street maintenance account that is intended for lighter-duty improvements like slurry seals, microsurfacing, and plant mixed seal coats. Last year, due to scheduling difficulties, our normal contractor was unable to complete our annual maintenance project, these funds carried forward to be added to this year's projects which were in turn combined with those funds from this year's Street Improvement Project that were intended for the same treatment resulting in a \$571,000 dollar budget for this project. This large volume (an estimated 3,122 tons) combined with stable oil prices has resulted in bid prices lower than expected. Our average cost/ton this year is \$135 versus the \$150 we have paid in the past. This has resulted in an unexpected savings of nearly \$50,000. This will allow a little margin for unexpected overruns in other street projects this summer, or possibly, if time allows, the addition of a project from the approved Capital Improvement Plan. As per their request, the County was notified of our intent to improve West Tenth and South Craft. Staff provided the County with exhibit maps depicting project extents and estimates for their cost of participation should they choose, but unfortunately we did not receive a response.

Issue Before the Council:

Gigi,

Tim asked me to make the County aware of our plans for work on West Tenth Street and/or South Craft. We plan to apply a 1" plant mixed seal coat (PMSC) top surface to West Tenth Street from Highway 285 west to the City Limits and the same on South Craft from the City limits north to First Street. Our last application of PMSC to a street was in 2013 and cost us \$145/ton applied plus \$5/gallon for tack oil of which we apply 28 gallons/thousand square feet. Based on a \$5/ton increase in PMSC and flat tack oil prices I have taken the liberty of calculating budget estimates for your consideration. I have not included volumetric estimates for any necessary leveling course work that may be required on your portions, I have however, included an additional 30 percent to our budget numbers to address existing rutting in our sections. I advertised this for bid this morning with a bid due date of 3:00 PM on March 10th and a project completion date no later than September 1. If you would like to partner with the city for all or a portion of this work in an effort to save mobilization costs and/or potential volume discounts please contact me or Heather and we can work out the details and get an addendum to the request published. 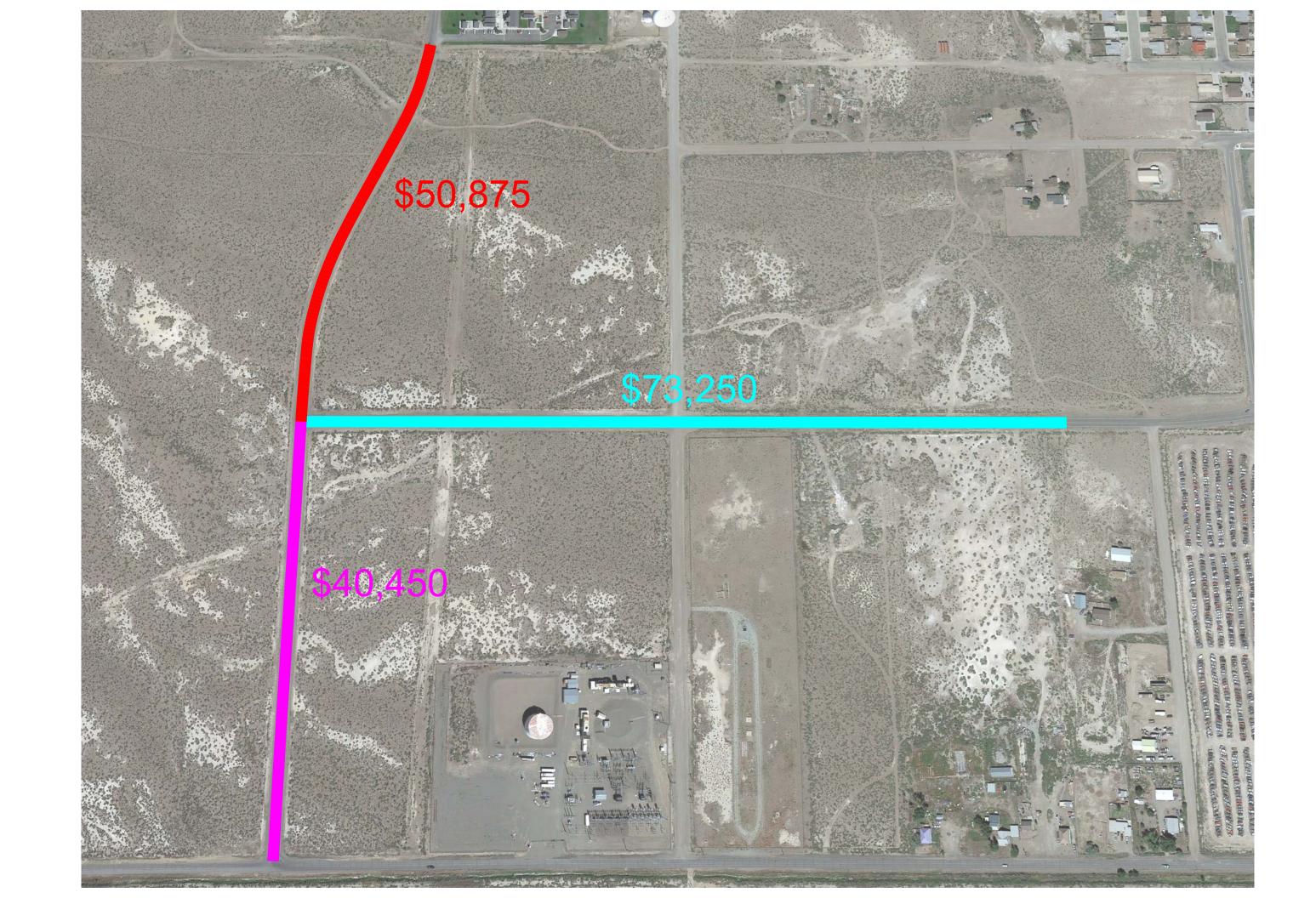

Subject/Title:

Request of Kolorado Creative Clouds Inc. and Main Copy Source LLC for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow the establishment of a private club for the purpose of marijuana consumption in a Commercial Business District.

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council deny the application as per the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Background:

Section 21-116 of the municipal code of the City of Alamosa provides for the review of those proposed uses that are not allowed in a specific zoning district by right, but not otherwise prohibited outright. This Permitted Use by Special Review process recognizes that although each zoning district is primarily intended for a predominant type of use (such as dwellings in residential districts), there are a number of uses which may or may not be appropriate in a particular district depending upon, for example, the location, nature of the proposed use, character of surrounding development, traffic capacities of adjacent streets, and potential environmental effects. These factors may dictate that the circumstances of development should be individually reviewed. It is the purpose of this article to provide review of such uses so that the community is assured that they are compatible with their locations and surrounding land uses and will further the purposes of this chapter. This process allows the Planning Commission and ultimately City Council to make a judgment call specific to certain uses in certain locations as to the degree of compatibility with surrounding land uses in the area of its proposed location and its consistency with the objectives and purposes of the City of Alamosa Zoning Code, Comprehensive Plan, and community desires. While not technically illegal because of the lack of sales on site and current state law, the unique nature of this use is undeniable; and it is the unique nature of the use and the fact that the use is not allowed by right that warrants the special review.

Section 21-118 further stipulates that no Special Review use application shall be approved unless the approving agency finds that the application is consistent with the objectives and purposes of this Chapter in Article I, and that the proposed use is designed to be compatible with surrounding land uses and the area of its location. Staff feels that the proposed use fails to meet either requirement for the following reasons:

Article I was adopted for the purpose of promoting a coordinated, harmonious development
of the municipality and its environs, which will, in accordance with present and future needs,
best promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare, as
well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, including among other things,
adequate provision for traffic; the promotion of safety from fire, floodwaters, and other
dangers; adequate provision for light and air; the promotion of healthful and convenient
distribution of population; the promotion of good civic design and arrangement; wise and
efficient expenditure of public funds; and the adequate provision of public utilities and other
public requirements. The proposed location of this use fails to best promote health, safety,
morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the community as required by
ordinance. Staff feels that this key commercial corridor and very visible location is not in the
best interest of the community, nor does it promote those goals as identified and promoted in

the recently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

- Article I also requires that the proposed use be designed to be compatible with surrounding land uses in the area of its location. Surrounding land uses include service, retail, indoor dining, professional service, and education. Staff feels that this use, a private club for the consumption of cannabis, lacks compatibility with surrounding land uses.
- Staff also has concerns specific to off street parking. The proposed location is part of an existing facility that will continue to house Main Copy Source as well as the proposed use. Our current off street parking ordinance will require a total of 15 parking spaces to accommodate the proposed aggregate use; the existing facility has a total of nine. The application identifies no means of complying with this ordinance. While the Planning Commission and staff were told by the applicant that arrangements had been made with the adjoining property owner for the cooperative use of their existing parking, it seems now that this was less than accurate. Staff was contacted the day after the public hearing and told in no uncertain terms that no arrangements had been made, to the contrary, their request to share parking was flatly denied and the property owner planned to immediately fence his parking lot should this application be approved.

Should Council choose to recommend approval of the application, staff would request that said recommendation be made with the following conditions:

- That the Special Use approval be valid only after the following deficiencies be addressed through the building permit and inspection process. The application states that one bathroom will be provided. It is not currently known if this type of wall exists.
- Secondly, that the applicant will make application for an expansion of an existing Permitted Use should they choose to begin smoking after potential changes in legislation later this year, or at any time in the future as this may very well require significant HVAC upgrades and documentation should they choose to allow smoking in the future to meet the requirements of the Indoor Air Pollution Act since it will share a common wall with an existing public business.
- Finally, that Applicant provide written documentation of any arrangement to satisfy the parking deficiencies noted above.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to deny the application as per the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission?

Alternatives:

Council may deny the application, approve the application with or without conditions, or refer the matter back to the Planning Commission with further instructions.

Fiscal Impact:

No significant fiscal impact is anticipated.

Legal Opinion:

City Attorney will be present for comment.

Conclusion:

Public comment was overwhelmingly in opposition to this request. Public hearing minutes have been included in your packet for review and consideration.

Club

An organization composed of people who voluntarily meet on a regular basis for a mutual purpose other than educational, religious, charitable, or financial pursuits. A club is any kind of group that has members who meet for a social, literary, or political purpose, such as health clubs, country clubs, book clubs, and women's associations. The term club is not a legal term per se, but a group that organizes itself as a club must comply with any laws governing its organization and otherwise be cognizant of the legal ramifications in undertaking to organize itself in this manner.

Various types of clubs exist. An *incorporated members' club* is composed of a group of individuals who each contribute to the club's funds, which are used to pay the expenses of conducting the society. An *unincorporated proprietary club* is one whose proprietor owns the property and funds and conducts the club to attempt to make a profit. The members are entitled to use the premises and property in exchange for the payment of entrance fees and subscriptions to the proprietor as well as any additional rights and privileges provided in their contractual agreement.

An incorporated club is generally governed by state statute. Many statutes provide for the incorporation of clubs, and the statutory requirements must be strictly observed. A statute may require that an application for incorporation state the purposes of the club in a definitive manner to help the court determine whether the objective of the club is legal. In addition, the application should state the manner in which club revenues are to be provided and the basis upon which an individual may become a member of the club.

A club's certificate of incorporation should indicate pecuniary means (i.e., funds, money, property), describe the objective of the club, and specify a place of business or office. If a club is unincorporated, the rules that govern associations apply.

Voluntary clubs are not partnerships, since the members do not join them for profit-making purposes and, unlike partners, are not responsible for the acts of each other. If a club's members do unite for a commercial venture, however, this association would constitute a partnership. In such cases, a club might be required to comply with state law governing partnerships.

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The purpose and objective of a club must be in compliance **Whoteslavoard** in the best interests of the community, whether a club is incorporated or not. The Court emphasized the fact that significant commerce occurs at most of the clubs and that "business deals are often made and personal contacts valuable for business purposes, employment and professional advancement are formed." Such characteristics, according to the Court, are significant in determining the nonprivate nature of clubs. The law upheld by the Court in this case narrowed the definition of a private club in order to remedy a situation deemed inappropriate by a legislative body.

Boy Scouts of America The Supreme Court clarified its position on the reach of civil rights laws in *Boys Scouts of America v. Dale*, 530 U.S. 640, 120 S.Ct. 2446, 147 L.Ed.2d 554 (2000). The Court, in a 5–4 decision, held that forcing the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) to accept gay troop leaders would violate its rights of free expression and free association under the First Amendment. The BSA is a private association and therefore was not subject to state and federal public accommodation laws.

The Supreme Court tied this ruling to its previous decision in *Hurley v. Irish-American Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Group of Boston*, 515 U.S. 557, 115 S.Ct. 2338, 132 L.Ed.2d 487 (1995). In *Hurley*, the Court ruled that the sponsor of Boston's St. Patrick's Day parade could not be forced to let a group of gays and lesbians participate. The Court held that parades are a form of expression and that the sponsors could not be forced to include "a group imparting a message the organizers do not wish to convey."

Public Opinion

Despite the fact that private clubs may be exempt from civil rights laws, they are still subject to the power of public opinion. In 2002, the National Council of Women's Organizations (NCWO), which has approximately six million members from over one hundred groups, announced that it would seek the admittance of women members to the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, Georgia. The club, with a membership of three hundred, is the home of the prestigious Masters Golf Tournament. When NCWO stated that it would contact television sponsors of the Masters to seek their help in applying pressure, the club announced it would forgo advertising revenue for the 2003 tournament. The controversy generated friction within the membership, with some members urging the admittance of women and some resigning in protest at the club's actions in dealing with the demands of NCWO. The NCWO pressed the CBS network not to televise the 2003 tournament but was rebuffed by the network. However, many corporations declined to sponsor the tournament, a sure indication that the NCWO campaign had some success.

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Private marijuana clubs pass first test before Colorado legislature

Colorado lawmakers moved forward on a bill Wednesday that paves the way for private marijuana clubs to open shop, as politicians from both sides of the aisle look to broaden the state's billion-dollar cannabis industry. Senate Bill 184 would allow local governments within Colorado to authorize the operation of private marijuana clubs for adults. It passed the chamber's Business, Labor and Technology Committee with bipartisan support Wednesday following a 5-2 vote, sending it to the Senate floor for further consideration.

Colorado legalized marijuana for recreational purposes in 2012 and opened the nation's first non-medical pot shops at the start of 2014. Despite marijuana being commercially available across the state, however, it's currently illegal to consume marijuana in public, including places the state calls "indoor-but-public" locations, such as bars and restaurants.

Passage of S.B. 184 wouldn't roll back those certain restrictions, but it would enable any county, city or municipality within Colorado to adopt ordinances allowing for the operation of private marijuana clubs — "a membership-based club not accessible to the general public that operates to allow members to consume retail or medical marijuana on the premises," according to the proposal's language.

Authorized clubs would be prohibited from selling alcohol, food or pot to its patrons, and customers would be barred from using clubs to conduct deals of their own. With Colorado's cannabis industry having sold roughly \$1.3 billion in legal weed during 2016, however, widening the availability of legal smoking spots could likely further boost the profits of medical and recreational dispensaries, as well as any entrepreneurs who start selling memberships to their private pot clubs if and when S.B. 184 is approved and implemented.

"We're legal, and we need a place for people to go. We need social clubs," Ashley Weber of Colorado NORML, a marijuana-legalization advocacy group, told The Associated Press.

One of two dissenting votes cast during Wednesday's hearing came courtesy of State Sen. Tim Neville, Littleton Republican, who said lawmakers should instead back a broader proposal, Senate Bill 63, which would have authorized marijuana clubs with fewer restrictions. That bill failed Wednesday following a 6-1 vote.

Lawmakers looked toward another bill Wednesday that would allow dispensaries to deliver marijuana, Senate Bill 192, but delayed casting a vote, the Colorado Springs Gazette reported.

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Cannabis clubs get their day at the Capitol

This could be the year that state lawmakers finally clear the air over pot clubs. Coloradans voted to "regulate marijuana like alcohol" in 2012, but five years later, the actual regulatory landscape tells a different story. Unlike imbibling alcohol, you can only consume marijuana in a private residence — which makes partaking in our state's specialty vice (and paying taxes on it), trickier for tourists, renters and all those who can't light up at home.

A bill currently under consideration in the state legislature would add a much-needed legal alternative: private consumption clubs; if you follow this column, you know just how much flak such clubs have received from Colorado Springs City Councilors who saw the proliferation of clubs as flouting their 2013 vote to opt out of recreational sales.

Club owners have all but begged for regulation, arguing they provide a valuable service and are willing to play by the rules, if such rules existed. Nevertheless, council voted to ban all new clubs last year. They offered existing clubs a temporary license, but the businesses are still required to close in eight years.

Denver voters expressed desite for social marijuana use in November, passing initiative 100 which creates a permit for non-initiative initiative initiatinitiatinitinitiatinitiative initiative initia

Seniate full 63, sponsored by Sen. Vicki Marble, R-Fort Collins, and Rep. Jovan Melton, D-Aurora, would create a marijuana consumption club license that lets its operator sell retail or medical marijuana to patrons 21 or older to consume on-site. Patrons would not be able to bring their own product or take any product home. Clubs would have to either source product from a licensed marijuana business or get a cultivation license to grow their own. Local jurisdictions could decide whether or not to allow the clubs.

The bill has been assigned to the Business, Labor and Technology committee where It's tentatively scheduled to be heard on Feb. 22.

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DENVER — At risk of raising the ire of the White House, Colorado is on the brink of becoming the first state with licensed pot clubs. But the details of how these clubs will operate are as hazy as the underground clubs operating already.

Denver officials are working on regulations to open a one-year pilot of bring-your-own marijuana clubs, while state lawmakers are expected to consider measures to allow either marijuana "tasting rooms" run by marijuana dispensaries, or smoke-friendly clubs akin to cigar bars.

Alaska regulators, spooked by how the Trump administration might view marijuana, recently decided not to move forward with rules for use of marijuana at authorized stores, though the issue there isn't dead.

California and Maine voters expressly signed off on public marijuana consumption, but haven't settled on rules. That means Colorado may be first out of the gate with statewide pot-club regulations, possibly by this summer.

Colorado officials from both parties have come around to the idea of Amsterdam–style pot clubs for a simple reason. Everyone is tired of seeing pot smokers on public sidewalks.

"It's a problem we've got to address," said state Sen. Chris Holbert, a suburban Denver Republican who opposed marijuana legalization but doesn't like seeing its use on the sidewalk, either.

Pointing jokingly to his suit and tie, the grey-haired Holbert said he's even had panhandlers ask him for marijuana near the state capitol.

"I mean, look at me. If I'm getting hassled, everyone's getting hassled," Holbert told reporters.

Democrats here agree that tourists need an out-of-sight place to use marijuana.

"No voter in Colorado voted to allow the use of marijuana on their sidewalk, in their parks, in their public view," said state Rep. Dan Pabon, D-Denver. "But that's essentially what we've done by not allowing private club space for marijuana uses."

So both parties seem to agree that Colorado needs to allow for places that let patrons smoke weed. But that's where agreement breaks down.

Colorado Warms To Cannabis Clubs, Despite Federal Uncertainty

A Republican–sponsored measure to allow marijuana clubs to be regulated like cigar bars was put on hold for a re–write. That's because sponsors are trying to address concerns that pot clubs shouldn't allow medical marijuana use, along with other legal wrinkles.

"Telling people to socially use their medicine? That's like we're legalizing pill parties," said Rachel O'Bryan, who opposes marijuana clubs and ran an unsuccessful campaign to defeat a Denver social–use measure last fall.

There's also intense disagreement over whether establishing pot clubs would invite a federal crackdown.

Some say the clubs would be too much for federal authorities to ignore; others insist the Justice Department would view clubs as a way to keep pot away from children, a priority according to previous Justice Department directions.

"Jeff Sessions is the big question mark right now," Democratic state Rep. Jonathan Singer said, referring to the newly minted, anti–marijuana U.S. attorney general. "I think we need to send a message to him that Colorado's doing it right."

Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper, a Democrat who opposed pot legalization but is undecided on signing a bill to allow clubs, said he's not sure how the administration would respond to clubs.

"I don't know whether we'd be inviting federal intervention, but certainly that's one argument I've heard used persuasively," Hickenlooper said Thursday.

The governor did indicate he'd veto a bill that allowed indoor smoking, not just smoking on enclosed private patios. The Denver clubs would have to abide by clean-air laws banning burned marijuana inside; the statewide proposal would allow indoor smoking with "proper ventilation."

"We spent a long time letting everyone know that smoking is bad for you," Hickenlooper said. "Just cause that smoke makes you happy, and dumb, doesn't mean it's good for you."

The marijuana industry seems frustrated by Colorado's halting attempts to figure out how to allow pot clubs. Because current marijuana law is vague, Colorado currently has a patchwork of underground clubs, many of them raided when they try to file permits or pay taxes.

"The situation right now is a disaster," said Chris Jetter, a licensed marijuana grower who owned a west Denver pot club that was raided twice. Jetter said authorities took more than six pounds of marijuana, along with tens of thousands in cash, then charged him with illegally distributing pot.

(Jetter eventually pleaded guilty to public consumption of marijuana, and was fined \$100. He disputes he was doing anything illegal and says he pleaded guilty to end the matter. He has since closed his club.)

"Two or more people can get together and consume alcohol almost anywhere, and there's no problem with that," Jetter said. "But we're not treating marijuana like alcohol. What's going to happen with the feds? If they start kicking in doors, I don't know. But we need to figure something out."

Colorado Senate Committee Passes Measure to Allow Private Marijuana Clubs

Colorado's Senate Business, Labor and Technology Committee has given approval to legislation allowing for the operation of private marijuana clubs.



Senate Bill 184 was passed with a bipartisan 5 to 2 vote, sending it towards a vote by the full Senate. The measure "authorizes the operation of a private marijuana club" If the "local jurisdiction has authorized clubs". Under the proposed law, marijuana clubs would be defined as " a membership-based club not accessible to the general public that operates to allow members to consume retail or medical marijuana on the premises".

According to the measure's summary, below are a list of rules that such clubs must follow in order to be operating within state law:

- · All members and employees of the club must be 21 years of age or older;
- A club owner must be a resident of Colorado for at least 2 years prior to owning the club;
- · The club's employees must be Colorado residents;
- The club cannot sell or serve alcohol or food;
- A club owner shall not sell marijuana on the premises [everyone must bring their own]; and
- A club owner shall not permit the sale or exchange of marijuana for remuneration on the premises.

101 CONCERNING LICENSING MARIJUANA CONSUMPTION CLUBS.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov/.)

The bill creates a marijuana consumption club (club) license. The license is subject to the same licensing requirements as other retail marijuana licenses. The license may be issued to a person who operates an establishment where retail or medical marijuana may be sold and consumed. The club's sales are limited to the same limits as a retail marijuana store or a medical marijuana center. The club may not serve food prepared on site or alcohol. Entry to the club is restricted to those persons at least 21 years of age. A club shall purchase its marijuana,

Shading denotes HOUSE amendment. <u>Double underlining denotes SENATE amendment</u>. Capital letters indicate new material to be added to existing statute. Dashes through the words indicate deletions from existing statute. marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products from a licensed marijuana business or get a cultivation license and sell its own marijuana. A club may not permit outside marijuana, marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products. All marijuana, marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products must be consumed or disposed of on site. A club and its employees shall successfully complete a responsible vendor program annually. A club has the same immunity to a lawsuit for an injury caused by a club patron that a bar enjoys.

The bill allows a local government to permit clubs in its jurisdiction. If a local government permits clubs, it may require the clubs to be licensed. In order to operate as a club, the club must comply with the local and state licensing regulations. A club is exempt from the "Colorado Clean Indoor Air Act" for marijuana consumption purposes if it is fully ventilated. Public display, consumption, or use in a club is not a criminal offense.

You are 114 times more likely to die from overdosing on alchohol than you are from cannabis, a recent study has found.

The report, published in Scientific Reports journal, compared the risks associated with 10 substances using the margin of exposure approach. This method compares a lethal dose of the drug with the dosage typically taken by recreational users. Substances tested included alcohol and nicotine, as well as illicit drugs including cocaine, heroin, ecstasy (MDMA) and methamphetamines.

It found that the mortality risk to individuals posed by cannabis was <u>approximately 114 times</u> less than that of alcohol. In fact, cannabis was the only substance to be classified as 'low risk'. In contrast, alcohol posed the highest risk to individuals and was ranked alongside nicotine, cocaine and heroin as 'high risk'.

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In terms of risk posed to a population, alcohol was the only substance classified as 'high risk'. However, the researchers noted that this was partly due to its wide availability and a lack of data on other illicit drugs.

The report said that many European governments adopted restrictive policies towards cannabis and other illicit drugs due to the perception that they are more harmful than alcohol and tobacco. "Specifically, the results confirm that the risk of cannabis may have been overestimated in the past," the report said. "In contrast, the risk of alcohol may have been commonly underestimated."

Professor David Nutt, chair of neuropsychopharmacology at Imperial College London and former chair of the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs, said: "The results make perfect sense. The ultra-low mortality of cannabis has long been recognised with health harms greatly exaggerated. I would recommend that cannabis be reinstated as a medicine as recognised by the House of Lords report in 2001, as the clear harms are well outweighed by the health benefits."

The study concluded by suggesting that alcohol and tobacco should be prioritised in terms of risk management. It also suggested that governments legalise and regulate the distribution and use of cannabis, as opposed to the widespread current practice of prohibition.

However, the report cautioned that regular use of hard drugs was not safer than moderate drinking due to the environmental hazards associated with these drugs, such as dirty needles.

The Washington Post pointed out that the study merely reaffirmed drug-safety rankings developed in the past decade. However, the timing of the study's publication was rather apt as today Alaska became the third U.S. state to legalise recreational use of marijuana.

Despite widespread decriminalisation, cannabis is still classed as illegal in most European countries. <u>Even in the Netherlands</u>, famous for its liberal stance towards the drug, cannabis can only be purchased from licensed coffee shops. In 2001, Portugal decriminalised all drugs meaning that certain cases of personal use would not lead to prosecution.

The request of Colorado Creative Clouds, Inc. for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a private club (Use Group C-11) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is portions of Lots 14,15 & 16, Bellview, Block 46, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 507 Bell Ave.

The public hearing opened at 6:15 p.m.

Steenburg: I would like to preface this hearing with even though the city has a moratorium on this type of use; this application was submitted prior to that moratorium passing. The issue before the commission is the location. This is a perfectly legal application for what is now a legal business. As part of the permitted use process, you are to consider whether or not this location is appropriate for the land use.

Travis: Thank you. Is there someone here to speak for this request? Please come to the podium and state your name and address for the record.

Atencio: My name is Rosanna Atencio, Antonito, CO. I am here as a representative of Colorado Creative Clouds for a permitted use for cannabis consumption club. I know that sparks everyone's attention right away. As this gentleman pointed out it is legal in the State of Colorado and is allowed. Here in the San Luis Valley it is proving to be something that is generating revenue and tourism, promoting the San Luis Valley. People are coming here for that destination. We would like to offer a place that is safe if it is allowed and it would be a "bring your own" consumption club, sales is not an area of profit at all. The location that we are looking at now is what I think it would be a great location and encourage foot traffic and a shuttle service being part of a safe way to use cannabis. Here in the valley we have medical for purchase or recreational. There are a lot of rules and regulations the State put down that do not allow consumption on college campuses, rental properties, housing units; we definitely don't want use in parks or on the streets. This would give them a safe place in Alamosa to use cannabis. I myself am quite impressed, I have seen the new downtown with the patrons some recreational, some medical, musicians, artists, people who love the outdoors, hikers. Number one in our agenda is keeping it away from children. When you have tourists here and people from all over the valley coming to Wal Mart to shop, they will have a safe place to consume cannabis. College students could walk over. What we received from the City regarding the permitted use, we are here to answer any questions you have.

Travis: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak for this request? Please come to the podium and state your name and address for the record.

Avila: Hello, my name is Daniel Avila, 124 11th St., Alamosa. I support this just with the whole revenue it can bring into Alamosa and get it off the streets and out of the public parks where it is not legal to use. I support a legal place where they are safe and people can come here in a safe and controlled environment. People that want to smoke cannabis legally can do it at this place. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you, is there anyone else that would like to speak for this request? Is there anyone against this proposal?

Wiley: I'm Terry Wiley, 4997 South County Rd. but I have a business here in town. I look at the city vision and it being family friendly and don't think a business that has a shuttle service to take your clientele away as family friendly because they have been consuming marijuana products. This is not what I view as a family friendly business. What happens to the waste from the operations, will there be bouncers, is there liability insurance for the patrons if they end up in a bad trip, emergency room a visit, who is going to support the costs? We do have a bill in the Senate and the lobbies for the clubs and passed the senate but not the house. I think the City should not be hasty at all, see what happens with the state laws in the near future. Travis. Thank you.

Atencio: Can I add to that? The State has passed it into the House and they have seen it and amended it so it can be passed.

Travis: Anyone else that would like to speak against this?

Sowards: Martin Sowards, 5664 County Rd. 6 S., however I have a business at 77 Adcock Dr. known as Rock Creek Family Medicine. Thank you for letting us speak. Working in health care, I think we have enough addiction in this world already; we don't need to promote anymore. If you look at the City of Alamosa I personally don't think we want this. I know it is legal. If they want to come to the City and smoke marijuana, they can stay in the county, stay at home. I don't want them in the City. I see plenty of addiction in my office I don't see how it helps Alamosa at all; I don't think it has a place for us. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you, anyone else?

Lavier: Andy Lavier, 815 3rd St. Alamosa. I agree with Dr. Wiley and Dr. Sowards. This isn't what I want Alamosa to be known for. I don't want it to be a draw for Alamosa. I look around this room what is represented on the walls, we should be known for the railroads, sandhill cranes, wildlife, those are draws for our community and town. I think cannabis stores are an eyesore. This is right off Main St. and it's not what I want Alamosa to be known for. I work with youth and there is a marked rise in young people using marijuana having it on them. I live in Alamosa and would prefer they keep it in the county.

Travis: Thank you. Anyone else?

Bacon: My name is Sheryl Bacon; I work as a nurse practitioner. I work at SLV Regional Hospital taking care of sick patients; I live at 2903 Sarah Lane, Alamosa. A couple points I find challenging is when this first passed, people could use it in the privacy of their own home. This a bit different focus. I understand as was brought up by the last person who spoke that people come here who want to camp and fish, how is this family friendly if you leave your kids somewhere and go to a club to smoke marijuana? As a medical provider, I agree with Dr. Sowards, I actually take care of his patients when they are in the hospital and Valley Wide's and San Luis Health System and we see a tremendous amount of addiction. What I have seen personally when I work and I work seven days in a row and seven days off taking care of patients as a health provider and work 3-6 days a week in Conejos Hospital and one of the common themes we see is we've drawn a lot of people here from out of state to grow and use marijuana, they have existing health challenges and don't belong at altitude. It really is a burden to our hospitals with the insurance situation and people who come here not to be employed but to grow marijuana which I respect their right to do. If you are looking at this as a revenue source for the City it probably is but if it causes children to be left unattended while they are using marijuana and its right here in the middle of Main St. - I don't want to walk down the street with my grandchildren, my children don't live here, where they will see it, smell it, I truly don't. I feel that what people do in their home is their business, the county vs. the city limits I really don't know those details, and I'm not civically active as far as that goes. We need to look at the effect of people use it, grow it and really look at it in a balanced equation. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you. Please step forward.

Hobbs: Shanna Hobbs, I live in Alamosa County. I'm a little ambivalent about a cannabis consumption club just because there is potential for problems. But the fact of it is they have applied for a legal business. If you don't like marijuana don't use it. If you don't agree with it, then don't promote it. The point is these people have a right to open a business just like Jess Caton does, like Wiley does, just like doctors do and most of the addictions you are treating started from doctors writing prescriptions for pills that don't work that lost their efficacy over time and people turn to more natural products, St. John's wort for depression, to cannabis for pain, PTSD, I see people every day from the entire continuum- for those who use it recreationally or for people that they need it for pain. My position is people need to alleviate suffering no matter how they do it and shouldn't be left to others to decide and furthermore you're assuming that families coming here and leaving kids in the motels. They can stop in Walsenburg or Ft. Garland and buy their products there and come here and there is no place to consume. It makes sense to have a legal place to use it whether from here or out of the valley. Suggestions I would have is to have a third party to check they are bringing their own product and not potentially black market or from other patrons.

Travis: This isn't a debate. It is about the location for this type of business.

Bervig: You're talking to the Planning Commission, it is our business.

Hobbs: I apologize I'm talking about some of the people that are not going to patronize this type of business, the location can have discreet signage and that is not allowed. Let people take that step and instead in a legal direction and not in cars and parks where it is illegal. Thank you.

Bervig: Aren't you the lady circulating the petition to get marijuana on the ballot for the City?

Hobbs: I am. So people have safe access instead of the black market.

Travis: Please step forward.

Sowards: Hello, my name is Lorna Sowards, 4665 County Rd. S., we have business at 77 Adcock Dr. I believe that first and foremost this being a special use permit so originally whoever drew up the plans for the City thought this wouldn't be something the city would want to

entertain. So I would like you to think about that. If you look on the City's webpage it shows "Gateway to the Sand Dunes" not "gateway to the gateway drug" that marijuana is known as. I'm really concerned about it being in town, I'm really concerned about it across the street from Trinidad State Junior College because more than half of the students there are not legal to consume marijuana. You're putting a temptation for those students when there main goal is to be educated in a good manner and not a worldly manner. As a parent of college students, I would have a really hard time sending my child to TSJC knowing this establishment is across the street. I don't know what the effects of income lost from TSJC due to parents not sending their child there if parents saw this establishment across the street you would be losing money all around. I do believe in free enterprise, but this marijuana club special use permit should not be allowed in the City of Alamosa. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you.

Sheryl Bacon approached the commission again with the following comments.

Bacon: I really didn't know this was about the location and if I came across as being totally against marijuana I am not. It does have medicinal uses and I do prescribe it for patients in a controlled environment. One of the things we tell them is if they are to use it at home to make sure children cannot get ahold of it. If you look at pediatric medicine emergency room visits, marijuana is a big issue. We have to think of the location and as Ms. Sowards stated and police needs and the real idea here is the location and special permit and makes it safer or better, you can't contain the smoke it would disseminate to other buildings you might need to consider special ventilation and location is important. I think I'll stop there.

Martinez: My name is Robert Martinez, representing TSJC, 1011 Main St., our issue is the proximity to the college. We rely heavily on Title 4 Federal funds to operate the college, that's financial aid and part of the regulations is we have drug and alcohol prevention programs on our campus and we are trying to promote drug and alcohol awareness. This type of business would deter from that. Our stand would be the same if it was a bar that was proposed at this location. We are trying to promote economic development and all for people to open a business but the proximity to the campus is our issue. I know K-12 has a 1,000 ft. barrier and I would like you to consider this as you look at this location.

Travis: Thank you. Anybody else that would like to speak? Thank you, we will close the public hearing. Are there questions, comments, concerns from the commission?

The public hearing closed at 6:42 p.m.

Adcock: I have a lot. (to Ms. Atencio) Can you come back up please and answer some question for us? Smell and odor; what kind of walls separate this from the copy store?

Atencio: It is just a separation wall. It is not going to be smoked, it will be vaporized. It is not smoked or burned. It would be a vape pens and that eliminates that smell. It would not be burned like a cigarette. It wouldn't stick to your clothes. We use CMF fans with the carbon filters. That would be inside the club.

Bervig: A couple questions I have. According to Section 21-116 of the municipal code the City provides for the review of those proposed uses that are not allowed in a specific zoning district by right, but not prohibited outright. This Permitted Use by Special Review process recognizes that although each zoning district is primarily intended for a predominant type of use (such as dwellings in residential districts) there are a number of uses which may or may not be appropriate in a particular district upon, for example the location, nature of the proposed use, character of surrounding development, traffic capacities of adjacent streets, and potential environmental effects. Nobody has answered those questions. These factors may dictate that the circumstances of development should be individually reviewed.

This process allows the Planning Commission to make a judgment call specific to certain use in certain locations as to the degree of compatibility with surrounding land uses in the area of its proposed location and its consistency with the objectives and purposes of the City of Alamosa Zoning Code and Comprehensive Plan. While not technically illegal because of the lack of sales on site and current state law, the unique nature of this use is undeniable; and it is the unique nature of the use and the fact that the use is not allowed by right that warrants the special review.

About two months ago in the Valley Courier there was an article and the doctor in the article was adamant about the effects of smoking marijuana and what it does to people forever and ever. We don't need to finance our City and I have been involved in City government for many years, by selling something that is harmful to people's health.

Atencio: And that is one article. I am also in the medical field and have actually practiced with some of the people in this room and here in Alamosa, I do Cat scans, x-rays and ultrasounds and with imaging and benefits of marijuana are undeniable.

Bervig: I've been to the emergency room with my wife with asthma and of 15 beds, 14 were taken by marijuana users. I complained to the nurse and she said we have to take care of those people just like the rest.

Travis: This isn't a debate; are there any more questions from the Commission?

Bervig: The proposed location of this use fails to best promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the community as required by ordinance. Our staff feels that this downtown and very visible location is not in the best interest of the community. Our Public Works Director recommends that it be denied. There is one bathroom and it requires two; and it requires with two uses in the building, a 1 hour separation wall if the building is sprinkled or two hour if it is not is required. What will happen down the road and what Council will say, but let me state that I am 100% against what you want to do.

Atencio: It is quite obvious. At this point there is only one restroom and being we are at a special review and through the moratorium and being unsure of what class are we in. We would want to ask for a variance or a waiver with the moratorium in effect. We are here to ask these questions.

Adcock Also the parking - you have nine spaces and are required fifteen.

Atencio: Yes and businesses in the area when they have normal business hours we have got permission from business owners and could use those spaces. The shuttle service is not something required, it is something we offer as a safety measure and when they are ready to go home they are free to just like leaving an alcohol establishment. Adcock: The second bathroom you are willing to put in?

Atencio: Yes.

Adcock: From the paperwork you submitted, you are opened from 10:00 to 10:00 and those business are also opened during a good portion of that time. Parking could be a problem.

Atencio: We hope our patrons will use downtown parking as well and patronize the Farmer's Market, art galleries, businesses and would encourage that.

Adcock: You are required to have 15 spaces. The walls bother me; the fire wall seems very necessary to me. It is a very different use. Are you going to be carrying liability insurance?

Atencio: When they enter the club; they sign a private membership at their discretion. We do have a club in Antonito and we just our license got renewed. They are proud of what we have done to promote the town, restaurants, hotels and providing a safe, legal place. There is a \$300 fine if you are using marijuana in a car, park or on the streets. That is not what we want to do. The police stated there have been zero incidents in the almost year the club has been there.

Adcock: Pat, will this increase the amount of police surveillance?

Steenburg: I'm sure it would increase activity initially. I don't know how much, it would depend on how effective the management and business is run.

Adcock: You would be checking I.D.s?

Atencio: Absolutely. There would be secondary security if needed. The doorman would check I.D.s. If we need more help we will definitely be on board with that.

Travis: Thank you. Is there a motion?

Issue Before the Council:

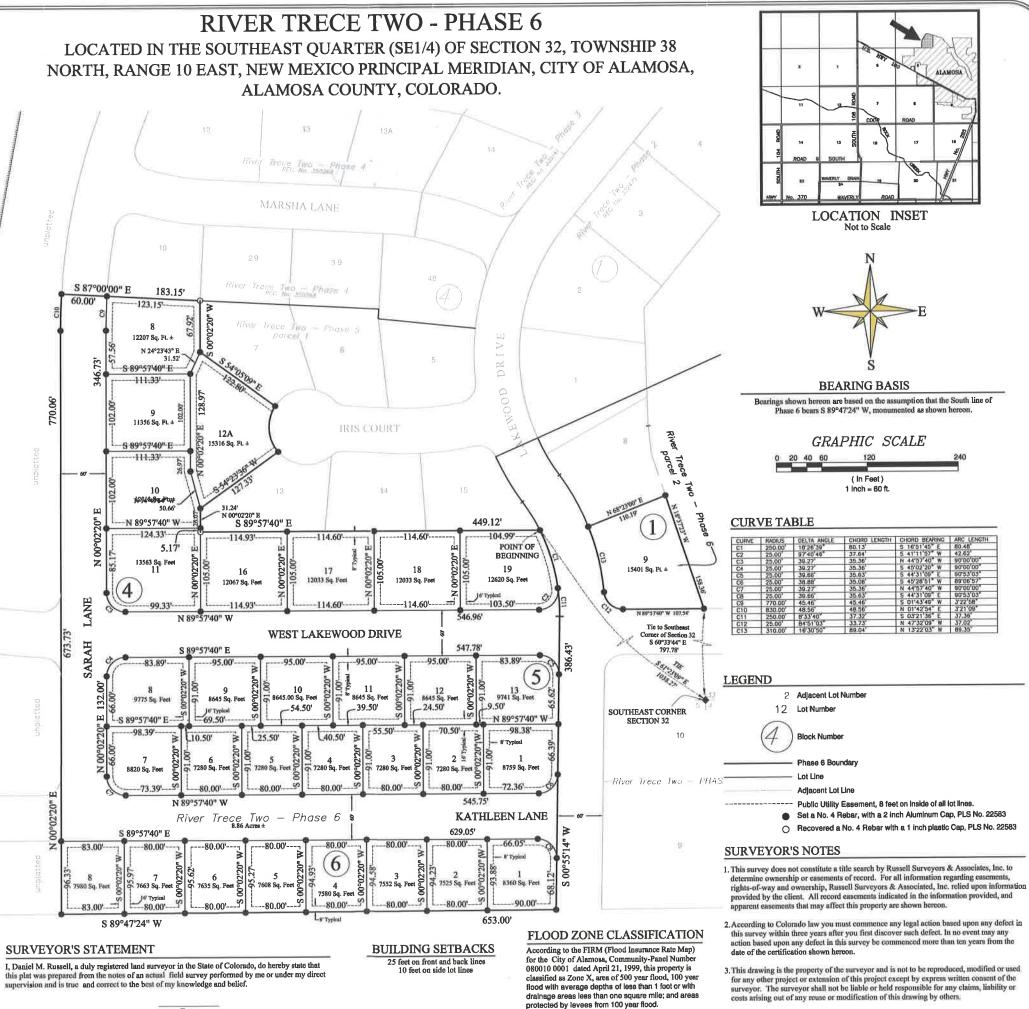

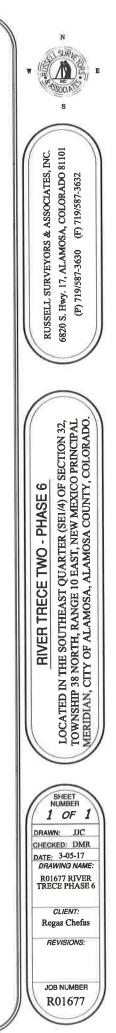

Subject/Title:

Request of Kolorado Creative Clouds Inc. and Main Copy Source LLC for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow the establishment of a private club for the purpose of marijuana consumption in a Commercial Business District.

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council deny the application as per the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Background:

Section 21-116 of the municipal code of the City of Alamosa provides for the review of those proposed uses that are not allowed in a specific zoning district by right, but not otherwise prohibited outright. This Permitted Use by Special Review process recognizes that although each zoning district is primarily intended for a predominant type of use (such as dwellings in residential districts), there are a number of uses which may or may not be appropriate in a particular district depending upon, for example, the location, nature of the proposed use, character of surrounding development, traffic capacities of adjacent streets, and potential environmental effects. These factors may dictate that the circumstances of development should be individually reviewed. It is the purpose of this article to provide review of such uses so that the community is assured that they are compatible with their locations and surrounding land uses and will further the purposes of this chapter. This process allows the Planning Commission and ultimately City Council to make a judgment call specific to certain uses in certain locations as to the degree of compatibility with surrounding land uses in the area of its proposed location and its consistency with the objectives and purposes of the City of Alamosa Zoning Code, Comprehensive Plan, and community desires. While not technically illegal because of the lack of sales on site and current state law, the unique nature of this use is undeniable; and it is the unique nature of the use and the fact that the use is not allowed by right that warrants the special review.

Section 21-118 further stipulates that no Special Review use application shall be approved unless the approving agency finds that the application is consistent with the objectives and purposes of this Chapter in Article I, and that the proposed use is designed to be compatible with surrounding land uses and the area of its location. Staff feels that the proposed use fails to meet either requirement for the following reasons:

Article I was adopted for the purpose of promoting a coordinated, harmonious development
of the municipality and its environs, which will, in accordance with present and future needs,
best promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare, as
well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, including among other things,
adequate provision for traffic; the promotion of safety from fire, floodwaters, and other
dangers; adequate provision for light and air; the promotion of healthful and convenient
distribution of population; the promotion of good civic design and arrangement; wise and
efficient expenditure of public funds; and the adequate provision of public utilities and other
public requirements. The proposed location of this use fails to best promote health, safety,
morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the community as required by
ordinance. Staff feels that this key commercial corridor and very visible location is not in the
best interest of the community, nor does it promote those goals as identified and promoted in

the recently adopted Comprehensive Plan.

- Article I also requires that the proposed use be designed to be compatible with surrounding land uses in the area of its location. Surrounding land uses include service, retail, indoor dining, professional service, and education. Staff feels that this use, a private club for the consumption of cannabis, lacks compatibility with surrounding land uses.
- Staff also has concerns specific to off street parking. The proposed location is part of an existing facility that will continue to house Main Copy Source as well as the proposed use. Our current off street parking ordinance will require a total of 15 parking spaces to accommodate the proposed aggregate use; the existing facility has a total of nine. The application identifies no means of complying with this ordinance. While the Planning Commission and staff were told by the applicant that arrangements had been made with the adjoining property owner for the cooperative use of their existing parking, it seems now that this was less than accurate. Staff was contacted the day after the public hearing and told in no uncertain terms that no arrangements had been made, to the contrary, their request to share parking was flatly denied and the property owner planned to immediately fence his parking lot should this application be approved.

Should Council choose to recommend approval of the application, staff would request that said recommendation be made with the following conditions:

- That the Special Use approval be valid only after the following deficiencies be addressed through the building permit and inspection process. The application states that one bathroom will be provided. Chapter 29 Section 2902 of the 2009 International Building Code requires a minimum of two bathrooms for the potential occupancy load of the facility, and again based on the potential occupancy load of the facility, and again based on the potential occupancy load of the facility, and again based on the potential occupancy load of the facility, and again based on the potential occupancy load of the facility, the two uses in the building will require a 1 hour fire separation wall if the building is sprinkled, or two hour fire separation wall if the building is not sprinkled as per Section 508 Table 508.4 of the 2009 International Building Code. It is not currently known if this type of wall exists.
- Secondly, that the applicant will make application for an expansion of an existing Permitted Use should they choose to begin smoking after potential changes in legislation later this year, or at any time in the future as this may very well require significant HVAC upgrades and documentation should they choose to allow smoking in the future to meet the requirements of the Indoor Air Pollution Act since it will share a common wall with an existing public business.
- Finally, that Applicant provide written documentation of any arrangement to satisfy the parking deficiencies noted above.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to deny the application as per the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission?

Alternatives:

Council may deny the application, approve the application with or without conditions, or refer the matter back to the Planning Commission with further instructions.

Fiscal Impact:

No significant fiscal impact is anticipated.

Legal Opinion:

City Attorney will be present for comment.

Conclusion:

Public comment was overwhelmingly in opposition to this request. Public hearing minutes have been included in your packet for review and consideration.

Club

An organization composed of people who voluntarily meet on a regular basis for a mutual purpose other than educational, religious, charitable, or financial pursuits. A club is any kind of group that has members who meet for a social, literary, or political purpose, such as health clubs, country clubs, book clubs, and women's associations. The term club is not a legal term per se, but a group that organizes itself as a club must comply with any laws governing its organization and otherwise be cognizant of the legal ramifications in undertaking to organize itself in this manner.

Various types of clubs exist. An *incorporated members' club* is composed of a group of individuals who each contribute to the club's funds, which are used to pay the expenses of conducting the society. An *unincorporated proprietary club* is one whose proprietor owns the property and funds and conducts the club to attempt to make a profit. The members are entitled to use the premises and property in exchange for the payment of entrance fees and subscriptions to the proprietor as well as any additional rights and privileges provided in their contractual agreement.

An incorporated club is generally governed by state statute. Many statutes provide for the incorporation of clubs, and the statutory requirements must be strictly observed. A statute may require that an application for incorporation state the purposes of the club in a definitive manner to help the court determine whether the objective of the club is legal. In addition, the application should state the manner in which club revenues are to be provided and the basis upon which an individual may become a member of the club.

A club's certificate of incorporation should indicate pecuniary means (i.e., funds, money, property), describe the objective of the club, and specify a place of business or office. If a club is unincorporated, the rules that govern associations apply.

Voluntary clubs are not partnerships, since the members do not join them for profit-making purposes and, unlike partners, are not responsible for the acts of each other. If a club's members do unite for a commercial venture, however, this association would constitute a partnership. In such cases, a club might be required to comply with state law governing partnerships.

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The purpose and objective of a club must be in compliance **Whoteslavoard** in the best interests of the community, whether a club is incorporated or not. An application for a club charter will be denied if the proposed bylaws provide for illegal methods of management. Teacher Student Translator Other

The Court emphasized the fact that significant commerce occurs at most of the clubs and that "business deals are often made and personal contacts valuable for business purposes, employment and professional advancement are formed." Such characteristics, according to the Court, are significant in determining the nonprivate nature of clubs. The law upheld by the Court in this case narrowed the definition of a private club in order to remedy a situation deemed inappropriate by a legislative body.

Boy Scouts of America The Supreme Court clarified its position on the reach of civil rights laws in *Boys Scouts of America v. Dale*, 530 U.S. 640, 120 S.Ct. 2446, 147 L.Ed.2d 554 (2000). The Court, in a 5–4 decision, held that forcing the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) to accept gay troop leaders would violate its rights of free expression and free association under the First Amendment. The BSA is a private association and therefore was not subject to state and federal public accommodation laws.

The Supreme Court tied this ruling to its previous decision in *Hurley v. Irish-American Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Group of Boston*, 515 U.S. 557, 115 S.Ct. 2338, 132 L.Ed.2d 487 (1995). In *Hurley*, the Court ruled that the sponsor of Boston's St. Patrick's Day parade could not be forced to let a group of gays and lesbians participate. The Court held that parades are a form of expression and that the sponsors could not be forced to include "a group imparting a message the organizers do not wish to convey."

Public Opinion

Despite the fact that private clubs may be exempt from civil rights laws, they are still subject to the power of public opinion. In 2002, the National Council of Women's Organizations (NCWO), which has approximately six million members from over one hundred groups, announced that it would seek the admittance of women members to the Augusta National Golf Club in Augusta, Georgia. The club, with a membership of three hundred, is the home of the prestigious Masters Golf Tournament. When NCWO stated that it would contact television sponsors of the Masters to seek their help in applying pressure, the club announced it would forgo advertising revenue for the 2003 tournament. The controversy generated friction within the membership, with some members urging the admittance of women and some resigning in protest at the club's actions in dealing with the demands of NCWO. The NCWO pressed the CBS network not to televise the 2003 tournament but was rebuffed by the network. However, many corporations declined to sponsor the tournament, a sure indication that the NCWO campaign had some success.

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Private marijuana clubs pass first test before Colorado legislature

Colorado lawmakers moved forward on a bill Wednesday that paves the way for private marijuana clubs to open shop, as politicians from both sides of the aisle look to broaden the state's billion-dollar cannabis industry. Senate Bill 184 would allow local governments within Colorado to authorize the operation of private marijuana clubs for adults. It passed the chamber's Business, Labor and Technology Committee with bipartisan support Wednesday following a 5-2 vote, sending it to the Senate floor for further consideration.

Colorado legalized marijuana for recreational purposes in 2012 and opened the nation's first non-medical pot shops at the start of 2014. Despite marijuana being commercially available across the state, however, it's currently illegal to consume marijuana in public, including places the state calls "indoor-but-public" locations, such as bars and restaurants.

Passage of S.B. 184 wouldn't roll back those certain restrictions, but it would enable any county, city or municipality within Colorado to adopt ordinances allowing for the operation of private marijuana clubs — "a membership-based club not accessible to the general public that operates to allow members to consume retail or medical marijuana on the premises," according to the proposal's language.

Authorized clubs would be prohibited from selling alcohol, food or pot to its patrons, and customers would be barred from using clubs to conduct deals of their own. With Colorado's cannabis industry having sold roughly \$1.3 billion in legal weed during 2016, however, widening the availability of legal smoking spots could likely further boost the profits of medical and recreational dispensaries, as well as any entrepreneurs who start selling memberships to their private pot clubs if and when S.B. 184 is approved and implemented.

"We're legal, and we need a place for people to go. We need social clubs," Ashley Weber of Colorado NORML, a marijuana-legalization advocacy group, told The Associated Press.

One of two dissenting votes cast during Wednesday's hearing came courtesy of State Sen. Tim Neville, Littleton Republican, who said lawmakers should instead back a broader proposal, Senate Bill 63, which would have authorized marijuana clubs with fewer restrictions. That bill failed Wednesday following a 6-1 vote.

Lawmakers looked toward another bill Wednesday that would allow dispensaries to deliver marijuana, Senate Bill 192, but delayed casting a vote, the Colorado Springs Gazette reported.

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Cannabis clubs get their day at the Capitol

This could be the year that state lawmakers finally clear the air over pot clubs. Coloradans voted to "regulate marijuana like alcohol" in 2012, but five years later, the actual regulatory landscape tells a different story. Unlike imbibling alcohol, you can only consume marijuana in a private residence — which makes partaking in our state's specialty vice (and paying taxes on it), trickier for tourists, renters and all those who can't light up at home.

A bill currently under consideration in the state legislature would add a much-needed legal alternative: private consumption clubs; if you follow this column, you know just how much flak such clubs have received from Colorado Springs City Councilors who saw the proliferation of clubs as flouting their 2013 vote to opt out of recreational sales.

Club owners have all but begged for regulation, arguing they provide a valuable service and are willing to play by the rules, if such rules existed. Nevertheless, council voted to ban all new clubs last year. They offered existing clubs a temporary license, but the businesses are still required to close in eight years.

Denver voters expressed desite for social marijuana use in November, passing initiative 100 which creates a permit for non-implicanta businesses to allow consumption on-site. The clubs, which can't also hold a liquor license, are required to get neighborhood approval and keep weed out of sight.) As implementation of that local measure begins to take shape, lawmakers at the Capitol are working to create a legal framework for licensing clubs in cities that choose to allow them.

Seniate full 63, sponsored by Sen. Vicki Marble, R-Fort Collins, and Rep. Jovan Melton, D-Aurora, would create a marijuana consumption club license that lets its operator sell retail or medical marijuana to patrons 21 or older to consume on-site. Patrons would not be able to bring their own product or take any product home. Clubs would have to either source product from a licensed marijuana business or get a cultivation license to grow their own. Local jurisdictions could decide whether or not to allow the clubs.

The bill has been assigned to the Business, Labor and Technology committee where It's tentatively scheduled to be heard on Feb. 22.

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DENVER — At risk of raising the ire of the White House, Colorado is on the brink of becoming the first state with licensed pot clubs. But the details of how these clubs will operate are as hazy as the underground clubs operating already.

Denver officials are working on regulations to open a one-year pilot of bring-your-own marijuana clubs, while state lawmakers are expected to consider measures to allow either marijuana "tasting rooms" run by marijuana dispensaries, or smoke-friendly clubs akin to cigar bars.

Alaska regulators, spooked by how the Trump administration might view marijuana, recently decided not to move forward with rules for use of marijuana at authorized stores, though the issue there isn't dead.

California and Maine voters expressly signed off on public marijuana consumption, but haven't settled on rules. That means Colorado may be first out of the gate with statewide pot-club regulations, possibly by this summer.

Colorado officials from both parties have come around to the idea of Amsterdam–style pot clubs for a simple reason. Everyone is tired of seeing pot smokers on public sidewalks.

"It's a problem we've got to address," said state Sen. Chris Holbert, a suburban Denver Republican who opposed marijuana legalization but doesn't like seeing its use on the sidewalk, either.

Pointing jokingly to his suit and tie, the grey-haired Holbert said he's even had panhandlers ask him for marijuana near the state capitol.

"I mean, look at me. If I'm getting hassled, everyone's getting hassled," Holbert told reporters.

Democrats here agree that tourists need an out-of-sight place to use marijuana.

"No voter in Colorado voted to allow the use of marijuana on their sidewalk, in their parks, in their public view," said state Rep. Dan Pabon, D-Denver. "But that's essentially what we've done by not allowing private club space for marijuana uses."

So both parties seem to agree that Colorado needs to allow for places that let patrons smoke weed. But that's where agreement breaks down.

A Republican–sponsored measure to allow marijuana clubs to be regulated like cigar bars was put on hold for a re–write. That's because sponsors are trying to address concerns that pot clubs shouldn't allow medical marijuana use, along with other legal wrinkles.

"Telling people to socially use their medicine? That's like we're legalizing pill parties," said Rachel O'Bryan, who opposes marijuana clubs and ran an unsuccessful campaign to defeat a Denver social–use measure last fall.

There's also intense disagreement over whether establishing pot clubs would invite a federal crackdown.

Some say the clubs would be too much for federal authorities to ignore; others insist the Justice Department would view clubs as a way to keep pot away from children, a priority according to previous Justice Department directions.

"Jeff Sessions is the big question mark right now," Democratic state Rep. Jonathan Singer said, referring to the newly minted, anti–marijuana U.S. attorney general. "I think we need to send a message to him that Colorado's doing it right."

Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper, a Democrat who opposed pot legalization but is undecided on signing a bill to allow clubs, said he's not sure how the administration would respond to clubs.

"I don't know whether we'd be inviting federal intervention, but certainly that's one argument I've heard used persuasively," Hickenlooper said Thursday.

The governor did indicate he'd veto a bill that allowed indoor smoking, not just smoking on enclosed private patios. The Denver clubs would have to abide by clean-air laws banning burned marijuana inside; the statewide proposal would allow indoor smoking with "proper ventilation."

"We spent a long time letting everyone know that smoking is bad for you," Hickenlooper said. "Just cause that smoke makes you happy, and dumb, doesn't mean it's good for you."

The marijuana industry seems frustrated by Colorado's halting attempts to figure out how to allow pot clubs. Because current marijuana law is vague, Colorado currently has a patchwork of underground clubs, many of them raided when they try to file permits or pay taxes.

"The situation right now is a disaster," said Chris Jetter, a licensed marijuana grower who owned a west Denver pot club that was raided twice. Jetter said authorities took more than six pounds of marijuana, along with tens of thousands in cash, then charged him with illegally distributing pot.

(Jetter eventually pleaded guilty to public consumption of marijuana, and was fined \$100. He disputes he was doing anything illegal and says he pleaded guilty to end the matter. He has since closed his club.)

"Two or more people can get together and consume alcohol almost anywhere, and there's no problem with that," Jetter said. "But we're not treating marijuana like alcohol. What's going to happen with the feds? If they start kicking in doors, I don't know. But we need to figure something out."

Colorado's Senate Business, Labor and Technology Committee has given approval to legislation allowing for the operation of private marijuana clubs.



Senate Bill 184 was passed with a bipartisan 5 to 2 vote, sending it towards a vote by the full Senate. The measure "authorizes the operation of a private marijuana club" If the "local jurisdiction has authorized clubs". Under the proposed law, marijuana clubs would be defined as " a membership-based club not accessible to the general public that operates to allow members to consume retail or medical marijuana on the premises".

According to the measure's summary, below are a list of rules that such clubs must follow in order to be operating within state law:

- · All members and employees of the club must be 21 years of age or older;
- A club owner must be a resident of Colorado for at least 2 years prior to owning the club;
- · The club's employees must be Colorado residents;
- The club cannot sell or serve alcohol or food;
- A club owner shall not sell marijuana on the premises [everyone must bring their own]; and
- A club owner shall not permit the sale or exchange of marijuana for remuneration on the premises.

101 CONCERNING LICENSING MARIJUANA CONSUMPTION CLUBS.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. If this bill passes third reading in the house of introduction, a bill summary that applies to the reengrossed version of this bill will be available at http://leg.colorado.gov/.)

The bill creates a marijuana consumption club (club) license. The license is subject to the same licensing requirements as other retail marijuana licenses. The license may be issued to a person who operates an establishment where retail or medical marijuana may be sold and consumed. The club's sales are limited to the same limits as a retail marijuana store or a medical marijuana center. The club may not serve food prepared on site or alcohol. Entry to the club is restricted to those persons at least 21 years of age. A club shall purchase its marijuana,

Shading denotes HOUSE amendment. <u>Double underlining denotes SENATE amendment</u>. Capital letters indicate new material to be added to existing statute. Dashes through the words indicate deletions from existing statute. marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products from a licensed marijuana business or get a cultivation license and sell its own marijuana. A club may not permit outside marijuana, marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products. All marijuana, marijuana concentrate, or marijuana products must be consumed or disposed of on site. A club and its employees shall successfully complete a responsible vendor program annually. A club has the same immunity to a lawsuit for an injury caused by a club patron that a bar enjoys.

The bill allows a local government to permit clubs in its jurisdiction. If a local government permits clubs, it may require the clubs to be licensed. In order to operate as a club, the club must comply with the local and state licensing regulations. A club is exempt from the "Colorado Clean Indoor Air Act" for marijuana consumption purposes if it is fully ventilated. Public display, consumption, or use in a club is not a criminal offense.

1 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:

SECTION 1. In Colorado Revised Statutes, add 12-43.4-313 as
follows:

12-43.4-313. 4 Local authority to regulate marijuana 5 consumption clubs. You are 114 times more likely to die from overdosing on alchohol than you are from cannabis, a recent study has found.

The report, published in Scientific Reports journal, compared the risks associated with 10 substances using the margin of exposure approach. This method compares a lethal dose of the drug with the dosage typically taken by recreational users. Substances tested included alcohol and nicotine, as well as illicit drugs including cocaine, heroin, ecstasy (MDMA) and methamphetamines.

It found that the mortality risk to individuals posed by cannabis was <u>approximately 114 times</u> less than that of alcohol. In fact, cannabis was the only substance to be classified as 'low risk'. In contrast, alcohol posed the highest risk to individuals and was ranked alongside nicotine, cocaine and heroin as 'high risk'.

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In terms of risk posed to a population, alcohol was the only substance classified as 'high risk'. However, the researchers noted that this was partly due to its wide availability and a lack of data on other illicit drugs.

The report said that many European governments adopted restrictive policies towards cannabis and other illicit drugs due to the perception that they are more harmful than alcohol and tobacco. "Specifically, the results confirm that the risk of cannabis may have been overestimated in the past," the report said. "In contrast, the risk of alcohol may have been commonly underestimated."

Professor David Nutt, chair of neuropsychopharmacology at Imperial College London and former chair of the Advisory Council on the Misuse of Drugs, said: "The results make perfect sense. The ultra-low mortality of cannabis has long been recognised with health harms greatly exaggerated. I would recommend that cannabis be reinstated as a medicine as recognised by the House of Lords report in 2001, as the clear harms are well outweighed by the health benefits."

The study concluded by suggesting that alcohol and tobacco should be prioritised in terms of risk management. It also suggested that governments legalise and regulate the distribution and use of cannabis, as opposed to the widespread current practice of prohibition.

However, the report cautioned that regular use of hard drugs was not safer than moderate drinking due to the environmental hazards associated with these drugs, such as dirty needles.

The Washington Post pointed out that the study merely reaffirmed drug-safety rankings developed in the past decade. However, the timing of the study's publication was rather apt as today Alaska became the third U.S. state to legalise recreational use of marijuana.

Despite widespread decriminalisation, cannabis is still classed as illegal in most European countries. <u>Even in the Netherlands</u>, famous for its liberal stance towards the drug, cannabis can only be purchased from licensed coffee shops. In 2001, Portugal decriminalised all drugs meaning that certain cases of personal use would not lead to prosecution.

Travis: Thank you. Is there someone here to speak for this request? Please come to the podium and state your name and address for the record.

Atencio: My name is Rosanna Atencio, Antonito, CO. I am here as a representative of Colorado Creative Clouds for a permitted use for cannabis consumption club. I know that sparks everyone's attention right away. As this gentleman pointed out it is legal in the State of Colorado and is allowed. Here in the San Luis Valley it is proving to be something that is generating revenue and tourism, promoting the San Luis Valley. People are coming here for that destination. We would like to offer a place that is safe if it is allowed and it would be a "bring your own" consumption club, sales is not an area of profit at all. The location that we are looking at now is what I think it would be a great location and encourage foot traffic and a shuttle service being part of a safe way to use cannabis. Here in the valley we have medical for purchase or recreational. There are a lot of rules and regulations the State put down that do not allow consumption on college campuses, rental properties, housing units; we definitely don't want use in parks or on the streets. This would give them a safe place in Alamosa to use cannabis. I myself am quite impressed, I have seen the new downtown with the patrons some recreational, some medical, musicians, artists, people who love the outdoors, hikers. Number one in our agenda is keeping it away from children. When you have tourists here and people from all over the valley coming to Wal Mart to shop, they will have a safe place to consume cannabis. College students could walk over. What we received from the City regarding the permitted use, we are here to answer any questions you have.

Travis: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak for this request? Please come to the podium and state your name and address for the record.

Avila: Hello, my name is Daniel Avila, 124 11th St., Alamosa. I support this just with the whole revenue it can bring into Alamosa and get it off the streets and out of the public parks where it is not legal to use. I support a legal place where they are safe and people can come here in a safe and controlled environment. People that want to smoke cannabis legally can do it at this place. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you, is there anyone else that would like to speak for this request? Is there anyone against this proposal?

Wiley: I'm Terry Wiley, 4997 South County Rd. but I have a business here in town. I look at the city vision and it being family friendly and don't think a business that has a shuttle service to take your clientele away as family friendly because they have been consuming marijuana products. This is not what I view as a family friendly business. What happens to the waste from the operations, will there be bouncers, is there liability insurance for the patrons if they end up in a bad trip, emergency room a visit, who is going to support the costs? We do have a bill in the Senate and the lobbies for the clubs and passed the senate but not the house. I think the City should not be hasty at all, see what happens with the state laws in the near future. Travis. Thank you.

Atencio: Can I add to that? The State has passed it into the House and they have seen it and amended it so it can be passed.

Travis: Anyone else that would like to speak against this?

Sowards: Martin Sowards, 5664 County Rd. 6 S., however I have a business at 77 Adcock Dr. known as Rock Creek Family Medicine. Thank you for letting us speak. Working in health care, I think we have enough addiction in this world already; we don't need to promote anymore. If you look at the City of Alamosa I personally don't think we want this. I know it is legal. If they want to come to the City and smoke marijuana, they can stay in the county, stay at home. I don't want them in the City. I see plenty of addiction in my office I don't see how it helps Alamosa at all; I don't think it has a place for us. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you, anyone else?

Lavier: Andy Lavier, 815 3rd St. Alamosa. I agree with Dr. Wiley and Dr. Sowards. This isn't what I want Alamosa to be known for. I don't want it to be a draw for Alamosa. I look around this room what is represented on the walls, we should be known for the railroads, sandhill cranes, wildlife, those are draws for our community and town. I think cannabis stores are an eyesore. This is right off Main St. and it's not what I want Alamosa to be known for. I work with youth and there is a marked rise in young people using marijuana having it on them. I live in Alamosa and would prefer they keep it in the county.

Travis: Thank you. Anyone else?

Bacon: My name is Sheryl Bacon; I work as a nurse practitioner. I work at SLV Regional Hospital taking care of sick patients; I live at 2903 Sarah Lane, Alamosa. A couple points I find challenging is when this first passed, people could use it in the privacy of their own home. This a bit different focus. I understand as was brought up by the last person who spoke that people come here who want to camp and fish, how is this family friendly if you leave your kids somewhere and go to a club to smoke marijuana? As a medical provider, I agree with Dr. Sowards, I actually take care of his patients when they are in the hospital and Valley Wide's and San Luis Health System and we see a tremendous amount of addiction. What I have seen personally when I work and I work seven days in a row and seven days off taking care of patients as a health provider and work 3-6 days a week in Conejos Hospital and one of the common themes we see is we've drawn a lot of people here from out of state to grow and use marijuana, they have existing health challenges and don't belong at altitude. It really is a burden to our hospitals with the insurance situation and people who come here not to be employed but to grow marijuana which I respect their right to do. If you are looking at this as a revenue source for the City it probably is but if it causes children to be left unattended while they are using marijuana and its right here in the middle of Main St. - I don't want to walk down the street with my grandchildren, my children don't live here, where they will see it, smell it, I truly don't. I feel that what people do in their home is their business, the county vs. the city limits I really don't know those details, and I'm not civically active as far as that goes. We need to look at the effect of people use it, grow it and really look at it in a balanced equation. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you. Please step forward.

Hobbs: Shanna Hobbs, I live in Alamosa County. I'm a little ambivalent about a cannabis consumption club just because there is potential for problems. But the fact of it is they have applied for a legal business. If you don't like marijuana don't use it. If you don't agree with it, then don't promote it. The point is these people have a right to open a business just like Jess Caton does, like Wiley does, just like doctors do and most of the addictions you are treating started from doctors writing prescriptions for pills that don't work that lost their efficacy over time and people turn to more natural products, St. John's wort for depression, to cannabis for pain, PTSD, I see people every day from the entire continuum- for those who use it recreationally or for people that they need it for pain. My position is people need to alleviate suffering no matter how they do it and shouldn't be left to others to decide and furthermore you're assuming that families coming here and leaving kids in the motels. They can stop in Walsenburg or Ft. Garland and buy their products there and come here and there is no place to consume. It makes sense to have a legal place to use it whether from here or out of the valley. Suggestions I would have is to have a third party to check they are bringing their own product and not potentially black market or from other patrons.

Travis: This isn't a debate. It is about the location for this type of business.

Bervig: You're talking to the Planning Commission, it is our business.

Hobbs: I apologize I'm talking about some of the people that are not going to patronize this type of business, the location can have discreet signage and that is not allowed. Let people take that step and instead in a legal direction and not in cars and parks where it is illegal. Thank you.

Bervig: Aren't you the lady circulating the petition to get marijuana on the ballot for the City?

Hobbs: I am. So people have safe access instead of the black market.

Travis: Please step forward.

Sowards: Hello, my name is Lorna Sowards, 4665 County Rd. S., we have business at 77 Adcock Dr. I believe that first and foremost this being a special use permit so originally whoever drew up the plans for the City thought this wouldn't be something the city would want to

entertain. So I would like you to think about that. If you look on the City's webpage it shows "Gateway to the Sand Dunes" not "gateway to the gateway drug" that marijuana is known as. I'm really concerned about it being in town, I'm really concerned about it across the street from Trinidad State Junior College because more than half of the students there are not legal to consume marijuana. You're putting a temptation for those students when there main goal is to be educated in a good manner and not a worldly manner. As a parent of college students, I would have a really hard time sending my child to TSJC knowing this establishment is across the street. I don't know what the effects of income lost from TSJC due to parents not sending their child there if parents saw this establishment across the street you would be losing money all around. I do believe in free enterprise, but this marijuana club special use permit should not be allowed in the City of Alamosa. Thank you.

Travis: Thank you.

Sheryl Bacon approached the commission again with the following comments.

Bacon: I really didn't know this was about the location and if I came across as being totally against marijuana I am not. It does have medicinal uses and I do prescribe it for patients in a controlled environment. One of the things we tell them is if they are to use it at home to make sure children cannot get ahold of it. If you look at pediatric medicine emergency room visits, marijuana is a big issue. We have to think of the location and as Ms. Sowards stated and police needs and the real idea here is the location and special permit and makes it safer or better, you can't contain the smoke it would disseminate to other buildings you might need to consider special ventilation and location is important. I think I'll stop there.

Martinez: My name is Robert Martinez, representing TSJC, 1011 Main St., our issue is the proximity to the college. We rely heavily on Title 4 Federal funds to operate the college, that's financial aid and part of the regulations is we have drug and alcohol prevention programs on our campus and we are trying to promote drug and alcohol awareness. This type of business would deter from that. Our stand would be the same if it was a bar that was proposed at this location. We are trying to promote economic development and all for people to open a business but the proximity to the campus is our issue. I know K-12 has a 1,000 ft. barrier and I would like you to consider this as you look at this location.

Travis: Thank you. Anybody else that would like to speak? Thank you, we will close the public hearing. Are there questions, comments, concerns from the commission?

The public hearing closed at 6:42 p.m.

Adcock: I have a lot. (to Ms. Atencio) Can you come back up please and answer some question for us? Smell and odor; what kind of walls separate this from the copy store?

Atencio: It is just a separation wall. It is not going to be smoked, it will be vaporized. It is not smoked or burned. It would be a vape pens and that eliminates that smell. It would not be burned like a cigarette. It wouldn't stick to your clothes. We use CMF fans with the carbon filters. That would be inside the club.

Bervig: A couple questions I have. According to Section 21-116 of the municipal code the City provides for the review of those proposed uses that are not allowed in a specific zoning district by right, but not prohibited outright. This Permitted Use by Special Review process recognizes that although each zoning district is primarily intended for a predominant type of use (such as dwellings in residential districts) there are a number of uses which may or may not be appropriate in a particular district upon, for example the location, nature of the proposed use, character of surrounding development, traffic capacities of adjacent streets, and potential environmental effects. Nobody has answered those questions. These factors may dictate that the circumstances of development should be individually reviewed.

This process allows the Planning Commission to make a judgment call specific to certain use in certain locations as to the degree of compatibility with surrounding land uses in the area of its proposed location and its consistency with the objectives and purposes of the City of Alamosa Zoning Code and Comprehensive Plan. While not technically illegal because of the lack of sales on site and current state law, the unique nature of this use is undeniable; and it is the unique nature of the use and the fact that the use is not allowed by right that warrants the special review.

About two months ago in the Valley Courier there was an article and the doctor in the article was adamant about the effects of smoking marijuana and what it does to people forever and ever. We don't need to finance our City and I have been involved in City government for many years, by selling something that is harmful to people's health.

Atencio: And that is one article. I am also in the medical field and have actually practiced with some of the people in this room and here in Alamosa, I do Cat scans, x-rays and ultrasounds and with imaging and benefits of marijuana are undeniable.

Bervig: I've been to the emergency room with my wife with asthma and of 15 beds, 14 were taken by marijuana users. I complained to the nurse and she said we have to take care of those people just like the rest.

Travis: This isn't a debate; are there any more questions from the Commission?

Bervig: The proposed location of this use fails to best promote health, safety, morals, order, convenience, prosperity, and general welfare of the community as required by ordinance. Our staff feels that this downtown and very visible location is not in the best interest of the community. Our Public Works Director recommends that it be denied. There is one bathroom and it requires two; and it requires with two uses in the building, a 1 hour separation wall if the building is sprinkled or two hour if it is not is required. What will happen down the road and what Council will say, but let me state that I am 100% against what you want to do.

Atencio: It is quite obvious. At this point there is only one restroom and being we are at a special review and through the moratorium and being unsure of what class are we in. We would want to ask for a variance or a waiver with the moratorium in effect. We are here to ask these questions.

Adcock Also the parking - you have nine spaces and are required fifteen.

Atencio: Yes and businesses in the area when they have normal business hours we have got permission from business owners and could use those spaces. The shuttle service is not something required, it is something we offer as a safety measure and when they are ready to go home they are free to just like leaving an alcohol establishment. Adcock: The second bathroom you are willing to put in?

Atencio: Yes.

Adcock: From the paperwork you submitted, you are opened from 10:00 to 10:00 and those business are also opened during a good portion of that time. Parking could be a problem.

Atencio: We hope our patrons will use downtown parking as well and patronize the Farmer's Market, art galleries, businesses and would encourage that.

Adcock: You are required to have 15 spaces. The walls bother me; the fire wall seems very necessary to me. It is a very different use. Are you going to be carrying liability insurance?

Atencio: When they enter the club; they sign a private membership at their discretion. We do have a club in Antonito and we just our license got renewed. They are proud of what we have done to promote the town, restaurants, hotels and providing a safe, legal place. There is a \$300 fine if you are using marijuana in a car, park or on the streets. That is not what we want to do. The police stated there have been zero incidents in the almost year the club has been there.

Adcock: Pat, will this increase the amount of police surveillance?

Steenburg: I'm sure it would increase activity initially. I don't know how much, it would depend on how effective the management and business is run.

Adcock: You would be checking I.D.s?

Atencio: Absolutely. There would be secondary security if needed. The doorman would check I.D.s. If we need more help we will definitely be on board with that.

Travis: Thank you. Is there a motion?

M/S/C. Bervig, Adcock. Motion made to recommend denial of the request of Colorado Creative Clouds Inc. for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a private club (Use Group C-11) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is portions of Lots 14, 15 & 16, Bellview, Block 46, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 507 Bell Ave.

The recommendation will go to City Council on Wednesday, April 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter for final consideration.

Subject/Title:

Request of Regas Chefas and James Hsu for final plat approval for River Trece Two, Phase 6.

Recommended Action:

That Council conduct a public hearing and unless evidence to the contrary is presented at said public hearing, approve the final plat of River Trece 2 Phase 6 by approving Resolution No. _____ as per the unanimous recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Background:

This is a logical and expected extension of River Trece Two – Phase 5 and is in substantial compliance with the previous preliminary approval. This subdivision is compatible with existing development in the area and will provide needed vacant residential lots in this area of the city. A subdivision improvement agreement has yet to be executed but will be before the recordation of the final plat.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the final plat as presented?

Alternatives:

Council may approve the application as presented, approve with conditions, deny the application with or without further instruction to staff, or refer the application back to the Planning Commission with further instructions.

Fiscal Impact:

One implication of active development and construction is the impact of heavy truck traffic on local streets that may have not originally been built to a standard that would be expected of a current design. The continued and seemingly constant development in the area is beginning to have a detrimental impact on the existing local streets and staff is beginning to hear complaints specific thereto. The creation of the seven year plan for First Street has allowed the northeast part of Lakewood Drive to be improved this year, the schedule for the remainder of the streets, however, may have to be accelerated depending on how rapidly these final 29 lots build out.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be present for comment.

Conclusion:

This subdivision effectively closes out the preliminary plat approvals and public land dedications made years ago.

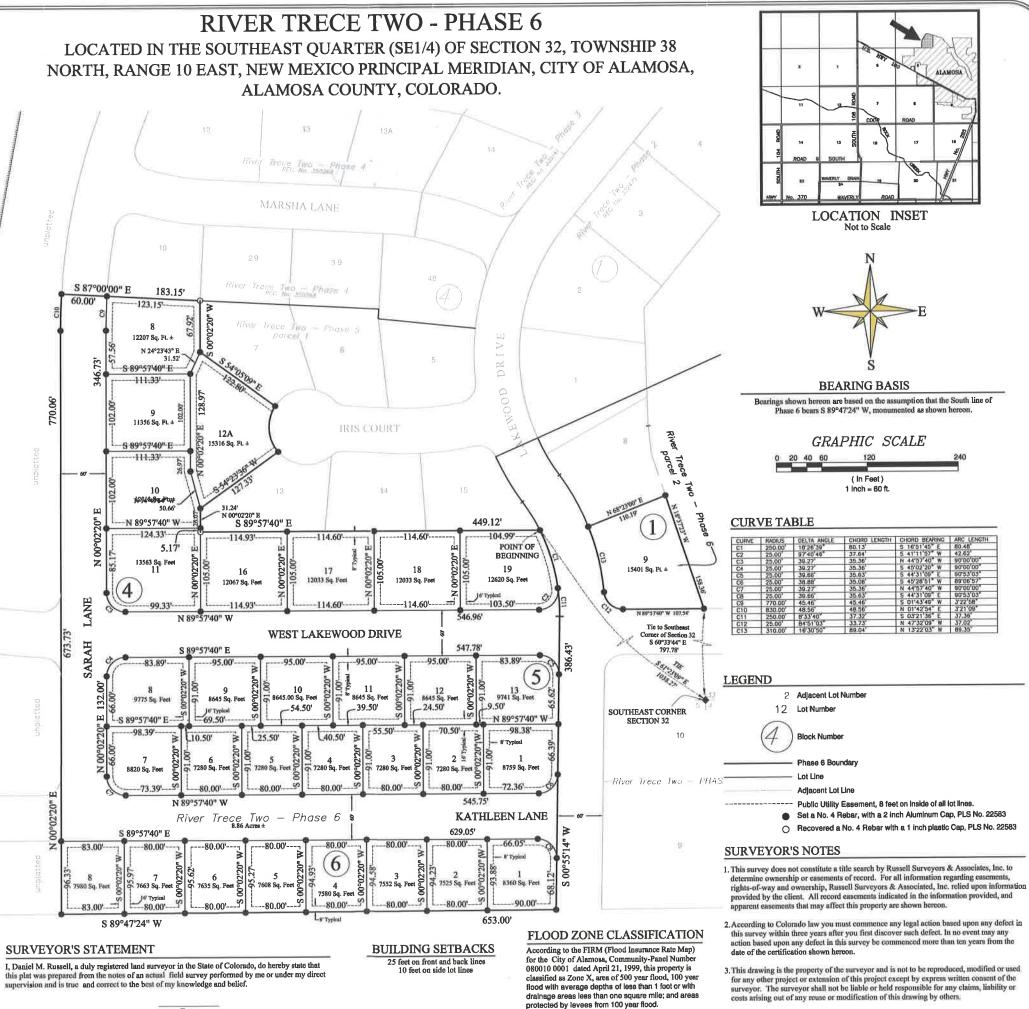

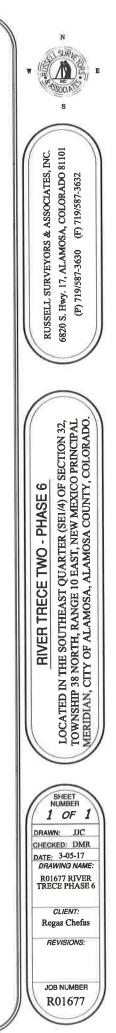

Subject/Title:

Award of Bid - 2017 Class A Fire Engine

Recommended Action:

That Council approve the purchase of a 2017 Pierce Fire Engine utilizing HGACbuy, a governmental purchasing consortium in the amount of \$430,217.

Background:

In 1996 the City purchased two Class A structural engines. The replacement of Engine 1 has been in the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for several years. Recognizing that due to the cost of new apparatus we recommended replacing the Engine with the most hours of use first and then we will recommend replacing Engine 2 in a few years in order to stager the purchases of fire apparatus. The approved CIP included \$450,000 for this purchase in 2017.

The Department formed a committee consisting of Captain Paul Duarte and five firefighters to develop specifications that would best serve the department. The following base criteria were set forth by the Department as absolutely necessary as the Apparatus will have a life expectancy of 25 to 30 years.

- 1. Service. Due to the complexity of the apparatus, service and support for repairing and maintaining the apparatus is essential.
- 2. Standardization of lighting equipment, pumps and valves to be compatible with our other apparatus.
- 3. Standardization of the pump operations.
- 4. Getting an adequate pump and foam system to help maintain our ISO Rating and provide sufficient foam flows for fire suppression.
- 5. Purchasing an apparatus which best meets the Department's present and expected future needs.

The committee looked at various manufacturers, with service being the top priority. Based off of past history with the Tower truck, a factory supported service center with the ability to provide mobile service with their employees and not utilizing a third party shop was an absolute must. Based off of the Service priority the committee narrowed possible vendors down to three with one of the three not offering mobile service. Pierce Mfg. has had a service facility and mobile service in the state since 1984. We do have a history with their apparatus as the City owns one and the District owns 5 of their apparatus. We currently use their services for most of our pump repair and testing.

Colorado does not have a State bid process for apparatus. We looked at Fire-Rescue GPO and HGACbuy both of which are Government to Government procurement services offering government contract pricing nationwide. HGACbuy is short for Houston-Galveston Area Consortium. HGACbuy solicits bids from manufacturers for governmental entities and publishes their base contract price which simplifies the bid process for local governments. Departments can then select a vendor from the published bid list and then add the options the Department needs to the truck to obtain the final pricing structure.

Base prices of the three manufacturers were as follows:

Rosenbauer ; \$ 396,400.00 E-One: \$ 392,477.00 Pierce Mfg.; \$ 360,092.00 Based off of the HGAC bid pricing, and service history, the Department contacted Pierce Mfg. for pricing of the apparatus with the Department's desired options.

The following major items were added or changed:

- The pump was changed from 1250 GPM to 1500 GPM
- A Large Capacity foam system was added
- Scene lighting was added
- Shelves and trays to hold equipment were added to the compartments
- Internal Ground Ladder Storage was added
- The water tank capacity was increased to 1000 gallons
- A Front Bumper Discharge was added
- Additional hose bed capacity was added.

The final price from Pierce Mfg was \$449,217 with a pre-payment discount of \$19,000 for full payment of the apparatus within 30 days of contract signing bringing the cost down to \$430,217. There will be a performance bond provided to protect the City's payment in the event problems should arise with the Manufacturer.

Delivery of the apparatus will be approximately 11 months as it is custom built to the Department's specifications.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to award the purchase contract to Pierce Mfg. utilizing the HGACbuy bid process?

Alternatives:

Council can award the bid or reject the bid and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

The amount budgeted for the apparatus in this year's budget is \$450,000. Utilizing HGAC and taking advantage of the pre-payment option, the truck is \$19,783 under budget. These funds will remain earmarked for future public safety capital expenditures.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be present for comment.

Subject/Title:

Public Hearing and Second Reading, Ordinance No. 9-2017, An ordinance extending the existing temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the city of Alamosa other than in mobile home parks through September 30, 2017

Recommended Action:

Conduct a Public Hearing and unless information is provided to the contrary, approve Ordinance No. 9-2017 extending existing temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the city of Alamosa other than in mobile home parks through September 30, 2017 on second reading.

Background:

On December 21, 2016 through enactment of Ordinance 21-2016, the City Council of the City of Alamosa established a temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the City through May 30, 2017, noting that the City was in the process of reviewing and revising its zoning code, part of which process is considering the appropriateness of manufactured housing within the City.

The process of reviewing the zoning code is ongoing, and it does not appear that the committee working on the code will have a recommendation for Council to consider and enact in advance of the expiration of the existing moratorium.

An extension of the moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks will allow City staff, the City Planning Commission, and City Council an opportunity to consider and develop regulations concerning the placement of such homes. Extending the moratorium through September 30, 2017, is a reasonable length of time to allow for the consideration and, if appropriate, development of such regulations. As a reminder, the moratorium does not affect placement of manufactured homes certified to meet the standards established by the municipal building code, nor in mobile home parks.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to extend the moratorium, which otherwise expires May 30, 2017, and additional four months, to September 30, 2017? At that time, the total length of the moratorium will have been nine months.

Alternatives:

1) Approve the ordinance on second reading.

2) Modify the ordinance before approval, for instance adjusting the length of the extension.

3) Decline to approve the ordinance on first reading, and give staff further direction, such as to develop a permanent moratorium for presentation to council.

Fiscal Impact: None.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be available at the meeting if necessary.

Conclusion:

This ordinance extends the temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured housing an additional four months to allow time for the ongoing process of amending the zoning code to take its course.

AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE EXISTING TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON THE PLACEMENT OF CERTAIN MANUFACTURED HOMES WITHIN THE CITY OF ALAMOSA OTHER THAN IN MOBILE HOME PARKS THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2017

WHEREAS, On December 21, 2016 through enactment of Ordinance 21-2016, the City Council of the City of Alamosa established a temporary moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes within the City through May 30, 2017, noting that the City was in the process of reviewing and revising its zoning code, part of which process is considering the appropriateness of manufactured housing within the City of Alamosa; and

WHEREAS, the process of reviewing the zoning code is ongoing, and it does not appear that the committee working on the code will have a recommendation for Council to consider and enact in advance of the expiration of the existing moratorium; and

WHEREAS, an extension of the moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks will allow City staff, the City Planning Commission, and City Council an opportunity to consider and develop regulations concerning the placement of such homes, and

WHEREAS, an extension of the moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks until September 30, 2017, is a reasonable length of time to allow for the consideration and, if appropriate, development of such regulations; and

WHEREAS, the moratorium will not affect placement of manufactured homes certified to meet the standards established by the municipal building code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado, as follows:

Section 1. Extension of Moratorium. The moratorium on the placement of manufactured homes within the City of Alamosa established by Ordinance 21-2016 is hereby extended through September 30, unless sooner lifted by action of Council or made moot by the adoption of regulations governing standards for such homes

Section 2. Staff Direction. City staff and the City Planning Commission shall investigate issues surrounding the placement of manufactured housing within the City of Alamosa and prepare a proposed ordinance concerning the standards applicable to manufactured homes for further consideration by the City Council during the moratorium period.

Section 3. General Repealer. All other acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with the sections adopted in this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 4. Recording and Authentication. This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.

Section 5. Publication and Effective Date. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.

Section 6. Declaration of Public Interest. This ordinance is necessary to preserve the peace, health, safety, welfare, and to serve the best interest of the citizens of the City of Alamosa, Colorado.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-2016

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON THE PLACEMENT OF CERTAIN MANUFACTURED HOMES WITHIN THE CITY OF ALAMOSA OTHER THAN IN MOBILE HOME PARKS THROUGH MAY 30, 2017

WHEREAS, Article XIV, Section 4 of the *Charter* of the City of Alamosa empowers the City Council to zone the City and to make appropriate regulations and restrictions concerning land uses within the City of Alamosa; and

WHEREAS, the City of Alamosa has received a small number of applications for the placement of manufactured homes that appear to be equivalent to some homes already existing in the City of Alamosa, but that do not have certifications from the manufacturer certifying compliance with the City's building code, in particular the International Residential Code, 2009 Edition, and the International Energy Conservation Code, 2009 Edition; and

WHEREAS, the Alamosa *Code of Ordinances* addresses "mobile homes" in Chapter 12, and prohibits them anywhere in the City other than in mobile home parks in Section 12-16, but nowhere defines a "mobile home;" and

WHEREAS, the term "mobile home" is often used interchangeably with the term "modular home" or "manufactured home" in common parlance; and

WHEREAS, Colorado Statute prohibits municipalities from having or enacting zoning regulations which exclude or have the effect of excluding manufactured homes from the municipality if such homes meet or exceed, on an equivalent performance engineering basis, standards established by the municipal building code. C.R.S. § 31-23-301(5)(b); and

WHEREAS, the *Code of Ordinances* does not provide guidelines or regulations for the standards to be applied for the placement of manufactured homes within the City of Alamosa other than in mobile home parks; and

WHEREAS, such guidelines or regulations would be helpful for governing the orderly processing of applications for placement of manufactured housing within the City of Alamosa in locations other than mobile home parks; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado, deems it to be in the best interest of its citizens that guidelines or regulations governing the placement of manufactured housing in locations other than mobile home parks be explored and developed; and

WHEREAS, the City is in the process of reviewing and revising its zoning code, and intends to consider the appropriateness of manufactured housing as part of that process; and

WHEREAS, a moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks will allow City staff, the City Planning Commission, and City Council an opportunity to consider and develop regulations concerning the placement of such homes, and

WHEREAS, a moratorium on the placement of certain manufactured homes in other than mobile home parks until May 30, 2017, is a reasonable length of time to allow for the consideration and, if appropriate, development of such regulations; and

WHEREAS, the moratorium will not affect placement of manufactured homes certified to meet the standards established by the municipal building code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado, as follows:

Section 1. Moratorium on the placement of manufactured homes within the City of Alamosa. A moratorium is hereby established through May 30, 2017, unless sooner lifted by action of Council or made moot by the adoption of regulations governing standards for such homes, on the placement of manufactured homes within the City of Alamosa unless the home meets one of the following criteria:

1) The Home is placed in a mobile home park in accordance with the City's regulations governing mobile homes, found in Chapter 12 of the Alamosa *Code of Ordinances*; OR

2) The home is certified by the manufacturer to meet or exceed, on an equivalent performance engineering basis, the standards set forth in the City's building code, in particular the International Residential Code, 2009 Edition, and the International Energy Conservation Code, 2009 Edition.

Section 2. Definitions: For purposes of this moratorium the following terms shall have the following definitions:

1) "Manufactured home" means any pre-constructed building unit or combination of pre-constructed building units that:

(a) Include electrical, mechanical, or plumbing services that are fabricated, formed, or assembled at a location other than the site of the completed home;

(b) Is designed for residential occupancy in either temporary or permanent locations;

(c) Is constructed in compliance with the federal act, factory-built residential requirements, or mobile home standards;

- (d) Does not have motor power; and
- (e) Is not licensed as a recreational vehicle.

2) "Equivalent performance engineering basis" means that by using engineering calculations or testing, following commonly accepted engineering practices, all components and subsystems will perform to meet health, safety, and functional requirements to the same extent as required for other single family housing units.

Section 3. Staff Direction. City staff and the City Planning Commission shall investigate issues surrounding the placement of manufactured housing within the City of Alamosa and prepare a proposed ordinance concerning the standards applicable to manufactured homes for further consideration by the City Council during the moratorium period.

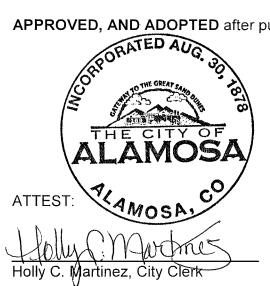

Section 2-17 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* directs the Council to meet on the first and third Wednesdays of every month, with allowance for changing the time and place of the meeting by resolution. There are times when Council knows that for varying reasons sufficient Councilors to defeat a quorum either will be excused from or otherwise unable to attend a regularly scheduled meeting, such as when the meeting date falls during the annual Colorado Municipal League conference, as has regularly occurred.

Council has in the past addressed such scheduling conflicts by rescheduling the meeting to be held concurrently with the next regular meeting, but such a practice is less than straightforward. Additionally, the ordinance currently provides for calling a special meeting upon one-hour's written notice, which is not a practice that comports with reasonable management of schedules, the Colorado Open Meetings Act, nor with Council's practice, and Council desires to make the process for calling special meetings provide for more adequate notice of such meetings. This Ordinance brings Section 2-17 into compliance with Council practice and the Open Meetings Act.

Alternatives:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC. 2-17 OF THE *CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ALAMOSA* TO CONFIRM THE ABILITY OF COUNCIL TO CANCEL MEETINGS AT WHICH THERE WILL NOT BE A QUORUM PRESENT AND INCREASING THE NOTICE REQUIRED FOR SPECIAL MEETINGS

WHEREAS, Section 2-17 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* directs the Council to meet on the first and third Wednesdays of every month, with allowance for changing the time and place of the meeting by resolution; and

WHEREAS, there are times when Council knows that for varying reasons sufficient Councilors to defeat a quorum either will be excused from or otherwise unable to attend a regularly scheduled meeting, such as when the meeting date falls during the annual Colorado Municipal League conference, as has regularly occurred; and

WHEREAS, Council has in the past addressed such scheduling conflicts by rescheduling the meeting to be held concurrently with the next regular meeting, but such a practice is less than straightforward; and

WHEREAS, Council desires make clear that Council may cancel meetings where it knows ahead of time that a quorum will not be available; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance currently provides for calling a special meeting upon one-hour's written notice, which is not a practice that comports with reasonable management of schedules, the Colorado Open Meetings Act, nor with Council's practice, and Council desires to make the process for calling special meetings provide for more adequate notice of such meetings;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of Alamosa as follows:

Section 1. <u>Repeal and Replacement of Chapter 2, ARTICLE II, Section 2-17(1).</u> Section 2-17(1) of The *Code of Ordinances of Alamosa, Colorado* is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

(1) *Rule 1: Meetings*. Two regular meetings of the city council shall be held during each month, such meetings to be held on the first and third Wednesdays of each month at the city hall at the hour of 7:00 p.m., provided that the city council may by resolution at any time change the time and place of any such meeting. The city council may by resolution cancel any regular meeting at which it knows beforehand that a quorum will not be present. The city council may set special meetings by motion at any meeting, and the mayor or any three members of the city council may call special meetings by written notice to each of the members of the city council, such notice to be e-mailed, with read receipt requested, served in person, or left at the usual place of business of each

member, if served during business hours, or at the residence of each member if not served during business hours, at least twenty-four hours in advance of the time set for such meeting. Before calling such special meeting, the person(s) calling the meeting shall attempt to coordinate scheduling with all council members. Any regular or special meeting may be adjourned by majority vote of those present to any other time or place.

Section 2. <u>Severability:</u> Should any section, clause, sentence, or part of this Ordinance be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect, impair or invalidate the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 3. <u>General Repealer</u>. All other acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with the sections adopted in this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 4. <u>Recording and Authentication</u>. This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.

Subject/Title:

Public Hearing and Second Reading, Ordinance 5-2017, an ordinance repealing and replacing chapter 3 of the *Alamosa Code of Ordinances*, governing animals, to introduce a spay, neuter, return program for feral cats, allow for burial of pets in yards, revise terms under which animal impoundments take place, and make other clarifying changes to the chapter

Recommended Action:

Conduct a public hearing and unless information is presented to the contrary, approve Ordinance 5-2017 on second reading.

Background:

Over the last several years, the City has received calls regarding the feral cat population. Beyond volunteer efforts, there has not been an organized approach for managing the cat population. In order to address the concerns of property owners and approach the reduction of the feral cat population in a humane way staff looked at the entire animal ordinance to determine how best to accomplish these goals. In doing so, other issues were brought to light. Accordingly, the proposed ordinance addresses those as well, and undertakes the following:

- 1. Add a section for feral cats, and allow impoundment of stray cats
- 2. Allow pet burial on owners property
- 3. Clear up questions about dealing with nuisance animals that we don't have shelter space for
- 4. Better align our ordinances on rabbits and poultry with the general animal ordinance
- 5. Remove the ability to allow the keeping of juvenile wild animals as pets
- 6. Make other housekeeping changes to clarify and streamline the ordinance.

During the Public Hearing held on March 15th, City Council received significant public input with recommendations for additional changes. Based on this input, City Council tabled the item to allow staff time to meet with the public to further refine the ordinance. A public meeting was held on April 3rd. Attached is the Final Ordinance, a redlined document to show the changes between first reading and Final, and a redlined document to show changes between existing ordinance and Final.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the ordinance on second reading?

Alternatives:

1) Approve the ordinance

2) Approve the ordinance with changes, such as to the provisions establishing the TNR program, allowing for yard burials, and removing the juvenile wildlife permitting provisions.

3) Decline to approve the ordinance in whole or in part, and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

Minimal. Staff proposes initially around \$2,000 per year to go towards the spay/neuter/vaccination

of feral cats.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be present for questions.

Conclusion:

This ordinance addresses the feral cat issue that have become of greater concern recently, and cleans up other issues with the animal section of our ordinances.

ORDINANCE NO. 5-2017

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTER 3 OF THE *ALAMOSA CODE OF ORDINANCES,* GOVERNING ANIMALS, TO INTRODUCE A SPAY, NEUTER, RETURN PROGRAM FOR FERAL CATS, ALLOW FOR BURIAL OF PETS IN YARDS, REVISE TERMS UNDER WHICH ANIMAL IMPOUNDMENTS TAKE PLACE, AND MAKE OTHER CLARIFYING CHANGES TO THE CHAPTER

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance governing animals, Chapter 3 of the *Alamosa Code of Ordinances*, makes it unlawful to harbor or feed more than 4 animals (poultry and rabbits excepted); and

WHEREAS, Over the last several years, the City has received calls regarding the feral cat population; and there have been established a number of feral cat colonies that are typically cared for by one or more individuals; and

WHEREAS, Beyond volunteer efforts, there has not been an organized approach for managing the cat population; and

WHEAREAS, the existing ordinance requires pets to be buried in a sanitary landfill, and common practice has been to otherwise dispose of pets, including burial in yards, which practice Council does not find to be detrimental to the health of the citizens of Alamosa so long as carried out consistent with depth requirements; and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance does not adequately address impoundment and disposition of nuisance animals; and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance sets up a system for permitting of the keeping of juvenile wild animals as pets, which Council finds has not been implemented, and is counter to the health and well-being of the citizens of Alamosa; and

WHEREAS, other sections of the existing ordinance require clarification and streamlining,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado:

Section 1. Chapter 3 of the *Alamosa Code of Ordinances* is hereby repealed and replaced in its entirety to read as follows:

Chapter 3 – ANIMALS

ARTICLE I. - IN GENERAL

Sec. 3-1. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Animal shall mean any live vertebrate creature, whether domestic or wild.

Animal control officer shall mean any person commissioned by the state, county or municipal government to perform duties under the laws, regulations or ordinances of the state, county or municipality pertaining to animals.

Animal shelter shall mean any facility operated by a humane society, governmental agency or its authorized agents for the purpose of impounding or caring for animals held under the authority of this chapter or state law. Any such facility shall provide proper and humane care for animals held in it.

At large shall mean the time when an animal is off or away from the premises of the owner, possessor or keeper thereof, and not under the control of such owner, possessor or keeper, or his agent or a member of his immediate family by a leash or lead capable of restraining the Animal. Animals tethered to a stationary object within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path are deemed to be at large.

Dwelling unit shall mean one (1) or more rooms designed for or occupied as a unit by one (1) family for living and cooking purposes.

Ear tipping shall mean straight-line cutting of the tip of the left ear of a cat while the cat is anesthetized.

Feral cat shall mean a free-roaming cat that is partially socialized or unsocialized to humans and tends to resist contact with humans.

Humane Destruction shall mean euthanasia administered by a qualified veterinarian or veterinary technician.

Nuisance shall mean any animal which:

- (1) Molests passersby or passing vehicles;
- (2) Attacks other animals;
- (3) Is at large in violation of Section 3-31 of this Code;
- (4) Damages private or public property;
- (5) Barks, whines, howls, or makes any other noise in a loud and persistent or habitual fashion so as to disturb any person or neighborhood;
- (6) Is diseased.

Owner shall mean any person, partnership or corporation in possession of, harboring, or who shall allow any animal to remain about their premises for a period of three (3) consecutive days or more, excluding sponsors of feral cats as addressed in this article. The person named on the registration record of any animal as the owner shall be deemed, prima facie, the owner thereof, but the term owner shall also include, but shall

not be limited to, the occupant of the premises where the animal is usually kept, if such premises are other than the premises of the owner as shown on the registration record; or any person having control or purporting to have control over any animal which is running at large. The parent or guardian of an owner under eighteen (18) years of age shall be deemed the owner, as defined in this section.

Potbelly pig shall mean a miniature porcine which shall not exceed eighteen (18) inches in height at the shoulder and one hundred fifteen (115) pounds in weight, and shall include, but not be limited to, the North American potbelly pig, the Vietnamese potbelly pig, and the Chinese potbelly pig.

Restraint shall mean securing an animal by a leash or lead so that it is under the physical control of a responsible person, or tethered to a stationary object not within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path, or keeping an animal within a fence or other enclosure which restrains the animal to a particular premises.

Stray cat shall mean a free-roaming domesticated cat that does not have a tag, electronic ID, or other means of identifying its owner.

Trap shall mean any device used to contain or capture an animal. There are two (2) types of traps:

- (1) *Humane trap* is a device designed to capture or contain an animal without causing any injury to the animal;
- (2) *Inhumane trap* is a device designed to capture or contain an animal which causes injury to the animal as the result of the trap's operation.

Trap, Neuter & Return (TNR) shall mean a non-lethal approach to feral cat population control where feral cats are humanely trapped, sterilized, vaccinated, ear-tipped, and then returned to the location where they were originally trapped

Veterinary hospital shall mean any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injuries of animals.

Vicious animal includes, but is not limited to, dogs and means:

- (1) Any animal with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury to, or otherwise threaten the safety of human beings or domestic animals; or
- (3) Any animal which, without provocation, attacks or bites, or has attacked or bitten, a human being or domestic animal; or
- (4) Any animal owned or harbored primarily or in part for the purpose of animal fighting or any animal trained for animal fighting.

Wild animal shall mean any live ferret, fox, leopard, lion, lynx, monkey (nonhuman primate), panther, poisonous snake, raccoon, skunk, tiger or any other warm-blooded animal which can normally be found in the wild state.

Sec. 3-2. - Declaration of city as wild bird refuge.

The area within the limits of the city is hereby made and constituted a bird sanctuary for the refuge of wild birds, and all persons are urged to protect the wild birds and encourage their propagation and refuge within such sanctuary.

Sec. 3-3. - Abuse of wild birds prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person at any time within the city to frighten, shoot at, wound, kill, capture, ensnare, net, trap or in any other manner to molest or injure any wild bird, or in any manner, to molest or injure the nest, eggs or young of any such birds, provided that this section shall not be construed to apply to English or European house sparrows or to starlings, and provided further that the chief of police shall have authority to grant a permit for the killing or the capture of pigeons or other birds when it is shown that the same are or have become a nuisance or health hazard in any particular location.

Sec. 3-4. - Keeping of bees prohibited.

The keeping of hives within the city is a menace to the public health and safety of the inhabitants of the city, and is hereby declared a nuisance and is prohibited.

Sec. 3-5. - Quantity of animals, prohibition on keeping livestock, feral cat colonies.

- (a) Except as set forth below concerning feral cat colonies, and below and in section 21-150 concerning poultry and rabbits, it shall be unlawful to keep any animal in quantities of more than four (4) adult animals per dwelling unit, regardless of whether the animal is an indoor or an outdoor pet.
- (b) No person shall keep within the city limits any livestock, whether as a pet or otherwise, including, but not limited to, horses, mules, burros, cows, sheep, goats, swine (excepting potbelly pigs) or any other animal typically raised for consumption such as rabbits or poultry, except as allowed below:
 - (1) Livestock may be kept in agricultural zones.
 - (2) Any person may keep rabbits or poultry (except for mature roosters, pea fowl, and guinea fowl, which may not be kept for any purpose whatsoever) solely for purposes of sale as livestock so long as the following conditions are met:
 - a. All animals are kept indoors or under adequate outdoor shelter;
 - b. Animals are kept and offered for sale for a limited period of time not to exceed seven (7) consecutive weeks and no more than twenty-six (26) weeks in any given year;
 - c. The person has a valid retail sales tax license and is otherwise in compliance with the licensing and taxation provisions of the Code of Ordinances Alamosa, Colorado;
 - d. Any person keeping rabbits or poultry for sale shall possess all necessary federal and state licenses relating to the keeping and sale of such livestock.
 - (3) Other than for purposes of sale, as outlined above, poultry and rabbits may only be kept in accordance with the restrictions and limitations set out in section 21-150 of this Code.
 - (4) A person with a disability may keep a trained service animal used by the person with a disability as a service animal to assist with specific needs or perform work as recognized in the Americans With Disabilities Act.
- (c) Feral cat colonies

- (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to feed stray or feral cats unless such person participates in the Trap, Neuter & Return ("TNR") program designed to reduce the population of feral cats within the City, and managed by the City as set forth below.
- (2) Persons may make application to the Alamosa Police Department to serve as a sponsor of a TNR program. The Police Department shall have discretion to refuse the application on the grounds that it would not be in the public interest for any reason including, but not limited to, reasons based on the location of the colony or the character, reputation, or suitability of the applicant. TNR program sponsors shall have the following responsibilities:
 - i. Register each feral cat colony they are managing with the Alamosa Police Department, including the general location, number of cats in the colony, and number of caretakers working with the colony;
 - ii Trap and spay, neuter, vaccinate, and ear tip (so that spayed, neutered, and vaccinated cats can be readily identified) feral cats that are members of the colony, working with the City's TNR program. The sponsor shall keep records sufficient to identify each vaccinated cat and the date of vaccination so that the vaccination schedule for such cat may be appropriately monitored.
 - iii Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the total number of members and the number of sterilized members of each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;
 - iv Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the number of kittens born into each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;
 - v. Take all reasonable steps to (1) remove kittens from the colony after they have been weaned, (2) place the kittens in homes or foster homes for the purpose of subsequent permanent placement, and (3) capture and spay the mother cat.
 - vi. Monitor each member of the colony for rabies or other disease, and take appropriate steps to address any such disease.
 - vii. Address complaints received by the Alamosa Police Department regarding any feral cat colony they sponsor, and remediate any problems with the colony, including by working with local animal welfare groups to increase the pace of any TNR program, and/or to find foster homes, permanent homes, or no-kill shelters to which nuisance animals may be relocated.

(3) It shall be unlawful for any person to continue to feed stray or feral cats in a registered feral cat colony where such feeding causes a nuisance to neighbors or creates a condition contrary to the health, safety, and welfare of the community. Any member cat of a feral cat colony that has become a nuisance, or the entire colony if it has become a nuisance, may be impounded and disposed of pursuant to the provisions of this Article.

Sec. 3-6. - Confiscation of unauthorized traps.

(a) The use of unauthorized or inhumane traps within the city shall be prohibited.

(b) Unauthorized or inhumane traps which are reported or discovered to be in use within the city shall be confiscated and destroyed.

Sec. 3-7. - Unprovoked biting of humans.

- (a) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the first time, the animal may be barred from this city or humanely destroyed as directed by the municipal court.
- (b) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the second time, the animal shall be barred from this city or humanely destroyed as directed by the municipal court.

Sec. 3-8. - Enforcement personnel.

The provisions of this chapter shall be enforced by the animal control officer and such other persons or agencies as may be designated by the city council.

Sec. 3-9. - Interference with enforcement; right of entry.

- (a) It shall be a violation of this chapter to interfere with an animal control officer or a police officer, or to fail to obey the lawful order of an animal control officer or police officer.
- (b) The animal control officers and police officers are hereby authorized to enter upon any premises within the municipality for the purpose of impounding animals which the officer is authorized under this chapter to impound or for any other purpose authorized in this chapter.
- Sec. 3-10. Cruelty to animals.
- (a) *Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
 - (1) *Abandon* means and includes the leaving of an animal by its owner or other person responsible for its care or custody without making effective provisions for its proper care;
 - (2) *Mistreatment* means and includes every act or omission which causes, or unreasonably permits the continuation of, unnecessary or unjustifiable pain or suffering;
 - (3) *Neglect* means and includes failure to provide food, water, protection from the elements, opportunity for exercise or other care normal, usual and proper for an animal's health and well-being.
- (b) It is unlawful for any person, except as authorized by law, to knowingly or with criminal negligence overdrive, overload, overwork, torture, torment, deprive of necessary sustenance, unnecessarily or cruelly beat, needlessly mutilate, needlessly kill, carry in or upon any vehicle in a cruel manner or otherwise mistreat or neglect any animal, or cause it to be done, or, having the charge and custody of any animal, to fail to provide it with proper food, drink, or protection from the weather, or abandon it.
- (c) In the case of any person incurring a second or subsequent conviction under the provisions of subsection (b) above, a sentence of imprisonment within the minimum and maximum terms shall be mandatory and shall not be subject to suspension, nor shall such person be eligible for probation or parole for any part of such period. A plea of nolo contendere accepted by the court shall be considered a conviction for the purposes of this section.

(d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend or in any manner change the authority of the wildlife commission, as established in C.R.S. title 33, or to prohibit any conduct therein authorized or permitted.

Sec. 3-11. - Riding or driving animals on sidewalks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal upon any sidewalk or levee within the city.

Sec. 3-12. - Riding or driving animals.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal through any street, alley or other public place in such a manner as to endanger the life or limb of any person or in such a manner as to create terror in the mind of any person.

Sec. 3-13. - Violations; fines; penalties.

- (a) The violation of any of the provisions of this chapter not involving the biting of a person, except section 3-69, shall be deemed a public nuisance. A violation of section 3-69, whether or not involving the biting of a person, shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance as provided in said section 3-69.
- (b) The violation of the provisions of this chapter involving the biting of a person shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance.
- (c) The owner of an animal found to be a public nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolutions adopted by the city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this Code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.
- (d) The owner of an animal found to be an aggravated nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolution adopted by city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.
- (e) In lieu of any of the above fines, the owner may elect to euthanize the animal which caused the violation at the owner's expense.

Secs. 3-14—3-30. - Reserved.

Sec. 3-31. - Running at large.

It shall be unlawful for the owner, possessor or keeper of any animal to permit it to run at large within the city. If an animal is found to be running at large within the city, the owner, possessor or keeper shall be presumed to have violated this article, except that this subsection shall not apply during the controlled environment of a city-operated or a city-approved obedience school, nor to ear-tipped feral cats, nor to domestic cats with tags or electronic ID identifying the owner and providing the owner's telephone number, so long as such cats are not causing a nuisance.

Sec. 3-32. - Male potbelly pigs to be neutered; breeding prohibited.

Every male potbelly pig four (4) months of age or older shall be neutered. It shall be unlawful to breed potbelly pigs within the city limits of the City of Alamosa.

Secs. 3-33—3-45. - Reserved.

ARTICLE II. - LICENSING OF DOGS AND POTBELLY PIGS

Sec. 3-46. - Required; application.

- (a) Any person owning, keeping, harboring or having custody of any dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age within the city must obtain a license as provided in this article.
- (b) Application for a license must be made within thirty (30) days after obtaining a dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age, within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig is brought into the city or within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig reaches three (3) months of age, except that this requirement will not apply to a nonresident keeping a dog or potbelly pig within the city for no longer than sixty (60) days.

Sec. 3-47. - Contents of application.

Written application for licenses shall be made to the police department. Such application shall include the following information:

- (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the owner;
- (2) The call-name, breed, age, color and sex of the dog or potbelly pig;
- (3) The appropriate fee;
- (4) A valid rabies vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian which shall include the following information:
 - a. The name, address and telephone number of the owner of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig;
 - b. The date of vaccination;
 - c. The date of expiration of the vaccination;
 - d. The type of rabies vaccine used;
 - e. The year and number of the rabies tag;
 - f. The breed, age, color and sex of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig; and
 - g. The signature of the veterinarian administering the vaccine.

Sec. 3-48. - License tags; duplicate tags; transfer.

- (a) Upon acceptance of the license application and fee, the police department shall issue a durable tag stamped with an identifying number and year of issuance. Tags should be designed so that they may be conveniently fastened or riveted to the animal's collar or harness.
- (b) Dogs and potbelly pigs must wear license tags on collars or harnesses at all times, provided that, dogs which have been properly tattooed in the right groin area with an identification number approved by the city clerk at the time the required license tag is issued, shall not be required to wear a license tag on a collar only when such dogs are restrained on the owner's premises.

- (c) A duplicate license may be obtained upon payment of a one dollar (\$1.00) replacement fee.
- (d) No person may use any license for any animal other than the animal for which it was issued.

Sec. 3-49. - Records.

The police department shall maintain a record of the identifying numbers of all tags and tattoos issued and shall make this record available to the public.

Sec. 3-50. - Licensing period; expiration.

- (a) The licensing period shall begin with the calendar year and shall run for one (1) year. Application for a license may be made thirty (30) days prior to, and up to thirty (30) days after, the start of the calendar year, except that for those animals which are acquired or brought into the city or reach the age of three (3) months the application for license shall be made within thirty (30) days after such event.
- (b) If not revoked, licenses for the keeping of dogs and potbelly pigs shall be for a period of up to one (1) year expiring on the thirty-first day of December of the year of issuance.

Sec. 3-51. - License fees.

- (a) A license shall be issued after payment of the applicable fee:
 - (1) Each dog or potbelly pig, under one (1) year of age, per year \$ 2.00
 - (2) Each neutered/spayed dog or potbelly pig, per year 2.00
 - (3) All other dogs or potbelly pigs, each, per year 10.00

(b) Seeing-eye dogs, hearing dogs or governmental police dogs shall be licensed without fee.

Secs. 3-52—3-65. - Reserved.

ARTICLE III. - CONTROL, CARE AND TREATMENT

Sec. 3-66. - Required.

No person shall fail to exercise proper care and control of his animals or of any animals within his care and custody, thereby allowing them to become a public nuisance.

Sec. 3-67. - Disturbance of peace and quiet.

No owner, possessor, or keeper of an animal within the city shall permit such animal to disturb the peace and quiet of any person or neighborhood by barking, whining, howling or making any other noise in a loud, persistent or habitual fashion. If any animal does so disturb the peace and quiet, the owner, possessor, or keeper shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this article, provided that no such owner, possessor, or keeper shall be charged in municipal court with a violation of this subsection unless he/she or a member of his/her household over the age of eighteen (18) years has received a written warning from the city of a previous complaint once within the preceding twelve (12) months. It shall not be necessary for the purposes of this section to identify and describe the particular animal which is making such noise, but shall only be necessary to show who has possession, care, custody or control of the animal. Sec. 3-68. - Dogs in heat.

Every female dog in heat shall be confined in a building or secured enclosure in such a manner that such female dog cannot come into contact with another animal, except for planned breeding.

Sec. 3-69. - Vicious animals.

- (a) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go unconfined. A vicious animal is unconfined within the provisions of this chapter if the animal is not securely confined indoors or confined in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure upon the premises of the owner of the animal, with such pen or structure having at least those structural qualifications as follows:
 - (1) The pen or structure must have secured sides and a secured top attached to the sides;
 - (2) If the pen or structure has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be embedded into the ground no less than two (2) feet;
 - (3) All such pens or structures shall be adequately lighted and kept in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (b) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go beyond the premises of the owner unless the animal is securely muzzled and restrained by a chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a person. The muzzle shall be made in a manner that will not cause injury to the animal or interfere with its vision or respiration, but shall prevent it from biting any human or animal.
- (c) The owner of a vicious animal shall display in a prominent place on his premises a clearly visible warning sign indicating that there is a vicious animal on the premises. A similar sign is required to be posted on the pen or structure in which the animal is kept.
- (d) Owners of vicious animals must, upon licensing of such animal, provide proof to the city clerk of liability insurance for the benefit of the public at large in the amount of at least fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), insuring the owner against liability for any personal injuries inflicted by his vicious animal.
- (e) No person shall possess or harbor or maintain care or custody of any animal for the purpose of animal fighting, or train, torment, badger, bait or use any animal for the purpose of causing or encouraging the animal to attack human beings or domestic animals.
- (f) A violation of this section shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance and, upon conviction thereof, the violator shall be fined as provided in section 3-13.
- (g) Upon an animal first being found or declared to be vicious by the municipal court, in addition to any other penalties provided in this chapter, said court may enter an order either barring said vicious animal from the city or ordering the humane destruction of the same.
- (h) Upon the violation of this section 3-69 for a second time with respect to any animal, the court shall order the humane destruction of said animal in a humane way and shall add to any fine imposed hereunder the reasonable costs of said destruction which shall be assessed as court costs.
- Sec. 3-70. Treatment of animals; cruelty; abandonment.

- (a) No owner shall fail to provide his/her animals with sufficiently good and wholesome food and water, proper shelter and protection from the weather, veterinary care when needed to prevent suffering, and humane care and treatment.
- (b) No person shall beat, cruelly ill-treat, torment, overload, overwork or otherwise abuse or kill an animal, nor cause, instigate or permit any dogfight, cockfight, bullfight or other combat between animals or between animals and humans.
- (c) No owner of an animal shall abandon such animal.

Sec. 3-71. - Vehicular accidents with animals.

Any person who, as the operator of a vehicle, strikes a domestic animal shall stop at once and shall immediately report such injury or death to the animal's owner. If the owner cannot be ascertained and located, the operator shall at once report the accident to the animal control officer or the local police department.

Sec. 3-72. - Poisoning prohibited.

No person shall expose any known poisonous substance, whether fixed with food or not, so that the same shall be liable to be eaten by any animal, provided that it shall not be unlawful for a person to expose for exterminating rats on his own property common rat poison mixed only with vegetable substances.

Sec. 3-73. - Removal of dead animals required.

If any animal shall die in the possession of any person in this city, it shall be the duty of such owner to cause the animal to be appropriately disposed of. Such disposal may include burial on property within the city limits only if all parts of the dead animal are covered by at least four feet of earth. In case the owner of any such animal shall neglect or refuse to properly dispose of the animal within ten (10) hours after its death, the police department shall cause the dead animal to be removed at the expense of the owner. Whenever the owner of any dead animal cannot be found or ascertained, it shall be the duty of the animal control officer to dispose of the animal.

Sec. 3-74. - Trapping of animals.

No person shall set, or cause to be set, an unauthorized or inhumane trap within the city, except that rodent snap-traps baited with vegetable or dairy products may be used on private property.

Sec. 3-75. - Removal of animal waste required.

The owner or person having control or purporting to have control over any animal shall remove any feces deposited by his animal on public walks, recreation areas or private property.

Sec. 3-76. Reserved

Sec. 3-78. - Wild animals as pets or for display.

- (a) No person shall keep or permit to be kept any wild animal as a pet.
- (b) No person shall keep or permit to be kept on his premises any wild or vicious animal for display or for exhibition purposes, whether gratuitously or for a fee. This section shall not be construed to apply to zoological parks, performing animal exhibitions or circuses.

Sec. 3-79. - Maltreatment of performing animals prohibited.

- (a) No performing animal exhibition or circus shall be permitted in which animals are induced or encouraged to perform through the use of chemical, mechanical, electrical or manual devices in a manner which will cause or is likely to cause physical injury or suffering.
- (b) All equipment used on a performing animal shall fit properly and be in good working condition.

Secs. 3-80—3-95. - Reserved.

ARTICLE IV. - RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 3-96. - Vaccination required.

All dogs and potbelly pigs three (3) months of age or older shall be vaccinated against rabies. All dogs and potbelly pigs vaccinated at three (3) months of age or older shall be revaccinated at one (1) year of age and thereafter at intervals recommended in the current *Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines*. If any dog or potbelly pig is found within the city without a current rabies vaccination tag or current license tag affixed to its collar or harness, the owner of such dog or potbelly pig shall be presumed to have violated the provision of this article.

Sec. 3-97. - Reporting animal bites.

- (a) Any person having knowledge that an animal, other than a rodent, rabbit, bird or reptile, has bitten a human being shall immediately report the incident to the animal control office or police department.
- (b) If any animal is suspected of having rabies or if any animal has bitten a person and such animal has not had a current vaccination, such animal shall be confined for a period of at least ten (10) days by a leash, chain or cage at the animal shelter or a veterinary hospital of the owner's choice, all at the expense of the owner of the animal. During the ten-day observation period, no rabies vaccine shall be administered to the animal.
- (c) No animal held for observation on suspicion of rabies shall be released until the observation period is over, except that if the owner shows proof of current rabies vaccination, the animal may be released into quarantine at the owner's residence, at the discretion of the animal control officer.
- (d) If any animal has been bitten by another animal suspected of having rabies, the owner of such animal so exposed to rabies shall report such fact to the animal control officer, local humane society officer or police department. If either animal has not been vaccinated against rabies, the animal control officer shall have the power, in his discretion, to have such animal removed from the owner's premises to a

veterinary hospital, and there placed under observation for a period of up to six (6) months at the expense of the owner, provided that the owner may elect in lieu thereof to have such animal humanely destroyed.

(e) If a standard incubation period has not been established by the state department of health for the particular species of animal, it shall be summarily destroyed and if involved with another animal or human, a necropsy shall be performed by a certified laboratory to determine rabies contamination.

Sec. 3-98. - Animals with rabies.

If rabies has been ascertained in any animal, such animal shall be summarily humanely destroyed.

Secs. 3-99-3-115. - Reserved.

ARTICLE V. - IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 3-116. - Conditions and authority.

Unrestrained dogs and potbelly pigs, maltreated animals and nuisance animals, including any animal running at large in violation of Section 3-31 of this Code, may be taken by police officers, animal control officers or humane officers and impounded in an animal shelter, or other appropriate location, and there confined in a humane manner. Unless causing a nuisance, stray cats and feral cats shall be neutered, ear-tipped, vaccinated, and returned to the location where they were taken.

Sec. 3-117. - Notice.

Immediately upon impoundment, the animal control officer or humane society officer shall notify the owner of such impounded animal, if the owner can be identified, that such animal has been impounded. Such notice shall be by telephone if possible, otherwise by mail, and a description of the animal shall be posted at city hall and at the animal shelter.

Sec. 3-118. - Unclaimed animals.

Unclaimed animals shall be kept for not less than five (5) days. If the City does not have access to facilities to house the animal, and no owner can reasonably be identified, the City shall have the option to dispose of the animal in whatever manner deemed appropriate. The City shall first endeavor to work with local animal welfare groups to find foster homes, permanent homes or a no kill shelter to which the animal can be relocated. Humane destruction shall be the least preferred alternative.

Sec. 3-119. - Release of animals.

(a) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for the first time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00), plus a daily boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval of the city manager.

- (b) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for each subsequent time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00), plus a daily boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval by the city manager.
- (c) An owner reclaiming an impounded dog or potbelly pig which is not validly licensed must license the dog or potbelly pig and present evidence thereof to the person in charge of the animal shelter. If the dog or potbelly pig does not have a current rabies tag, the owner shall present a current rabies vaccination certificate for such dog or potbelly pig duly issued by a licensed veterinarian, or, in lieu thereof, the owner may place a cash deposit of fifty dollars (\$50.00) with the city to be refunded to the owner upon presenting, within five (5) days thereafter, proof of vaccination and license.

Sec. 3-120. - Animal holding periods; disposition of unclaimed animals.

- (a) Any pet animal not reclaimed by its owner shall be held, except as provided in sub-part (b) of this section, by the city for a minimum of five (5) days before it may become available for adoption or otherwise disposed of at the discretion of the animal control officer. For purposes of this section "days" means days during which the shelter at which the animal is being held is open to the public.
- (b) No unclaimed dog, cat, or potbelly pig shall be released for adoption without being sterilized,
- (c) Pet animals which, in the opinion of a veterinarian, are experiencing extreme pain or suffering may be disposed of immediately by the city through euthanasia after the animal control officer, or her designee, has made reasonable efforts to contact the owner. For pet animals with identification, reasonable efforts to contact the owner of twenty-four (24) hours.

Section 2. General Repealer

All acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 3. Recording and Authentication

This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City Book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.

Section 4. Publication and Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.

ARTICLE I. - IN GENERAL

Sec. 3-1. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Animal shall mean any live vertebrate creature, whether domestic or wild.

Animal control officer shall mean any person commissioned by the state, county or municipal government to perform duties under the laws, regulations or ordinances of the state, county or municipality pertaining to animals.

Animal shelter shall mean any facility operated by a humane society, <u>municipalgovernmental</u> agency or its authorized agents for the purpose of impounding or caring for animals held under the authority of this chapter or state law. Any such facility shall provide proper and humane care for animals held in it.

At large shall mean the time when a dog or potbelly pigan animal is off or away from the premises of the owner, possessor or keeper thereof, and not under the control of such owner, possessor or keeper, or his agent or a member of his immediate family by a leash or lead capable of restraining the dog or potbelly pig. Dogs or potbelly pigsAnimal. Animals tethered to a stationary object within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path are deemed to be at large.

Circus shall mean a commercial variety show featuring animal acts for public entertainment.

Commercial animal establishment shall mean any pet shop, grooming shop, auction, riding school or stable, zoological park, circus, performing animal exhibition or kennel.

Dwelling unit shall mean one (1) or more rooms and a single kitchen designed for or occupied as a unit by one (1) family for living and cooking purposes.

*Grooming shop*Ear tipping shall mean <u>straight-line cutting of the tip of the left ear</u> <u>of a commercial establishment where animals are bathed, clipped, pluckedcat</u> <u>while the cat is anesthetized.</u>

<u>Feral cat shall mean a free-roaming cat that is partially socialized</u> or otherwise groomed. <u>unsocialized to humans and tends to resist contact with humans.</u>

Humane *officer* Destruction shall mean euthanasia administered by a qualified veterinarian or veterinary technician.

Nuisance shall mean any person designated by the state, a municipal government or a humane society as a law enforcement officer who is qualified to perform such duties under the lawsanimal which:

- (1) Molests passersby or passing vehicles;
- (2) Attacks other animals;

(3) Is at large in violation of Section 3-31 of this state. Code;

Leash/lead shall mean a thong, cord, rope, chain or similar device which holds an animal in restraint and which is not more than six (6) feet in length.

(4) Damages private or public property;

(5) Barks, whines, howls, or makes any other noise in a loud and persistent or habitual fashion so as to disturb any person or neighborhood;

(6) Is diseased.

Owner shall mean any person, partnership or corporation in possession of, harboring, or who shall allow any animal to remain about their premises for a period of three (3) consecutive days or more-, excluding sponsors of feral cats as addressed in this article. The person named on the registration record of any animal as the owner shall be deemed, prima facie, the owner thereof, but the term owner shall also include, but shall not be limited to, the occupant of the premises where the animal is usually kept, if such premises are other than the premises of the owner as shown on the registration record; or any person having control or purporting to have control over any animal which is running at large. The parent or guardian of an owner under eighteen (18) years of age shall be deemed the owner, as defined in this section.

Performing animal exhibition shall mean any spectacle, display, act or event other than circuses in which performing animals are used.

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Pet shop shall mean any person, partnership or corporation, whether operated separately or in connection with another business enterprise except for a licensed kennel, that buys, sells or boards any species of animal.
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Potbelly pig shall mean a miniature porcine which shall not exceed eighteen (18) inches in height at the shoulder and one hundred fifteen (115) pounds in weight, and shall include, but not be limited to, the North American potbelly pig, the Vietnamese potbelly pig, and the Chinese potbelly pig.

Public nuisance shall mean any animal which:

- (1) Molests passersby or passing vehicles;
- (2) Attacks other animals;
- (3) Is at large;
- (4) Damages private or public property;
- (5) Barks, whines, howls, or makes any other noise in a loud and persistent or habitual fashion so as to disturb any person or neighborhood;
- (6) Is diseased.

Restraint shall mean securing an animal by a leash or lead so that it is under the physical control of a responsible person, or tethered to a stationary object not within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path, or keeping an animal within a fence or other enclosure which restrains the animal to a particular premises.

Stray cat shall mean a free-roaming domesticated cat that does not have a tag, electronic ID, or other means of identifying its owner.

Trap shall mean any device used to contain or capture an animal. There are two (2) types of traps:

(1) Humane trap is a device designed to capture or contain an animal without causing any injury to the animal;

(2) Inhumane trap is a device designed to capture or contain an animal which causes injury to the _____animal as the result of the trap's operation. ___

Trap, Neuter & Return (TNR) shall mean a non-lethal approach to feral cat population control where feral cats are humanely trapped, sterilized, vaccinated, ear-tipped, and then returned to the location where they were originally trapped

Veterinary hospital shall mean any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injuries of animals.

Vicious animal includes, but is not limited to, dogs and means:

(1) Any animal with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury to, or otherwise threaten the safety of human beings or domestic animals; or

(2) Any animal which, because of its size, physical nature, or vicious propensity is capable of inflicting serious physical harm or death to humans and which would constitute a danger to human life or property if not kept in the manner required by this chapter; or

(3) Any animal which, without provocation, attacks or bites, or has attacked or bitten, a human being or domestic animal; or

(4) Any animal owned or harbored primarily or in part for the purpose of animal fighting or any animal trained for animal fighting.

Wild *animals*animal shall mean any live ferret, fox, leopard, lion, lynx, monkey (nonhuman primate), panther, poisonous snake, raccoon, skunk, tiger or any other warm-blooded animal which can normally be found in the wild state.

Sec. 3-2. - Declaration of city as wild bird refuge.

The area within the limits of the city is hereby made and constituted a bird sanctuary for the refuge of wild birds, and all persons are urged to protect the wild birds and encourage their propagation and refuge within such sanctuary.

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Sec. 3-3. - Abuse of wild birds prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person at any time within the city to frighten, shoot at, wound, kill, capture, ensnare, net, trap or in any other manner to molest or injure any wild bird, or in any manner, to molest or injure the nest, eggs or young of any such birds, provided that this section shall not be construed to apply to English or European house sparrows or to starlings, and provided further that the chief of police shall have authority to grant a permit for the killing or the capture of pigeons or other birds when it is shown that the same are or have become a nuisance or health hazard in any particular location.

Sec. 3-4. - Keeping of bees prohibited.

The keeping of hives within the city is a menace to the public health and safety of the inhabitants of the city, and is hereby declared a nuisance and is prohibited.

Sec. 3-5. - Quantity of animals, prohibition on keeping livestock-, feral cat <u>colonies.</u>

(a) Pets, such<u>Except</u> as dogs, catsset forth below concerning feral cat colonies, and potbelly pigs, which may generally below and in section 21-150 concerning poultry and rabbits, it shall be kept within a dwelling, are not permitted<u>unlawful to</u> keep any animal in quantities of more than four (4) adult animals per dwelling unit, regardless of whether the <u>petanimal</u> is an indoor or an outdoor pet.

(b) No person shall keep within the city limits any livestock, whether as a pet or otherwise, including, but not limited to, horses, mules, burros, cows, sheep, goats, swine (excepting potbelly pigs) or any other animal typically raised for consumption such as rabbits or poultry, except as allowed below:

(1) Livestock may be kept in agricultural zones.

(2) Any person may keep rabbits or poultry (except for mature roosters, pea fowl, and guinea fowl, which may not be kept for any purpose whatsoever) solely for purposes of sale as livestock so long as the following conditions are met:

a. All animals are kept indoors or under adequate outdoor shelter;

b. Animals are kept and offered for sale for a limited period of time not to exceed seven (7) consecutive weeks and no more than twenty-six (26) weeks in any given year;

c. The person has a valid retail sales tax license and is otherwise in compliance with the licensing and taxation provisions of the Code of Ordinances Alamosa, Colorado;

d. Any person keeping rabbits or poultry for sale shall possess all necessary federal and state licenses relating to the keeping and sale of such livestock.

(3) Other than for purposes of sale, as outlined above, poultry and rabbits may only be kept in accordance with the restrictions and limitations set out in section 21-150 of this Code.

(4) A person with a disability may keep a trained service animal used by the person with a disability as a service animal to assist with specific needs or perform work as recognized in the Americans With Disabilities Act.

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person to feed stray or feral cats unless such person participates in the Trap, Neuter & Return ("TNR") program designed to reduce the population of feral cats within the City, and managed by the City as set forth below.

(2) Persons may make application to the Alamosa Police Department to serve as a sponsor of a TNR program. The Police Department shall have discretion to refuse the application on the grounds that it would not be in the public interest for any reason including, but not limited to, reasons based on the location of the colony or the character, reputation, or suitability of the applicant. TNR program sponsors shall have the following responsibilities:

i. Register each feral cat colony they are managing with the Alamosa Police Department, including the general location, number of cats in the colony, and number of caretakers working with the colony;

ii Trap and spay, neuter, vaccinate, and ear tip (so that spayed, neutered, and vaccinated cats can be readily identified) feral cats that are members of the colony, working with the City's TNR program. The sponsor shall keep records sufficient to identify each vaccinated cat and the date of vaccination so that the vaccination schedule for such cat may be appropriately monitored.

iii Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the total number of members and the number of sterilized members of each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;

iv Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the number of kittens born into each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;

v. Take all reasonable steps to (1) remove kittens from the colony after they have been weaned, (2) place the kittens in homes or foster homes for the purpose of subsequent permanent placement, and (3) capture and spay the mother cat.

vi. Monitor each member of the colony for rabies or other disease, and take appropriate steps to address any such disease.

vii. Address complaints received by the Alamosa Police Department regarding any feral cat colony they sponsor, and remediate any problems with the colony, including by working with local animal welfare groups to increase the pace of any TNR program, and/or to find foster homes, permanent homes, or no-kill shelters to which nuisance animals may be relocated.

(3) It shall be unlawful for any person to continue to feed stray or feral cats in a registered feral cat colony where such feeding causes a nuisance to neighbors or creates a condition contrary to the health, safety, and welfare of the community. Any member cat of a feral cat colony that has become a nuisance, or the entire colony if it has become a nuisance, may be impounded and disposed of pursuant to the provisions of this Article. Sec. 3-6. - Confiscation of unauthorized traps.

(a) The use of unauthorized or inhumane traps within the city shall be prohibited.

(b) Unauthorized or inhumane traps which are reported or discovered to be in use within the city shall be confiscated and destroyed.

Sec. 3-7. - Unprovoked biting of humans.

(a) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the first time, the animal may be barred from this city or <u>humanely</u> destroyed as directed by the municipal court.

(b) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the second time, the animal shall be barred from this city or <u>humanely</u> destroyed as directed by the municipal court.

Sec. 3-8. - Enforcement personnel.

The provisions of this chapter shall be enforced by the animal control officer and such other persons or agencies as may be designated by the city council.

Sec. 3-9. - Interference with enforcement; right of entry.

(a) It shall be a violation of this chapter to interfere with an animal control officer or a police officer, or to fail to obey the lawful order of an animal control officer or police officer.

(b) The animal control officers and police officers are hereby authorized to enter upon any premises, excluding a dwelling unit, within the municipality for the purpose of impounding animals which hethe officer is authorized under this chapter to impound or for any other purpose authorized in this chapter.

Sec. 3-10. - Cruelty to animals.

(a) Definitions. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

(1) Abandon means and includes the leaving of an animal by its owner or other person responsible for its care or custody without making effective provisions for its proper care;

(2) Animal means any living dumb creature;

(3_(2) Mistreatment means and includes every act or omission which causes, or unreasonably permits the continuation of, unnecessary or unjustifiable pain or suffering;

(43) Neglect means and includes failure to provide food, water, protection from the elements, opportunity for exercise or other care normal, usual and proper for an animal's health and well-being.

(b) It is unlawful for any person, except as authorized by law, to knowingly or with criminal negligence overdrive, overload, overwork, torture, torment, deprive of necessary sustenance, unnecessarily or cruelly beat, needlessly mutilate, needlessly kill, carry in or upon any vehicle in a cruel manner or otherwise mistreat or neglect any animal, or cause or procure it to be done, or, having the charge and custody of any animal, to fail to provide it with proper food, drink, or protection from the weather, or abandon it.

(c) In the case of any person incurring a second or subsequent conviction under the provisions of subsection (b) above, a sentence of imprisonment within the minimum and maximum terms shall be mandatory and shall not be subject to suspension, nor shall such person be eligible for probation or parole for any part of such period. A plea of nolo contendere accepted by the court shall be considered a conviction for the purposes of this section.

(d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend or in any manner change the authority of the wildlife commission, as established in C.R.S. title 33, or to prohibit any conduct therein authorized or permitted.

Sec. 3-11. - Riding or driving animals on sidewalks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal upon any sidewalk or levee within the city.

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Sec. 3-12. - Riding or driving animals.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal through any street, alley or other public place in such a manner as to endanger the life or limb of any person or in such a manner as to create terror in the mind of any person.

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Sec. 3-13. - Violations; fines; penalties.

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(a) The violation of any of the provisions of this chapter not involving the biting of a person, except section 3-69, shall be deemed a public nuisance. A violation of section 3-69, whether or not involving the biting of a person, shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance as provided in said section 3-69.
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(b) The violation of the provisions of this chapter involving the biting of a person shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance.

(c) The owner of an animal found to be a public nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolutions adopted by the city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this Code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.

(d) The owner of an animal found to be an aggravated nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolution adopted by city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.

(e) In lieu of any of the above fines, the owner may elect to euthanize the animal which caused the violation at the owner's expense.

ARTICLE II. - DOGS AND POTBELLY PIGS

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 3-31. - Running at large.

_____It shall be unlawful for the owner, possessor or keeper, of any dog or potbelly piganimal to permit it to run at large within the city. If a dog or potbelly pigan animal is found to be running at large within the city, the owner, possessor or keeper shall be presumed to have violated this article, except that this subsection shall not apply during the controlled environment of a city-operated or a cityapproved obedience school., nor to ear-tipped feral cats, nor to domestic cats with tags or electronic ID identifying the owner and providing the owner's telephone number, so long as such cats are not causing a nuisance.

Sec. 3-32. - Male potbelly pigs to be neutered; breeding prohibited.

Every male potbelly pig four (4) months of age or older shall be neutered. It shall be unlawful to breed potbelly pigs within the city limits of the City of Alamosa.

LICENSING OF DOGS AND POTBELLY PIGS

Sec. 3-46. - Required; application.

(a) Any person owning, keeping, harboring or having custody of any dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age within the city must obtain a license as provided in this article.

(b) Application for a license must be made within thirty (30) days after obtaining a dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age, within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig is brought into the city or within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig reaches three (3) months of age, except that this requirement will not apply to a nonresident keeping a dog or potbelly pig within the city for no longer than sixty (60) days.

Sec. 3-47. - Contents of application.

Written application for licenses shall be made to the <u>city clerkpolice department</u>. Such application shall include the following information:

- (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the owner;
- (2) The call-name, breed, age, color and sex of the dog or potbelly pig;
- (3) The appropriate fee;

(4) A valid rabies vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian which shall include the following information:

a. The name, address and telephone number of the owner of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig;

b. The date of vaccination;

- c. The date of expiration of the vaccination;
- d. The type of rabies vaccine used;
- e. The year and number of the rabies tag;
- f. The breed, age, color and sex of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig; and
- g. The signature of the veterinarian administering the vaccine.

Sec. 3-48. - License tags; duplicate tags; transfer.

(a) Upon acceptance of the license application and fee, the <u>city clerkpolice</u> <u>department</u> shall issue a durable tag stamped with an identifying number and year of issuance. Tags should be designed so that they may be conveniently fastened or riveted to the animal's collar or harness.

(b) Dogs and potbelly pigs must wear license tags on collars or harnesses at all times, provided that, dogs which have been properly tattooed in the right groin area with an identification number approved by the city clerk at the time the required license tag is issued, shall not be required to wear a license tag on a collar only when such dogs are restrained on the owner's premises.

(c) A duplicate license may be obtained upon payment of a one dollar (\$1.00) replacement fee.

(d) No person may use any license for any animal other than the animal for which it was issued.

Sec. 3-49. - Records.

The <u>city clerkpolice department</u> shall maintain a record of the identifying numbers of all tags and tattoos issued and shall make this record available to the public.

Sec. 3-50. - Licensing period; expiration.

(a) The licensing period shall begin with the calendar year and shall run for one (1) year. Application for a license may be made thirty (30) days prior to, and up to thirty (30) days after, the start of the calendar year, except that for those animals which are acquired or brought into the city or reach the age of three (3) months the application for license shall be made within thirty (30) days after such event.

(b) If not revoked, licenses for the keeping of dogs and potbelly pigs shall be for a period of up to one (1) year expiring on the thirty-first day of December of the year of issuance.

Sec. 3-51. - License fees.

(a) A license shall be issued after payment of the applicable fee:

- (1) Each dog or potbelly pig, under one (1) year of age, per year $\dots \frac{-5}{2.00}$
- (2) Each neutered/spayed dog or potbelly pig, per year 2.00
- (3) All other dogs or potbelly pigs, each, per year 10.00

(b) Seeing-eye dogs, hearing dogs or governmental police dogs shall be licensed without fee.

ARTICLE III. - CONTROL, CARE AND TREATMENT

Sec. 3-66. - Required.

No person shall fail to exercise proper care and control of his animals or of any animals within his care and custody, thereby allowing them to become a public nuisance.

Sec. 3-67. - Disturbance of peace and quiet.

No owner, possessor, or keeper of an animal within the city shall permit such animal to disturb the peace and quiet of any family, individualperson or neighborhood by barking, whining, howling or making any other noise in a loud, persistent or habitual fashion. If any animal does so disturb the peace and quiet, the owner, possessor, or keeper shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this article, provided that no such owner, possessor, or keeper shall be charged in municipal court with a violation of this subsection unless he/she or a member of his/her household over the age of eighteen (18) years has received a written warning from the city of a previous complaint once within the preceding twelve (12) months. It shall not be necessary for the purposes of this section to identify and describe the particular animal which is making such noise, but shall only be necessary to show who has possession, care, custody or control of the animal.

Sec. 3-68. - Dogs in heat.

Every female dog in heat shall be confined in a building or secured enclosure in such a manner that such female dog cannot come into contact with another animal, except for planned breeding.

Sec. 3-69. - Vicious animals.

(a) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go unconfined. A vicious animal is unconfined within the provisions of this chapter if

the animal is not securely confined indoors or confined in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure upon the premises of the owner of the animal, with such pen or structure having at least those structural qualifications as follows:

(1) The pen or structure must have secured sides and a secured top attached to the sides;

(2) If the pen or structure has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be embedded into the ground no less than two (2) feet;

(3) All such pens or structures shall be adequately lighted and kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

(b) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go beyond the premises of the owner unless the animal is securely muzzled and restrained by a chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a person. The muzzle shall be made in a manner that will not cause injury to the animal or interfere with its vision or respiration, but shall prevent it from biting any human or animal.

(c) The owner of a vicious animal shall display in a prominent place on his premises a clearly visible warning sign indicating that there is a vicious animal on the premises. A similar sign is required to be posted on the pen or structure in which the animal is kept.

(d) Owners of vicious animals must, within thirty (30) days after the effective dateupon licensing of the ordinance from which this section was derivedsuch animal, provide proof to the city clerk of liability insurance for the benefit of the public at large in the amount of at least fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), insuring the owner against liability for any personal injuries inflicted by his vicious animal.

(e) No person shall possess or harbor or maintain care or custody of any animal for the purpose of animal fighting, or train, torment, badger, bait or use any animal for the purpose of causing or encouraging the animal to attack human beings or domestic animals.

(f) A violation of this section shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance and, upon conviction thereof, the violator shall be fined as provided in section 3-13.

(g) Upon an animal first being found or declared to be vicious by the municipal court, in addition to any other penalties provided in this chapter, said court may enter an order either barring said vicious animal from the city or ordering the <u>humane</u> destruction of the same.

(h) Upon the violation of this section 3-69 for a second time with respect to any animal, the court shall order the <u>humane</u> destruction of said animal in a humane way and shall add to any fine imposed hereunder the reasonable costs of said destruction which shall be assessed as court costs.

Sec. 3-70. - Treatment of animals; cruelty; abandonment.

(a) No owner shall fail to provide his/her animals with sufficiently good and wholesome food and water, proper shelter and protection from the weather, veterinary care when needed to prevent suffering, and humane care and treatment.

(b) No person shall beat, cruelly ill-treat, torment, overload, overwork or otherwise abuse or kill an animal, nor cause, instigate or permit any dogfight, cockfight, bullfight or other combat between animals or between animals and humans.

(c) No owner of an animal shall abandon such animal.

(Code 1964, § 4-22)

Sec. 3-71. - Vehicular accidents with animals.

Any person who, as the operator of a vehicle, strikes a domestic animal shall stop at once and shall immediately report such injury or death to the animal's owner. If the owner cannot be ascertained and located, the operator shall at once report the accident to the animal control officer or the local police department.

(Code 1964, § 4-23)

Sec. 3-72. - Poisoning prohibited.

No person shall expose any known poisonous substance, whether fixed with food or not, so that the same shall be liable to be eaten by any animal, provided that it shall not be unlawful for a person to expose for exterminating rats on his own property common rat poison mixed only with vegetable substances.

(Code 1964, § 4-24)

Sec. 3-73. - Removal of dead animals required.

If any animal shall die in the possession of any person in this city, it shall be the duty of such <u>personowner</u> to cause the <u>sameanimal</u> to be <u>at once removed without</u> the <u>appropriately disposed of</u>. Such disposal may include burial on property within the city limits <u>only if all parts</u> of the eity and buried at a sanitary landfill.dead animal are covered by at least four feet of earth. In case the owner or person having eharge of any such animal shall neglect or refuse to removeproperly dispose of the sameanimal within ten (10) hours after its death, the police department shall cause the samedead animal to be removed at the expense of such owner or other person having charge of the same, such expense to be recovered by civil action.the owner.</u> Whenever the owner or other person having charge of any dead animal cannot be found or ascertained, it shall be the duty of the animal control officer to remove and have suchdispose of the animal buried...

Sec. 3-74. - Trapping of animals.

No person shall set, or cause to be set, an unauthorized or inhumane trap within the city, except that rodent snap-traps baited with vegetable or dairy products may be used on private property.

Sec. 3-75. - Removal of animal waste required.

The owner or person having control or purporting to have control over any animal shall remove any feces deposited by his animal on public walks, recreation areas or private property.

(Code 1964, § 4-27)

Sec. 3-76. - Sterilization of adopted animals. Reserved

No unclaimed dog, cat, or male potbelly pig shall be released for adoption without being sterilized, or without a written agreement from the adopter guaranteeing that such animal will be sterilized.

Sec. 3-77. - Permits for infant native animals; release.

(a) The animal control officer may issue a temporary permit for the keeping, care and protection of an infant animal native to this area which had been deemed to be homeless.

(b) The animal control officer shall have the power to release or order the release of any infant wild animal kept under temporary permit which is deemed capable of survival in the wild.

(Code 1964, § 4-30)

Sec. 3-78. - Wild animals as pets or for display.

(a) No person shall keep or permit to be kept any wild animal as a pet.

(b) No person shall keep or permit to be kept on his premises any wild or vicious animal for display or for exhibition purposes, whether gratuitously or for a fee. This section shall not be construed to apply to zoological parks, performing animal exhibitions or circuses.

(Code 1964, § 4-29)

Sec. 3-79. - Maltreatment of performing animals prohibited.

(a) No performing animal exhibition or circus shall be permitted in which animals are induced or encouraged to perform through the use of chemical, mechanical, electrical or manual devices in a manner which will cause or is likely to cause physical injury or suffering.

(b) All equipment used on a performing animal shall fit properly and be in good working condition.

(Code 1964, §§ 4-31, 4-32)

ARTICLE IV. - RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 3-96. - Vaccination required.

All dogs and potbelly pigs three (3) months of age or older shall be vaccinated against rabies. All dogs and potbelly pigs vaccinated at three (3) months of age or older shall be revaccinated at one (1) year of age and thereafter at intervals recommended in the current Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines. If any dog or potbelly pig is found within the city without a current rabies vaccination tag or current license tag affixed to its collar or harness, the owner of such dog or potbelly pig shall be presumed to have violated the provision of this article.

(Code 1964, § 4-9; Ord. No. 18-1995, § 11, 10-4-95)

Sec. 3-97. - Reporting animal bites.

(a) Any person having knowledge that an animal, other than a rodent, rabbit, bird or reptile, has bitten a human being shall immediately report the incident to the animal control office or police department.

(b) If any animal is suspected of having rabies or if any animal has bitten a person and such animal has not had a current vaccination, such animal shall be confined for a period of at least ten (10) days by a leash, chain or cage at the animal shelter or a veterinary hospital of the owner's choice, all at the expense of the owner of the animal. During the ten-day observation period, no rabies vaccine shall be administered to the animal.

(c) No animal held for observation on suspicion of rabies shall be released until the observation period is over, except that if the owner shows proof of current rabies vaccination, the animal may be released into quarantine at the owner's residence, at the discretion of the animal control officer.

(d) If any animal has been bitten by another animal suspected of having rabies, the owner of such animal so exposed to rabies shall report such fact to the animal

control officer, local humane society officer or police department. If either animal has not been vaccinated against rabies, the animal control officer shall have the power, in his discretion, to have such animal removed from the owner's premises to a veterinary hospital, and there placed under observation for a period of up to six (6) months at the expense of the owner, provided that the owner may elect in lieu thereof to have such animal <u>humanely</u> destroyed.

(e) If a standard incubation period has not been established by the state department of health for the particular species of animal, it shall be summarily destroyed and if involved with another animal or human, a necropsy shall be performed by a certified laboratory to determine rabies contamination.

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Sec. 3-98. - Animals with rabies.

If rabies has been ascertained in any animal, such animal shall be summarily <u>humanely</u> destroyed.

ARTICLE V. - IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 3-116. - Conditions and authority.

_____Unrestrained dogs and potbelly pigs, maltreated animals and nuisance animals, including any animal running at large in violation of Section 3-31 of this <u>Code</u>, may be taken by police officers, animal control officers or humane officers and impounded in an animal shelter, or other appropriate location, and there confined in a humane manner. <u>Unless causing a nuisance, stray cats and feral cats</u> shall be neutered, ear-tipped, vaccinated, and returned to the location where they were taken.

(Code 1964, § 4-17; Ord. No. 18-1995, § 12, 10-4-95)

Sec. 3-117. - Unclaimed animals.

Unclaimed animals shall be kept for not less than five (5) days. (Code 1964, § 4-18; Ord. No. 15-2008, § 1, 12-3-08)

Sec. 3-118. - Notice.

Immediately upon the impoundment, the animal control officer or humane society officer shall notify the owner of such impounded animal, if the owner can be identified, that such animal has been impounded. Such notice shall be by telephone if possible, otherwise by mail, and a description of the animal shall be posted at city hall and at the animal shelter.

Sec. 3-118. - Unclaimed animals.

Unclaimed animals shall be kept for not less than five (5) days. (Code 1964, § 4-19)

If the City does not have access to facilities to house the animal, and no owner can reasonably be identified, the City shall have the option to dispose of the animal in whatever manner deemed appropriate. The City shall first endeavor to work with local animal welfare groups to find foster homes, permanent homes or a no kill shelter to which the animal can be relocated. Humane destruction shall be the least preferred alternative.

Sec. 3-119. - Release of animals.

(a) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for the first time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00), plus a daily boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval of the city manager.

(b) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for each subsequent time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00), plus a daily

boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval by the city manager.

(c) An owner reclaiming an impounded dog or potbelly pig which is not validly licensed must license the dog or potbelly pig and present evidence thereof to the person in charge of the animal shelter. If the dog or potbelly pig does not have a current rabies tag, the owner shall present a current rabies vaccination certificate for such dog or potbelly pig duly issued by a licensed veterinarian, or, in lieu thereof, the owner may place a cash deposit of fifty dollars (\$50.00) with the city to be refunded to the owner upon presenting, within five (5) days thereafter, proof of vaccination and license.

Sec. 3-120. - Animal holding periods; disposition of unclaimed animals.

(a) Any pet animal not reclaimed by its owner shall be held, except as provided in sub-part (b) of this section, by the city for a minimum of five (5) days before it may become available for adoption or otherwise disposed of at the discretion of the animal control officer. For purposes of this section "days" means days during which the shelter at which the animal is being held is open to the public.

(b) No unclaimed dog, cat, or potbelly pig shall be released for adoption without being sterilized,

(c) Pet animals which, in the opinion of a veterinarian, are experiencing extreme pain or suffering may be disposed of immediately by the city through euthanasia after the animal control officer, or her designee, has made reasonable efforts to contact the owner. For pet animals with identification, reasonable efforts to contact the owner shall continue for a minimum of twenty-four (24) hours.

ORDINANCE NO. 5-2017

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTER 3 OF THE *ALAMOSA CODE OF ORDINANCES,* GOVERNING ANIMALS, TO INTRODUCE A SPAY, NEUTER, RETURN PROGRAM FOR FERAL CATS, ALLOW FOR BURIAL OF PETS IN YARDS, REVISE TERMS UNDER WHICH ANIMAL IMPOUNDMENTS TAKE PLACE, AND MAKE OTHER CLARIFYING CHANGES TO THE CHAPTER

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance governing animals, Chapter 3 of the *Alamosa Code of Ordinances*, makes it unlawful to harbor or feed more than 4 animals (poultry and rabbits excepted); and

WHEREAS, Over the last several years, the City has received calls regarding the feral cat population; and there have been established a number of feral cat colonies that are typically cared for by one or more individuals; and

WHEREAS, Beyond volunteer efforts, there has not been an organized approach for managing the cat population; and

WHEAREAS, the existing ordinance requires pets to be buried in a sanitary landfill, and common practice has been to otherwise dispose of pets, including burial in yards, which practice Council does not find to be detrimental to the health of the citizens of Alamosa so long as carried out consistent with depth requirements; and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance does not adequately address impoundment and disposition of nuisance animals; and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinance sets up a system for permitting of the keeping of juvenile wild animals as pets, which Council finds has not been implemented, and is counter to the health and well-being of the citizens of Alamosa; and

WHEREAS, other sections of the existing ordinance require clarification and streamlining,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado:

Section 1. Chapter 3 of the *Alamosa Code of Ordinances* is hereby repealed and replaced in its entirety to read as follows:

Chapter 3 – ANIMALS

ARTICLE I. - IN GENERAL

Sec. 3-1. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Animal shall mean any live vertebrate creature, whether domestic or wild.

Animal control officer shall mean any person commissioned by the state, county or municipal government to perform duties under the laws, regulations or ordinances of the state, county or municipality pertaining to animals.

Animal shelter shall mean any facility operated by a humane society, governmental agency or its authorized agents for the purpose of impounding or caring for animals held under the authority of this chapter or state law. Any such facility shall provide proper and humane care for animals held in it.

At large shall mean the time when an animal is off or away from the premises of the owner, possessor or keeper thereof, and not under the control of such owner, possessor or keeper, or his agent or a member of his immediate family by a leash or lead capable of restraining the Animal. Animals tethered to a stationary object within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path are deemed to be at large.

Dwelling unit shall mean one (1) or more rooms designed for or occupied as a unit by one (1) family for living and cooking purposes.

Ear tipping shall mean straight-line cutting of the tip of the left ear of a cat while the cat is anesthetized.

Feral cat shall mean a free-roaming cat that is partially socialized or unsocialized to humans and tends to resist contact with humans.

Humane Destruction shall mean euthanasia administered by a qualified veterinarian or veterinary technician.

Nuisance shall mean any animal which:

(1) Molests passersby or passing vehicles;

(2) Attacks other animals;

(3) Is at large in violation of Section 3-31 of this Code;

(4) Damages private or public property;

(5) Barks, whines, howls, or makes any other noise in a loud and persistent or habitual fashion so as to disturb any person or neighborhood;

(6) Is diseased.

Owner shall mean any person, partnership or corporation in possession of, harboring, or who shall allow any animal to remain about their premises for a period of three (3) consecutive days or more, excluding sponsors of feral cats as addressed in this article. The person named on the registration record of any animal as the owner shall be deemed, prima facie, the owner thereof, but the term owner shall also include, but shall

not be limited to, the occupant of the premises where the animal is usually kept, if such premises are other than the premises of the owner as shown on the registration record; or any person having control or purporting to have control over any animal which is running at large. The parent or guardian of an owner under eighteen (18) years of age shall be deemed the owner, as defined in this section.

Potbelly pig shall mean a miniature porcine which shall not exceed eighteen (18) inches in height at the shoulder and one hundred fifteen (115) pounds in weight, and shall include, but not be limited to, the North American potbelly pig, the Vietnamese potbelly pig, and the Chinese potbelly pig.

Public nuisance shall mean any animal which:

(1) Molests passersby or passing vehicles;

(2) Attacks other animals;

(3) Is at large;

(4) Damages private or public property;

(5) Barks, whines, howls, or makes any other noise in a loud and persistent or habitual fashion so as to disturb any person or neighborhood;

(6) Is diseased.

Restraint shall mean securing an animal by a leash or lead so that it is under the physical control of a responsible person, or tethered to a stationary object not within range of a public street, sidewalk, alley or common path, or keeping an animal within a fence or other enclosure which restrains the animal to a particular premises.

Stray cat shall mean a free-roaming domesticated cat that does not have a tag, electronic ID, or other means of identifying its owner.

Trap shall mean any device used to contain or capture an animal. There are two (2) types of traps:

- (1) *Humane trap* is a device designed to capture or contain an animal without causing any injury to the animal;
- (2) *Inhumane trap* is a device designed to capture or contain an animal which causes injury to the animal as the result of the trap's operation.

Trap, Neuter & Return (TNR) shall mean a non-lethal approach to feral cat population control where feral cats are humanely trapped, sterilized, vaccinated, ear-tipped, and then returned to the location where they were originally trapped

Veterinary hospital shall mean any establishment maintained and operated by a licensed veterinarian for surgery, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injuries of animals.

Vicious animal includes, but is not limited to, dogs and means:

(1) Any animal with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack unprovoked, to cause injury to, or otherwise threaten the safety of human beings or domestic animals; or

- (3) Any animal which, without provocation, attacks or bites, or has attacked or bitten, a human being or domestic animal; or
- (4) Any animal owned or harbored primarily or in part for the purpose of animal fighting or any animal trained for animal fighting.

Wild animal shall mean any live ferret, fox, leopard, lion, lynx, monkey (nonhuman primate), panther, poisonous snake, raccoon, skunk, tiger or any other warm-blooded animal which can normally be found in the wild state.

Sec. 3-2. - Declaration of city as wild bird refuge.

The area within the limits of the city is hereby made and constituted a bird sanctuary for the refuge of wild birds, and all persons are urged to protect the wild birds and encourage their propagation and refuge within such sanctuary.

Sec. 3-3. - Abuse of wild birds prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person at any time within the city to frighten, shoot at, wound, kill, capture, ensnare, net, trap or in any other manner to molest or injure any wild bird, or in any manner, to molest or injure the nest, eggs or young of any such birds, provided that this section shall not be construed to apply to English or European house sparrows or to starlings, and provided further that the chief of police shall have authority to grant a permit for the killing or the capture of pigeons or other birds when it is shown that the same are or have become a nuisance or health hazard in any particular location.

Sec. 3-4. - Keeping of bees prohibited.

The keeping of hives within the city is a menace to the public health and safety of the inhabitants of the city, and is hereby declared a nuisance and is prohibited.

Sec. 3-5. - Quantity of animals, prohibition on keeping livestock, feral cat colonies.

- (a) Except as set forth below concerning feral cat colonies, and below and in section 21-150 concerning poultry and rabbits, it shall be unlawful to keep any animal in quantities of more than four (4) adult animals per dwelling unit, regardless of whether the animal is an indoor or an outdoor pet.
- (b) No person shall keep within the city limits any livestock, whether as a pet or otherwise, including, but not limited to, horses, mules, burros, cows, sheep, goats, swine (excepting potbelly pigs) or any other animal typically raised for consumption such as rabbits or poultry, except as allowed below:
 - (1) Livestock may be kept in agricultural zones.
 - (2) Any person may keep rabbits or poultry (except for mature roosters, pea fowl, and guinea fowl, which may not be kept for any purpose whatsoever) solely for purposes of sale as livestock so long as the following conditions are met:
 - a. All animals are kept indoors or under adequate outdoor shelter;
 - b. Animals are kept and offered for sale for a limited period of time not to exceed seven (7) consecutive weeks and no more than twenty-six (26) weeks in any given year;
 - c. The person has a valid retail sales tax license and is otherwise in compliance with the licensing and taxation provisions of the Code of Ordinances Alamosa, Colorado;

- d. Any person keeping rabbits or poultry for sale shall possess all necessary federal and state licenses relating to the keeping and sale of such livestock.
- (3) Other than for purposes of sale, as outlined above, poultry and rabbits may only be kept in accordance with the restrictions and limitations set out in section 21-150 of this Code.
- (4) A person with a disability may keep a trained service animal used by the person with a disability as a service animal to assist with specific needs or perform work as recognized in the Americans With Disabilities Act.
- (c) Feral cat colonies
 - (1) It shall be unlawful for any person to feed stray or feral cats unless such person participates in the Trap, Neuter & Return ("TNR") program designed to reduce the population of feral cats within the City, and managed by the City as set forth below.
 - (2) Persons may make application to the Alamosa Police Department to serve as a sponsor of a TNR program. The Police Department shall have discretion to refuse the application on the grounds that it would not be in the public interest for any reason including, but not limited to, reasons based on the location of the colony or the character, reputation, or suitability of the applicant. TNR program sponsors shall have the following responsibilities:
 - i. ___Register each feral cat colony they are managing with the Alamosa Police Department, including the general location, number of cats in the colony, and number of caretakers working with the colony;
 - ii Trap and spay, neuter, vaccinate, and ear tip (so that spayed, neutered, and vaccinated cats can be readily identified) feral cats that are members of the colony, working with the City's TNR program. The sponsor shall keep records sufficient to identify each vaccinated cat and the date of vaccination so that the vaccination schedule for such cat may be appropriately monitored.
 - iii Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the total number of members and the number of sterilized members of each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;
 - iv Record and report to the Alamosa Police Department, on an annual basis, the number of kittens born into each feral cat colony for which they have implemented a TNR program;
 - v. Take all reasonable steps to (1) remove kittens from the colony after they have been weaned, (2) place the kittens in homes or foster homes for the purpose of subsequent permanent placement, and (3) capture and spay the mother cat.
 - vi. Monitor each member of the colony for rabies or other disease, and take appropriate steps to address any such disease.
 - vii. Address complaints received by the Alamosa Police Department regarding any feral cat colony they sponsor, and remediate any problems with the colony, including by working with local animal welfare groups to increase the pace of any TNR program, and/or to find foster homes, permanent homes, or no-kill shelters to which nuisance animals may be relocated.

(3) It shall be unlawful for any person to continue to feed stray or feral cats in a registered feral cat colony where such feeding causes a nuisance to neighbors or creates a condition contrary to the health, safety, and welfare of the community. Any member cat of a feral cat colony that has become a nuisance, or the entire colony if it has become a nuisance, may be impounded and disposed of pursuant to the provisions of this Article.

Sec. 3-6. - Confiscation of unauthorized traps.

- (a) The use of unauthorized or inhumane traps within the city shall be prohibited.
- (b) Unauthorized or inhumane traps which are reported or discovered to be in use within the city shall be confiscated and destroyed.

Sec. 3-7. - Unprovoked biting of humans.

- (a) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the first time, the animal may be barred from this city or <u>humanely</u> destroyed as directed by the municipal court.
- (b) If any animal is involved in the unprovoked biting of a human being for the second time, the animal shall be barred from this city or <u>humanely</u> destroyed as directed by the municipal court.

Sec. 3-8. - Enforcement personnel.

The provisions of this chapter shall be enforced by the animal control officer and such other persons or agencies as may be designated by the city council.

Sec. 3-9. - Interference with enforcement; right of entry.

- (a) It shall be a violation of this chapter to interfere with an animal control officer or a police officer, or to fail to obey the lawful order of an animal control officer or police officer.
- (b) The animal control officers and police officers are hereby authorized to enter upon any premises within the municipality for the purpose of impounding animals which the officer is authorized under this chapter to impound or for any other purpose authorized in this chapter.

Sec. 3-10. - Cruelty to animals.

- (a) *Definitions*. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:
 - (1) *Abandon* means and includes the leaving of an animal by its owner or other person responsible for its care or custody without making effective provisions for its proper care;
 - (2) *Mistreatment* means and includes every act or omission which causes, or unreasonably permits the continuation of, unnecessary or unjustifiable pain or suffering;
 - (3) *Neglect* means and includes failure to provide food, water, protection from the elements, opportunity for exercise or other care normal, usual and proper for an animal's health and well-being.
- (b) It is unlawful for any person, except as authorized by law, to knowingly or with criminal negligence overdrive, overload, overwork, torture, torment, deprive of necessary sustenance, unnecessarily or cruelly beat, needlessly mutilate, needlessly kill, carry in or upon any vehicle in a cruel manner or

otherwise mistreat or neglect any animal, or cause it to be done, or, having the charge and custody of any animal, to fail to provide it with proper food, drink, or protection from the weather, or abandon it.

- (c) In the case of any person incurring a second or subsequent conviction under the provisions of subsection (b) above, a sentence of imprisonment within the minimum and maximum terms shall be mandatory and shall not be subject to suspension, nor shall such person be eligible for probation or parole for any part of such period. A plea of nolo contendere accepted by the court shall be considered a conviction for the purposes of this section.
- (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend or in any manner change the authority of the wildlife commission, as established in C.R.S. title 33, or to prohibit any conduct therein authorized or permitted.
- Sec. 3-11. Riding or driving animals on sidewalks.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal upon any sidewalk or levee within the city.

Sec. 3-12. - Riding or driving animals.

It shall be unlawful for any person to ride or drive any animal through any street, alley or other public place in such a manner as to endanger the life or limb of any person or in such a manner as to create terror in the mind of any person.

Sec. 3-13. - Violations; fines; penalties.

- (a) The violation of any of the provisions of this chapter not involving the biting of a person, except section 3-69, shall be deemed a public nuisance. A violation of section 3-69, whether or not involving the biting of a person, shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance as provided in said section 3-69.
- (b) The violation of the provisions of this chapter involving the biting of a person shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance.
- (c) The owner of an animal found to be a public nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolutions adopted by the city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this Code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.
- (d) The owner of an animal found to be an aggravated nuisance shall be assessed a fine not less than that designated, from time to time by resolution adopted by city council, which fines may not exceed the general penalty authorized for violations of this code, and which shall be minimum and mandatory, and the court shall neither suspend, abate, nor defer all or any portion of such fines.
- (e) In lieu of any of the above fines, the owner may elect to euthanize the animal which caused the violation at the owner's expense.

Secs. 3-14—3-30. - Reserved.

Sec. 3-31. - Running at large.

It shall be unlawful for the owner, possessor or keeper of any animal to permit it to run at large within the city. If an animal is found to be running at large within the city, the owner, possessor or keeper shall be presumed to have violated this article, except that this subsection shall not apply during the controlled

environment of a city-operated or a city-approved obedience school, <u>nor to ear-tipped feral cats</u>, <u>nor to</u> <u>domestic cats with tags or electronic ID identifying the owner and providing the owner's telephone number</u>, <u>so long as such cats are not causing a nuisance</u>.

Sec. 3-32. - Male potbelly pigs to be neutered; breeding prohibited.

Every male potbelly pig four (4) months of age or older shall be neutered. It shall be unlawful to breed potbelly pigs within the city limits of the City of Alamosa.

Secs. 3-33—3-45. - Reserved.

ARTICLE II. - LICENSING OF DOGS AND POTBELLY PIGS

Sec. 3-46. - Required; application.

- (a) Any person owning, keeping, harboring or having custody of any dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age within the city must obtain a license as provided in this article.
- (b) Application for a license must be made within thirty (30) days after obtaining a dog or potbelly pig over three (3) months of age, within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig is brought into the city or within thirty (30) days after such dog or potbelly pig reaches three (3) months of age, except that this requirement will not apply to a nonresident keeping a dog or potbelly pig within the city for no longer than sixty (60) days.

Sec. 3-47. - Contents of application.

Written application for licenses shall be made to the police department. Such application shall include the following information:

- (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the owner;
- (2) The call-name, breed, age, color and sex of the dog or potbelly pig;
- (3) The appropriate fee;
- (4) A valid rabies vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian which shall include the following information:
 - a. The name, address and telephone number of the owner of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig;
 - b. The date of vaccination;
 - c. The date of expiration of the vaccination;
 - d. The type of rabies vaccine used;
 - e. The year and number of the rabies tag;
 - f. The breed, age, color and sex of the vaccinated dog or potbelly pig; and
 - g. The signature of the veterinarian administering the vaccine.

Sec. 3-48. - License tags; duplicate tags; transfer.

- (a) Upon acceptance of the license application and fee, the police department shall issue a durable tag stamped with an identifying number and year of issuance. Tags should be designed so that they may be conveniently fastened or riveted to the animal's collar or harness.
- (b) Dogs and potbelly pigs must wear license tags on collars or harnesses at all times, provided that, dogs which have been properly tattooed in the right groin area with an identification number approved by the city clerk at the time the required license tag is issued, shall not be required to wear a license tag on a collar only when such dogs are restrained on the owner's premises.
- (c) A duplicate license may be obtained upon payment of a one dollar (\$1.00) replacement fee.
- (d) No person may use any license for any animal other than the animal for which it was issued.
- Sec. 3-49. Records.

The police department shall maintain a record of the identifying numbers of all tags and tattoos issued and shall make this record available to the public.

Sec. 3-50. - Licensing period; expiration.

- (a) The licensing period shall begin with the calendar year and shall run for one (1) year. Application for a license may be made thirty (30) days prior to, and up to thirty (30) days after, the start of the calendar year, except that for those animals which are acquired or brought into the city or reach the age of three (3) months the application for license shall be made within thirty (30) days after such event.
- (b) If not revoked, licenses for the keeping of dogs and potbelly pigs shall be for a period of up to one (1) year expiring on the thirty-first day of December of the year of issuance.

Sec. 3-51. - License fees.

- (a) A license shall be issued after payment of the applicable fee:
 - (1) Each dog or potbelly pig, under one (1) year of age, per year \$ 2.00
 - (2) Each neutered/spayed dog or potbelly pig, per year 2.00
 - (3) All other dogs or potbelly pigs, each, per year 10.00
- (b) Seeing-eye dogs, hearing dogs or governmental police dogs shall be licensed without fee.

Secs. 3-52—3-65. - Reserved.

ARTICLE III. - CONTROL, CARE AND TREATMENT

Sec. 3-66. - Required.

No person shall fail to exercise proper care and control of his animals or of any animals within his care and custody, thereby allowing them to become a public nuisance.

Sec. 3-67. - Disturbance of peace and quiet.

No owner, possessor, or keeper of an animal within the city shall permit such animal to disturb the peace and quiet of any person or neighborhood by barking, whining, howling or making any other noise in a loud, persistent or habitual fashion. If any animal does so disturb the peace and quiet, the owner, possessor, or keeper shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this article, provided that no such owner, possessor, or keeper shall be charged in municipal court with a violation of this subsection unless he/she or a member of his/her household over the age of eighteen (18) years has received a written warning from the city of a previous complaint once within the preceding twelve (12) months. It shall not be necessary for the purposes of this section to identify and describe the particular animal which is making such noise, but shall only be necessary to show who has possession, care, custody or control of the animal.

Sec. 3-68. - Dogs in heat.

Every female dog in heat shall be confined in a building or secured enclosure in such a manner that such female dog cannot come into contact with another animal, except for planned breeding.

Sec. 3-69. - Vicious animals.

- (a) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go unconfined. A vicious animal is unconfined within the provisions of this chapter if the animal is not securely confined indoors or confined in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure upon the premises of the owner of the animal, with such pen or structure having at least those structural qualifications as follows:
 - (1) The pen or structure must have secured sides and a secured top attached to the sides;
 - (2) If the pen or structure has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be embedded into the ground no less than two (2) feet;
 - (3) All such pens or structures shall be adequately lighted and kept in a clean and sanitary condition.
- (b) The owner of a vicious animal shall not suffer or permit the animal to go beyond the premises of the owner unless the animal is securely muzzled and restrained by a chain or leash and under the physical restraint of a person. The muzzle shall be made in a manner that will not cause injury to the animal or interfere with its vision or respiration, but shall prevent it from biting any human or animal.
- (c) The owner of a vicious animal shall display in a prominent place on his premises a clearly visible warning sign indicating that there is a vicious animal on the premises. A similar sign is required to be posted on the pen or structure in which the animal is kept.
- (d) Owners of vicious animals must, upon licensing of such animal, provide proof to the city clerk of liability insurance for the benefit of the public at large in the amount of at least fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00), insuring the owner against liability for any personal injuries inflicted by his vicious animal.
- (e) No person shall possess or harbor or maintain care or custody of any animal for the purpose of animal fighting, or train, torment, badger, bait or use any animal for the purpose of causing or encouraging the animal to attack human beings or domestic animals.
- (f) A violation of this section shall be deemed an aggravated public nuisance and, upon conviction thereof, the violator shall be fined as provided in section 3-13.
- (g) Upon an animal first being found or declared to be vicious by the municipal court, in addition to any other penalties provided in this chapter, said court may enter an order either barring said vicious animal from the city or ordering the <u>humane</u> destruction of the same.

(h) Upon the violation of this section 3-69 for a second time with respect to any animal, the court shall order the <u>humane</u> destruction of said animal in a humane way and shall add to any fine imposed hereunder the reasonable costs of said destruction which shall be assessed as court costs.

Sec. 3-70. - Treatment of animals; cruelty; abandonment.

- (a) No owner shall fail to provide his/her animals with sufficiently good and wholesome food and water, proper shelter and protection from the weather, veterinary care when needed to prevent suffering, and humane care and treatment.
- (b) No person shall beat, cruelly ill-treat, torment, overload, overwork or otherwise abuse or kill an animal, nor cause, instigate or permit any dogfight, cockfight, bullfight or other combat between animals or between animals and humans.
- (c) No owner of an animal shall abandon such animal.

Sec. 3-71. - Vehicular accidents with animals.

Any person who, as the operator of a vehicle, strikes a domestic animal shall stop at once and shall immediately report such injury or death to the animal's owner. If the owner cannot be ascertained and located, the operator shall at once report the accident to the animal control officer or the local police department.

Sec. 3-72. - Poisoning prohibited.

No person shall expose any known poisonous substance, whether fixed with food or not, so that the same shall be liable to be eaten by any animal, provided that it shall not be unlawful for a person to expose for exterminating rats on his own property common rat poison mixed only with vegetable substances.

Sec. 3-73. - Removal of dead animals required.

If any animal shall die in the possession of any person in this city, it shall be the duty of such owner to cause the animal to be appropriately disposed of. Such disposal may include burial on property within the city limits only if all parts of the dead animal are covered by at least four feet of earth. In case the owner of any such animal shall neglect or refuse to properly dispose of the animal within ten (10) hours after its death, the police department shall cause the dead animal to be removed at the expense of the owner. Whenever the owner of any dead animal cannot be found or ascertained, it shall be the duty of the animal control officer to dispose of the animal.

Sec. 3-74. - Trapping of animals.

No person shall set, or cause to be set, an unauthorized or inhumane trap within the city, except that rodent snap-traps baited with vegetable or dairy products may be used on private property.

Sec. 3-75. - Removal of animal waste required.

The owner or person having control or purporting to have control over any animal shall remove any feces deposited by his animal on public walks, recreation areas or private property.

Sec. 3-76. Reserved

Sec. 3-78. - Wild animals as pets or for display.

- (a) No person shall keep or permit to be kept any wild animal as a pet.
- (b) No person shall keep or permit to be kept on his premises any wild or vicious animal for display or for exhibition purposes, whether gratuitously or for a fee. This section shall not be construed to apply to zoological parks, performing animal exhibitions or circuses.

Sec. 3-79. - Maltreatment of performing animals prohibited.

- (a) No performing animal exhibition or circus shall be permitted in which animals are induced or encouraged to perform through the use of chemical, mechanical, electrical or manual devices in a manner which will cause or is likely to cause physical injury or suffering.
- (b) All equipment used on a performing animal shall fit properly and be in good working condition.

Secs. 3-80—3-95. - Reserved.

ARTICLE IV. - RABIES CONTROL

Sec. 3-96. - Vaccination required.

All dogs and potbelly pigs three (3) months of age or older shall be vaccinated against rabies. All dogs and potbelly pigs vaccinated at three (3) months of age or older shall be revaccinated at one (1) year of age and thereafter at intervals recommended in the current *Compendium of Animal Rabies Vaccines*. If any dog or potbelly pig is found within the city without a current rabies vaccination tag or current license tag affixed to its collar or harness, the owner of such dog or potbelly pig shall be presumed to have violated the provision of this article.

Sec. 3-97. - Reporting animal bites.

- (a) Any person having knowledge that an animal, other than a rodent, rabbit, bird or reptile, has bitten a human being shall immediately report the incident to the animal control office or police department.
- (b) If any animal is suspected of having rabies or if any animal has bitten a person and such animal has not had a current vaccination, such animal shall be confined for a period of at least ten (10) days by a leash, chain or cage at the animal shelter or a veterinary hospital of the owner's choice, all at the expense of the owner of the animal. During the ten-day observation period, no rabies vaccine shall be administered to the animal.
- (c) No animal held for observation on suspicion of rabies shall be released until the observation period is over, except that if the owner shows proof of current rabies vaccination, the animal may be released into quarantine at the owner's residence, at the discretion of the animal control officer.

- (d) If any animal has been bitten by another animal suspected of having rabies, the owner of such animal so exposed to rabies shall report such fact to the animal control officer, local humane society officer or police department. If either animal has not been vaccinated against rabies, the animal control officer shall have the power, in his discretion, to have such animal removed from the owner's premises to a veterinary hospital, and there placed under observation for a period of up to six (6) months at the expense of the owner, provided that the owner may elect in lieu thereof to have such animal <u>humanely</u> destroyed.
- (e) If a standard incubation period has not been established by the state department of health for the particular species of animal, it shall be summarily destroyed and if involved with another animal or human, a necropsy shall be performed by a certified laboratory to determine rabies contamination.

Sec. 3-98. - Animals with rabies.

If rabies has been ascertained in any animal, such animal shall be summarily <u>humanely</u> destroyed.

Secs. 3-99—3-115. - Reserved.

ARTICLE V. - IMPOUNDMENT

Sec. 3-116. - Conditions and authority.

Unrestrained dogs and potbelly pigs, maltreated animals and nuisance animals, including <u>eatsany</u> <u>animal</u> running at large who are not ear tipped as membersin violation of a registered feral cat colonySection <u>3-31 of this Code</u>, may be taken by police officers, animal control officers or humane officers and impounded in an animal shelter, or other appropriate location, and there confined in a humane manner. <u>Unless causing a nuisance, stray cats and feral cats shall be neutered, ear-tipped, vaccinated, and returned to the location where they were taken.</u>

Sec. 3-117. - Unclaimed animals.

Unclaimed animals shall be kept for not less than five (5) days. If the City does not have access to facilities to house the animal, and no owner can reasonably be identified, the City shall have the option to dispose of the animal in whatever manner deemed appropriate, including destroying the animal in a humane manner. Sec. 3-118. - Notice.

Immediately upon impoundment, the animal control officer or humane society officer shall notify the owner of such impounded animal, if the owner can be identified, that such animal has been impounded. Such notice shall be by telephone if possible, otherwise by mail, and a description of the animal shall be posted at city hall and at the animal shelter.

Sec. 3-118. - Unclaimed animals.

<u>Unclaimed animals shall be kept for not less than five (5) days. If the City does not have access to facilities to house the animal, and no owner can reasonably be identified, the City shall have the option to dispose of the animal in whatever manner deemed appropriate. The City shall first endeavor to work with</u>

local animal welfare groups to find foster homes, permanent homes or a no kill shelter to which the animal can be relocated. Humane destruction shall be the least preferred alternative.

Sec. 3-119. - Release of animals.

- (a) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for the first time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00), plus a daily boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval of the city manager.
- (b) An owner reclaiming an impounded animal for each subsequent time within a twelve-month period shall pay a fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00), plus a daily boarding fee as established by the operator of the animal shelter, subject to approval by the city manager.
- (c) An owner reclaiming an impounded dog or potbelly pig which is not validly licensed must license the dog or potbelly pig and present evidence thereof to the person in charge of the animal shelter. If the dog or potbelly pig does not have a current rabies tag, the owner shall present a current rabies vaccination certificate for such dog or potbelly pig duly issued by a licensed veterinarian, or, in lieu thereof, the owner may place a cash deposit of fifty dollars (\$50.00) with the city to be refunded to the owner upon presenting, within five (5) days thereafter, proof of vaccination and license.

Sec. 3-120. - Animal holding periods; disposition of unclaimed animals.

- (a) Any pet animal not reclaimed by its owner shall be held, except as provided in sub-part (b) of this section, by the city for a minimum of five (5) days before it may become available for adoption or otherwise disposed of at the discretion of the animal control officer. For purposes of this section "days" means days during which the shelter at which the animal is being held is open to the public.
- (b) No unclaimed dog, cat, or potbelly pig shall be released for adoption without being sterilized,
- (c) Pet animals which, in the opinion of a veterinarian, are experiencing extreme pain or suffering may be disposed of immediately by the city through euthanasia after the animal control officer, or her designee, has made reasonable efforts to contact the owner. For pet animals with identification, reasonable efforts to contact the owner of twenty-four (24) hours.

Section 2. General Repealer

All acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 3. Recording and Authentication

This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City Book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.

Section 4. Publication and Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.

Section 7. Declaration of Public Interest

This ordinance is necessary to preserve the peace, health, safety, welfare, and to serve the best interest of the citizens of the City of Alamosa, Colorado.

INTRODUCED, READ AND ORDERED published the 1st day of March, 2017, and a public hearing hereon fixed for the 15th day of March, 2017, at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard.

Recommended Action:

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE CITY OF ALAMOSA'S PUBLIC ART PROGRAM FOR 2017

WHEREAS, Public art was identified in Alamosa's 2017 Comprehensive Plan as a goal for the downtown, in order to help beautify and revitalize the downtown, with the goal of the program being to promote and exhibit artwork while also enhancing the community atmosphere and creating a unique sense of place; and

WHEREAS, Council has authorized City staff to modify locations if the specifications for installation warrant a more appropriate location; and

WHEREAS, Council has directed the expenditure of \$40,000 in 2016 and 2017 for marketing, acquisition and installation of display pedestals, honoraria, awards, liability and hazard insurance; and other expenses associated with the art pieces,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Alamosa, Colorado:

1. That the Public Art in Alamosa Program is hereby established;

2. That the Mayor or Mayor pro-tem are authorized to sign any and all documents necessary to further the program, including, without limitation, contracts with the selected artists;

3. That the locations listed on the attached map are approved for the installation of the selected pieces of art for 2017.

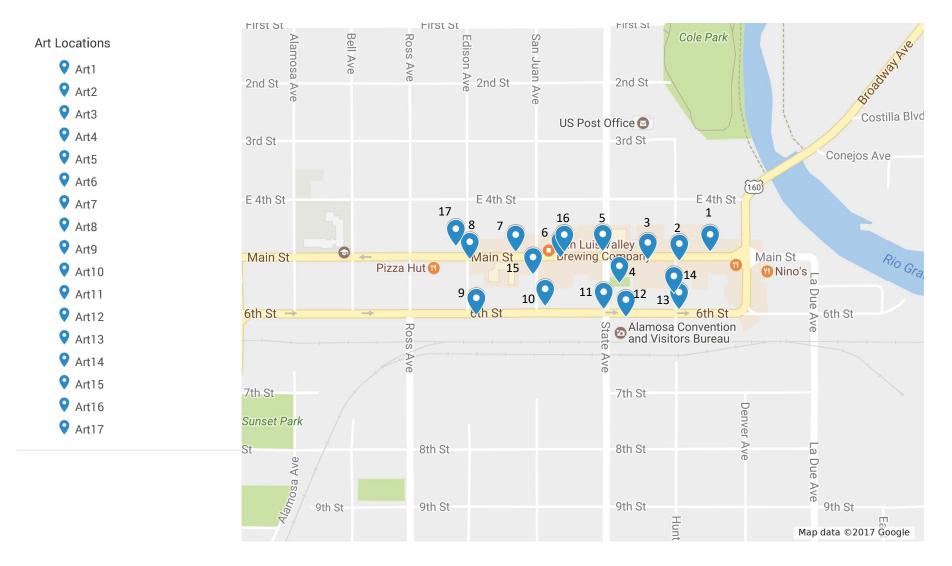

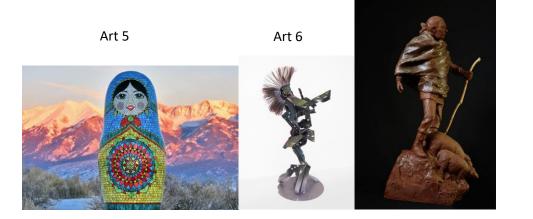

Subject/Title:

Public Hearing and Second Reading, Ordinance No. 10-2017, An ordinance amending Sec. 20-83 of the *Code* of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa to recognize the ability of non-city haulers to haul commercial solid waste.

Recommended Action:

Conduct a Public Hearing and unless information is presented to the contrary, approve Ordinance No. 10-2017 on second reading.

Background:

Section 20-83 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* prohibits anyone who is not an agent or employee of the City of Alamosa from collecting and disposing of solid waste within the City of Alamosa. However, the City has not enforced this ordinance with respect to commercial properties or residences of eight or more units, because C.R.S. § 30-15-401 prohibits municipalities from compelling industrial or commercial establishments, or multi-family residences of eight or more units, to use or pay user charges for waste services provided by the municipality rather than by a private person.

This conflict recently caused confusion when notices of the new trash rates were sent out. The Ordinance should be aligned with State law and with the current practice of the City. A redline of how the ordinance will change is included with the backup materials.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the Ordinance amending Section 20-83 governing trash collection on second reading?

Alternatives:

1) Approve the Ordinance on second reading.

2) Approve the Ordinance with changes such as to the types of properties exempt from the requirement to use City trash collection services.

3) Decline to approve the Ordinance in whole or in part, and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

None.

Legal Opinion:

As currently written, Sec. 20-83 conflicts with state law. The state law is most likely a matter of statewide concern, and would control over inconsistent local home rule ordinances.

Conclusion:

Approval of this Ordinance would align the trash collection ordinance with current practice and with state law.

ORDINANCE NO. 10-2017

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SEC. 20-83 OF THE *CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ALAMOSA* TO RECOGNIZE THE ABILITY OF NON-CITY HAULERS TO HAUL COMMERCIAL SOLID WASTE

WHEREAS, Section 20-83 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* prohibits anyone who is not an agent or employee of the City of Alamosa from collecting and disposing of solid waste within the City of Alamosa; and

WHEREAS, C.R.S. § 30-15-401 prohibits municipalities from compelling industrial or commercial establishments, or multi-family residences of eight or more units, to use or pay user charges for waste services provided by the municipality rather than by a private person; and

WHEREAS, Council recognizes that Section 20-83 of the *Code of Ordinances of the City of Alamosa* conflicts with C.R.S. § 30-15-401 and that the City, because of such conflict, has not enforced Section 20-83 with respect to commercial and industrial establishments or multi-family residences of eight or more units; and

WHEREAS, Council desires to align the City ordinance with State law and with the current practice of the City;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of Alamosa as follows:

Section 1. <u>Repeal and Replacement of Chapter 20, ARTICLE IV, Section 20-83</u>. Section 20-83 of The *Code of Ordinances of Alamosa, Colorado* is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

Sec. 20-83. - Collection and disposal by city agents and employees; exceptions.

The city, by and through its duly authorized agents and employees, shall be the sole agency for the collection and disposal of garbage for single-family residences and multifamily residences of seven or fewer units. No person except duly authorized agents and employees of the city shall collect or dispose of any garbage or rubbish from such entities, whether his own or that of others within the limits of the city. This prohibition shall not apply to the collection or disposal of garbage or rubbish from any commercial or industrial establishment, nor of any multi-family residence of eight or more units where such units share a common collection point that is contracted for by the owner of the multi-family residence. This prohibition also shall not apply to any entity, whether residential or commercial, which reasonably requires a manner of collection and/or disposal for which the city manager reasonably has determined and designated in writing to the entity that the city is not equipped to provide such service. Nothing in this article shall be construed to relieve any contractor of the obligation of cleaning up premises after completion of his contract. Nothing in this article shall be construed to prevent any residential user from hauling his or her own garbage and rubbish if it is properly disposed of in conformity with all applicable

regulations, provided that such hauling shall not affect the obligation of such individual to pay the charges hereafter set forth.

Section 2. <u>Severability:</u> Should any section, clause, sentence, or part of this Ordinance be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect, impair or invalidate the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 3. <u>General Repealer</u>. All other acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with the sections adopted in this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 4. <u>Recording and Authentication</u>. This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.

Section 5. <u>Publication and Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.

Section 6. <u>Declaration of Public Interest</u>. This ordinance is necessary to preserve the peace, health, safety, welfare, and to serve the best interest of the citizens of the City of Alamosa, Colorado.

INTRODUCED, READ AND APPROVED on first reading the 5th day of April, 2017, and ordered published by title and reference as provided by law with notice of a public hearing to be held for consideration of the adoption of said ordinance on the 19th day of April, 2017, at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, or on such subsequent date to which the public hearing or Council consideration may be continued.

The city, by and through its duly authorized agents and employees, shall be the sole agency for the collection and disposal of garbage and as herein defined, for single-family residences, and multifamily residences and businesses. of seven or fewer units. No person, except-such duly authorized agents and employees of the city, shall collect or dispose of any garbage or rubbish from such entities, whether his own or that of others within the limits of the city; provided, however, that this. ALAMOSA CITY COUNCIL COUNCIL COMMUNICATION

Subject/Title:

2017 Support for Alamosa Farmers' Market

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that City Council contribute \$1,000 towards the Alamosa Farmers' Market for the 2017 season.

Background:

The Alamosa Farmers' Market is held downtown at the corner of State Avenue and 6th Street. The market has seen progressive growth in both vendors and customers over the years with a 14-week season.

Currently vendors are charged \$10/week for booth space and discounts are provided if vendors book for the entire season. The Board has struggled with what seems like a reasonable increase of \$5/week, but represents a 50% increase, which can eat into already small margins for the farmers. The Board has also weighed how to increase the rates more incrementally over several years, but this option is not viable if expenses are not reduced. Reducing expenses is very challenging considering the total budget is less than \$12,000. Representatives from the Board will be present to review expenses and revenues along with other details of the Market.

Staff believes that the Farmers' Market contributes to both the quality of life and economic base of Alamosa. The location of the Market downtown draws visitors to adjacent businesses and fits perfectly with the recently completed Comprehensive Plan. The contribution of \$1,000 would allow the Board to incrementally increase the booth rates and maintain participation from local, small farmers. Staff has advised the Board that for future funding, it should look at the Outside Funding Process.

For full transparency, it is important to note that the City Manager serves on the Board.

Issue Before the Council:

Does City Council wish to contribute \$1,000 towards the Alamosa Farmers' Market for the 2017 season?

Alternatives:

City Council can contribute any amount it feels is appropriate to the Alamosa Farmers' Market or decline to contribute at this time.

Fiscal Impact:

The Non-Departmental line item for Economic Development has \$65,480 budgeted for 2017. Of that amount, \$46,000 is earmarked for specific programs which leaves just under \$20,000 available for specific projects.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be available for questions.

Conclusion:

The Alamosa Farmers' Market adds to both the quality of life and economic base for the Alamosa community. The \$1,000 contribution will allow the Market to cover needed expenses while maintaining affordable rates for local farmers.

Subject/Title:

Direction regarding potential Site Lease with Community Energy Inc. for the development of solar projects on the City of Alamosa Ranch

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council consider the information provided by Community Energy Inc. and determine if there is enough interest in continuing conversations.

Background:

Mr. Tyson Taylor, Project Consultant with Community Energy Inc. contacted staff on April 5th inquiring if the City would be interested in leasing a portion of the ranch as part of Xcel Energy's Community Solar Garden program. Mr. Taylor has indicated that the discussions with potential land owners needs to occur quickly. Clearly there are many details that would need to be worked out through conversations such as the exact location of the facility, lease amount, landscaping/buffering, impact on current lease, etc. However, given the swiftness in which Community Energy Inc. is moving and the colorful political history of the ranch, staff felt it was prudent to bring the information to City Council to receive direction on if there is enough interest to continue the discussions.

Mr. Taylor will be present to offer more detailed information and answer questions. Below is the information that has been presented to staff thus far.

The project is part of Xcel Energy's Community Solar Garden program, which makes the panels available to local subscribers who want solar power but do not have land or roof space for panels. Community Energy Inc. typically leases the land for the term of the development, 20-30 years, after which the land is returned back to the landowner. They are proposing a 1MW facility located in the NW corner of the property (see attached map) in an attempt to keep it back from the highway and away from the farm buildings. The site is typically enclosed in an agricultural/deer fencing, 6'-8' high. The connection from the project would be underground out to the 3-phase line along the highway. Also attached is a draft of the site control agreement, basically the term is 20-30 years to cover the life of the project. Community Energy Inc. is offering to pay \$500 per acre, per year after the project goes operational.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to have staff continue discussions with Community Energy Inc.?

Alternatives:

Council can direct staff to continue discussions, provide direction for those discussions, or indicate that there is not enough interest to warrant continued discussions.

Fiscal Impact:

The City currently has a lease for \$10,000/year that allows cattle on the ranch. We are unsure how

this property could potentially impact that lease agreement and if changes would be amenable with the current lessee. The estimated lease under the proposed terms offered by Community Energy Inc. is approximately \$6,500/year.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be present for any questions.

Conclusion:

Community Energy Inc. has indicated that the discussions regarding the potential lease of ranch property must occur quickly, which has prompted staff to bring the issue before Council to determine what the potential interest is for continued discussions.

SOLAR FARM SITE CONTROL AGREEMENT

RECITALS

A. Company and Landowner are engaged in negotiations to enter into a ground lease for purposes of developing and operating a solar energy facility ("*Solar Facility*") located on certain real property owned by Landowner and located in Monte Vista, Colorado, as further described and depicted on Exhibit A which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference (the "*Property*").

B. If the above negotiations result in the full execution of a binding ground lease, the Solar Facility will consist of ground mounted photovoltaic solar panels, cabling, inverters, transformers, equipment necessary for interconnecting the Solar Facility to the electrical distribution or transmission system and all other facilities and improvements necessary for operation and maintenance of the Solar Facility.

C. Company intends to undertake due diligence investigations of the suitability of Landowner's Property for the development, construction and operation of the Solar Facility.

D. Landowner is willing to cooperate with development of the Solar Facility and will work with Company and its affiliates in good faith negotiations towards a mutually acceptable ground lease agreement.

AGREEMENT

THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Landowner and Company agree to the following terms:

1. <u>Cooperation in Development Activities.</u> Landowner agrees to cooperate with Company in its development activities as follows:

a. Landowner agrees to allow Company to include its Property in applications, drawings or exhibits that may be used related to the development of a Solar Facility on the Property.

b. Landowner agrees to grant Company, its employees, agents, contractors or subcontractors, at Company' sole cost and expense, the right to enter the Property for purposes of conducting due diligence for the Solar Facility, subject to twenty-four (24) hours prior notice of the date and time of the entry and of the specific inspections to be undertaken from Company and written approval, including email (if Landowner's email is provided below), of Landowner, not to be unreasonably withheld. Due diligence purposes include, but are not limited to,

surveying, soil borings, environmental assessments, the temporary (time frame coincident with the Term, as defined below, of this Agreement) installation, inspection, maintenance and removal of solar resource monitoring equipment and other related activities necessary for the development of the Solar Facility.

Landowner or Landowner's agent shall have the right to accompany Company and each of its representatives during any entry.

Upon completion of the inspection and tests, Company, at Company' sole cost and expense, shall fill all test holes and excavations, repair all damage to the Property, return the Property to its original state, and shall remove any debris caused by any inspection, test or sampling performed on behalf of Company.

c. Company agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Landowner from and against any and all damages, claims, actions, penalties, liabilities, judgments, losses and expenses, including attorney's fees and litigation costs, incurred by or asserted against Landowner as a result of or arising out of (i) Company's entry upon the Property; (ii) the entry of any individuals conducting or assisting in the studies, tests, borings, surveys, evaluations or inspections at the Property on behalf of Company; and (iii) location of any equipment on the Property by Company or any individuals conducting or assisting in the studies, tests, borings, surveys, evaluations or inspections at the Property on behalf of Company;

d. During the Term of this Agreement, Landowner shall not enter into any agreement that would otherwise preclude Company from developing the Solar Facility on the Property. This provision shall not prohibit Landowner from negotiating the sale or lease of the Property to any third party during the Term of this Agreement.

2. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement will be effective as of the Effective Date and shall automatically expire two years (2) after the Effective Date, upon the execution of a ground lease agreement between the parties or upon the termination of this Agreement in accordance with Article 8, below, whichever occurs first.

3. <u>Payments to Landowner.</u>

a. In consideration for entering into this Agreement, Company shall pay Landowner a one-time payment of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500). Company further agrees to compensate Landowner for any loss or destruction of crops or timber resulting from its activities on the Property at a rate equal to the fair market value.

b. Landlord shall furnish Tenant with a signed, completed form W-9 within ten (10) days following the Effective Date and thereafter within thirty (30) days of any event causing a change in any of the information set forth in the previously-delivered W-9, including any transfer or assignment of the Landlord's interest. For convenience, a form W-9 is attached.

4. <u>Future Lease Terms</u>. The parties hereto intend, but in no event shall be obligated, to execute a ground lease agreement (the "Lease") which shall contain the following agreed upon terms, among others:

a. <u>Development Feasibility Term Rent</u>. \$500.00 per year.

b. <u>Commercial Term Rent</u>. \$500.00 per acre per year, escalating at 1% annually.

c. <u>Development Feasibility Term</u>. The Development Feasibility Term shall commence on the effective date of the Lease and end on the earlier to occur of the Commercialization Date or two (2) years after the effective date of the Lease (the "*Development Feasibility Term*").

d. <u>Commercial Term</u>. The Commercial Term shall last for a period of thirty (30) years, subject to two (2), five (5) year options to extend at Company's discretion. During the Commercial Term, Company shall be responsible to pay Commercial Term Rent (as defined below), any increase in the property taxes, rental taxes, development fees and all improvements and costs associated with the development of the Solar Facility on the Property.

5. <u>Amendments.</u> No modification, extension, or renewal of this Agreement will be binding upon either party unless made in writing and signed by an authorized representative of each party.

6. <u>Confidential Information</u>. Landowner shall not publicly disclose the existence of this Agreement or its terms and conditions except to its attorneys, accountants or real estate brokers/agents. All documentation, technical and business information provided by Company to Landowner in the course of performing this Agreement shall be considered "Confidential Information" which Landowner agrees to hold in strictest confidence, and not to disclose to any person or use in any way for that party's own or another's benefit, except as provided above.

7. <u>Termination</u>. Company may terminate this Agreement as to all or any portion of the Property at any time during the Term of this Agreement. Company and Landowner agree that the execution of this Agreement shall not obligate either party to subsequently execute a ground lease.

9. <u>Successors and Assigns.</u> This Agreement shall run with the land, and may be assigned subject to the same terms and conditions. This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties, their heirs, successors and assigns.

10. <u>**Further Assurances.**</u> Each party agrees to cooperate with the other party and to execute any additional documents reasonably necessary or proper to carry out the provisions and spirit of this Agreement.

11. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This written document constitutes the entire agreement between the parties as to the subject matter set forth herein and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings and representations whether written or oral, between the parties relating to the subject matter set forth herein are merged in and are superseded by this Agreement. There are no oral promises, conditions, representations, understandings or terms of any kind as to the subject matter set forth herein otherwise in effect between the parties that are not set forth in this written contract document.

12. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, which taken together shall constitute one agreement, binding on all the parties hereto even though all the parties are not signatories to the original or the same counterpart.

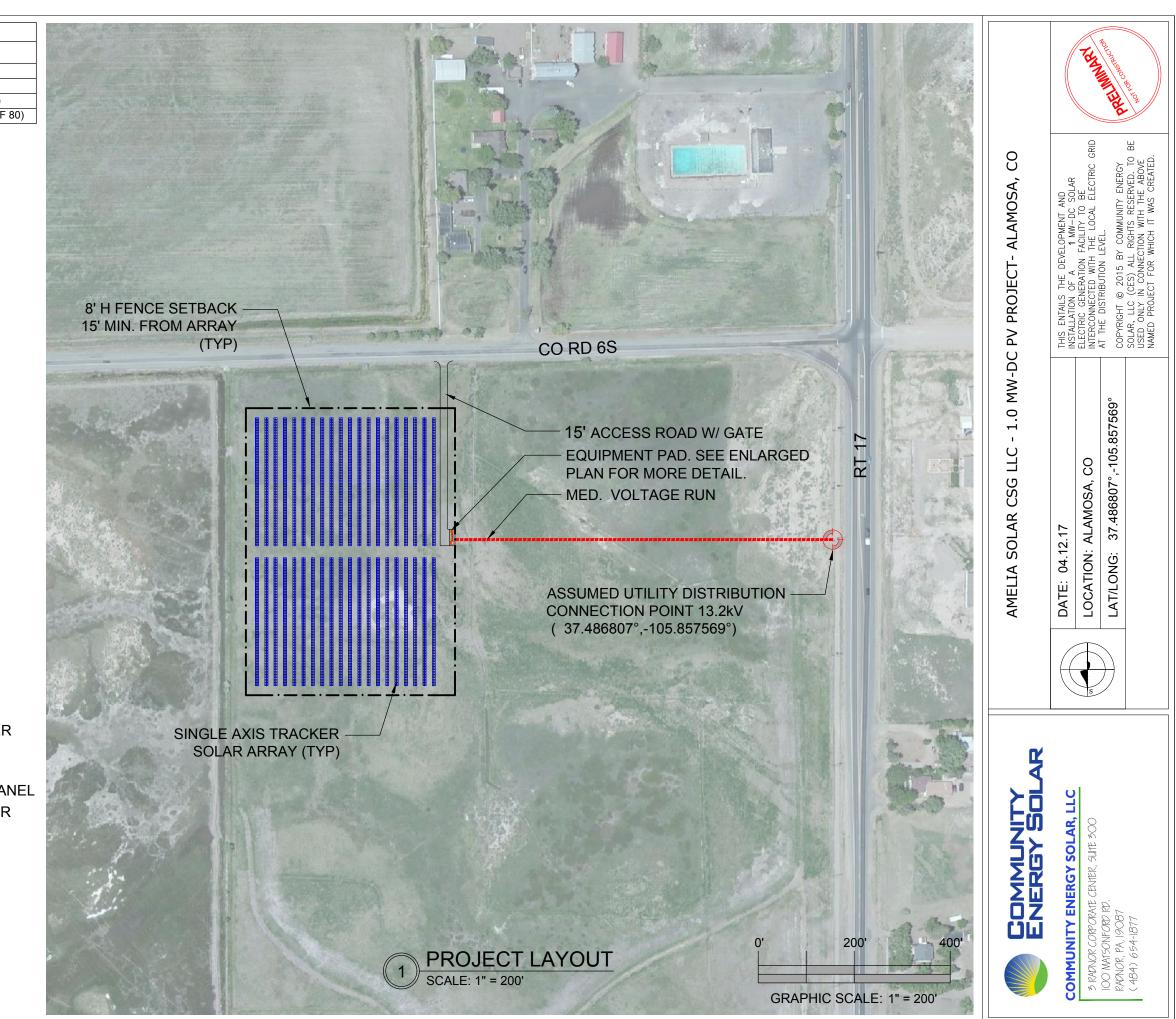

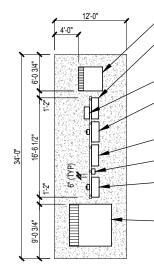

When considering whether or not an applicant is of good moral character, you may consider the following:

Colorado Regulation 47-310(E)

E. When a licensing authority is required to make a determination as to the character, record and reputation of existing licensees or applicants for new licenses, including transfers of ownership of existing licenses, the authority may consider the following factors, which may include but not be limited to the following:

1. Subject to 24-5-101, C.R.S., the applicant or licensee has submitted false applications, made willful misrepresentations and/or committed fraudulent acts:

2. The application or licensee has a criminal history of crimes of moral turpitude. By way of example, crimes of moral turpitude shall include but not be limited to, murder, burglary, robbery, arson, kidnapping, sexual assault, illegal drugs or narcotics convictions;

3. The applicant or licensee has had previous alcohol beverage licenses denied or revoked as a result of violations of law, resulting in finding of bad moral character by any licensing authority;

4. The applicant or licensee has been found to be currently deliquent in the payment of any state or local taxes, and record of such tax delinquency has been filed in a court having jurisdiction, or has been made a public record by some other lawful means;

5. The applicant or licensee has established pattern of multiple statutory violations which resulted in the revocation or denial of any other professional license, leading to the finding of bad moral character by any licensing authority.

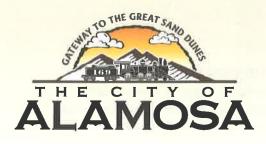
F. Pursuant to 24-5-101, C.R.S., when making a determination as to the character, record or reputation of a licensee or applicant as required by Title 12, Article 46, 47 and 48, the licensing authority shall also consider evidence of rehabilitation. Such evidence may include, but not be limited to, evidence of no criminal history record information, educational achievements, financial solvency, community standing, lack of additional arrests or convictions, or the lack or parole or probation violations since the date of last conviction.

CRS 24-5-101 states in relevant part:

(1)(a) . . . the fact that a person has been convicted of a felony or other offense involving moral turpitude shall not, in and of itself, prevent the person from applying for and obtaining public employment or from applying for and receiving a license, certification, permit, or registration required by the laws of this state to follow any business, occupation, or profession.

(2) Whenever any state or local agency is required to make a finding that an applicant for a license, certification, permit, or registration is a person of good moral character as a condition to the issuance thereof, the fact that such applicant has, at some time prior thereto, been convicted of a felony or other offense involving moral turpitude, and pertinent circumstances connected with such conviction, shall be given consideration in determining whether, in fact, the applicant is a person of good moral character at the time of the application. The intent of this section is to expand employment opportunities for persons who, notwithstanding that fact of conviction of an offense, have been rehabilitated and are ready to accept the responsibilities of a law-abiding and productive member of society.

As the Local Licensing Authority, Council is charged with affording the applicant due process during the hearing, then making a determination whether or not the applicant is of good moral character at the time of the application. In this context, please be aware of the decision of the Colorado Supreme Court in *Wadlow v. Hartman*, 551 P.2d 201, 202 (Colo. 1976), wherein the Court reversed a denial of a liquor application on the basis of a previous conviction for drunk driving. The Court held that "When a Board considers such "other pertinent matters" it must in its findings point out how it feels the applicant's qualifications to conduct the proposed business were affected by those matters."

You are hereby advised that an investigation has been made with regard to the application made by Krista Garcia, Javer Martinez; J.K. LLP d/b/a The Wet Paintbrush for a new Beer and Wine License at 1307 Main St. Suite A. Based on the results thereof, the following has been determined:

1. The location of the premises for which the license is sought is 1307 Main St. Suite A. in Alamosa, Colorado.

2. In the two years proceeding the date of application acceptance, there has not been a denial of a Beer and Wine license application for the reason that the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood were satisfied by the existing outlets.

3. It appears from the application documents that you are entitled to possession of the premises where you propose to exercise the license applied for, and that the possession will continue throughout the initial term of the license, if granted.

4. The sale of liquor on the proposed premises is not a violation of City of Alamosa zoning, building, and fire laws or regulations.

5. The proposed location is within 500 feet from a school, but is allowed through Ordinance No. 7, 2011 and Ordinance No. 6, 2016.

Council may consider whether those records indicate a concern with the good moral character of the shareholders of the Applicant, pursuant to C.R.S. § 12-47-307(1)(a)(III) and (3)(a). If Council does consider these records, it will also consider any information provided by you concerning these records, including, but not limited to, character references, educational achievements, and evidence of rehabilitation, especially during the time between the last conviction and the filing of the application. C.R.S. § 12-47-307(3)(a).

The public hearing on your application has been set for Wednesday, April 19, 2017 beginning at 7:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter. The hearing will take place in Alamosa Council Chambers, 300 Hunt Avenue in Alamosa. At said hearing, you shall have an opportunity to be heard regarding all matters of consideration of your application. Be advised that you, as the applicant, are burdened with persuading City Council, who is the Local Liquor Licensing Authority, that the granting of this license will meet the needs of the neighborhood and the desires of the adult inhabitants of the neighborhood.

In addition to being satisfied with the evidence adduced at the hearing that the granting of the application will meet the needs of the neighborhood and satisfy the desires of the inhabitants of the neighborhood for the proposed liquor establishment, City Council may inquire as the suitability of the character of stockholder Alfred Magee III, specifically with respect to his criminal history results from CBI (enclosed).

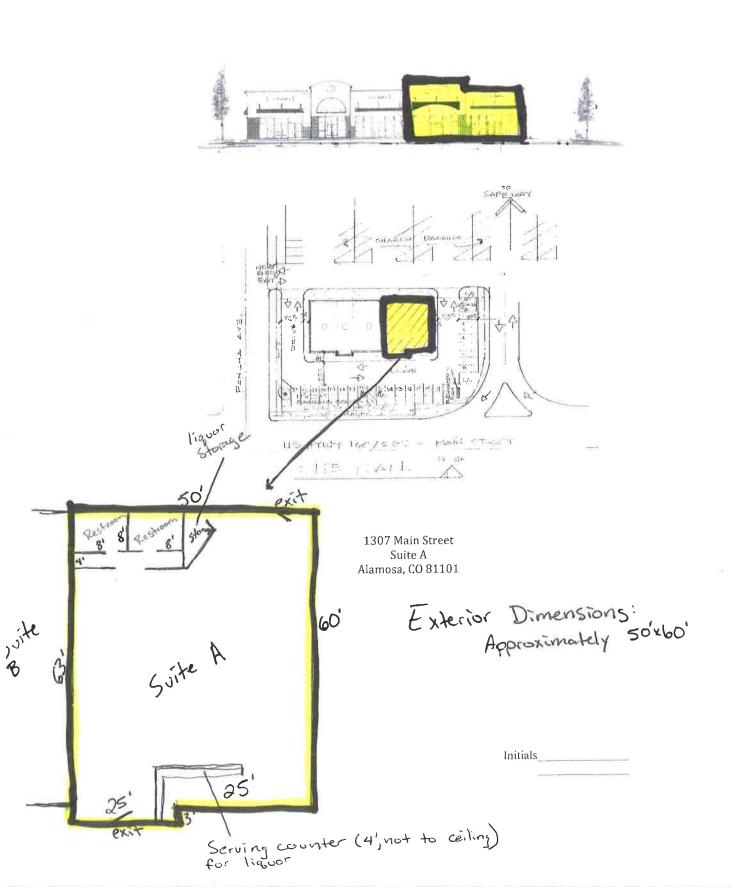

FINDINGS OF FACT AND CONCLUSIONS; GRANT OF LIQUOR LICENSE APPLICATION

In Re the Matter of the Public Hearing Concerning: Linda Cade d/b/a Wize Apples for a Hotel/Restaurant License at 408 4th Street

I. THE HEARING

This matter came on for public hearing at a regularly scheduled meeting of the Alamosa City Council sitting as the Local Licensing Authority (the Authority) on April 5, 2017. Notice of the hearing was given pursuant to §12-47-311, C.R.S. All members of Council were present.

A. Preliminary Issues.

The Authority considered the contents of the application and the results of its own investigation as part of the hearing record.

By virtue of a resolution that has been in effect for approximately twenty years, the Authority has established a presumptive neighborhood applicable to any liquor license application to be the entire City of Alamosa, plus a one-mile radius surrounding the City's perimeter. An applicant or any opponent to an application may rebut the presumption as to the definition of the applicable neighborhood by providing evidence that another definition of neighborhood applies to the particular application. No party proposed a different definition of the neighborhood for this application.

The poster giving notice of the application was introduced as Exhibit A and the Clerk confirmed it was posted on February 23, 2017, and remained posted through the date and time of the hearing. The notice was published in the Valley Courier on March 28, 2017. Exhibit B, consisting of petitions containing approximately 300 signatures in support of the application filed with the Clerk and presented at the hearing.

The Authority takes administrative notice of the existence and location of the 17 hotel/restaurant licenses granted by the Authority for premises within the City, and of the total of 42 liquor licenses of all types granted by the Authority for premises within the City. The Authority takes administrative notice that the central commercially zoned corridor in Alamosa generally runs from east to west, one block north and south of Main Street; that additionally there is an intermittent (i.e. mixed zoning) corridor north and south along U.S. Highway 285, and along State Avenue.

B. Applicant. Applicant, Linda Cade, d/b/a Wize Apples, personally.

C. Documentary Evidence. Ms. Cade presented a petition containing seven pages and approximately 300 signatures in support of the application. Each page of the petition contained a statement that the signer owned property, lived, or was engaged in a job or business within the neighborhood, and an indication that the signers were at least twenty-one years of age. The petitions were obtained at the restaurant. No verification was done with respect to the addresses, as to whether or not the signatories were inhabitants within the

definition in the *Colorado Liquor Code*, Section 12-47-103(12) C.R.S., or parties in interest, as defined in Section 12-47-311(5) C.R.S. No Petitions opposed to the Application were presented. The Authority takes into account the infeasibility of it verifying the signatures, and the lack of verification tendered as part of the Exhibit, when it considers the weight to be given the petitions.

D. Witnesses. The applicant provided Council with a brief background. has been managing the Thai Hut for about two months, having more than 15 years previous restaurant management experience in Florida. Customers have asked them to provide liquor with meals, and many signed the petition.

Prior to opening the public hearing, Council questioned the applicant concerning the nature of her business. Ms. Cade informed Council that she is asked on a daily basis when she is going to get her license and has had some customers leave due to not having a license. The applicant presented the petitions, and further indicated that her customers desired alcoholic beverages to be available with the meals served at the restaurant.

There was no one wishing to speak at the public hearing.

II. APPLICABLE LAW

A hotel restaurant liquor license, under the *Colorado Liquor Code*, may be issued to persons selling only malt, vinous and spirituous liquors in the place where such liquors are to be consumed. In addition, a Hotel/Restaurant shall sell such liquors only if meals are actually and regularly served, and provide not less than 25% of the gross income from sales of food and drink of the business of the licensed premises. C.R.S. § 12-47-411.

Before entering any decision approving or denying the application for a liquor license, the Local Licensing Authority shall consider the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood for the type of license for which the application has been made and the desires of the adult inhabitants of the neighborhood (as evidenced by petitions, testimony, or otherwise), and all reasonable restrictions that are or may be placed upon the new district. §12-47- 301(2), C.R.S.

Whether a license should be granted or denied is a matter resting within the discretion of the licensing authority. *Harvey v. Schooley*, 383 P2d 189 (Colo. 1963). The burden is on the applicant to establish a *prima facie* showing of facts which satisfy the requirements of the liquor code. *Geer v. Hall*, 333 P.2d 1040 (Colo. 1959). The local licensing authority has no authority to regulate the sale of alcohol, but only to grant, deny, suspend, or revoke licenses as provided in the liquor code. *Gettman v. Board of County Commissioners*, 221 P.2d 363 (Colo., 1950). A city council may not prejudge any application by trying to legislate a limitation of the number of licenses based on population. Each application must be considered on its own merits. *City of Colorado Springs v. Graham*, 352 P.2d 363 (Colo. 1950). Unless a second or additional license is applied for by the same licensee, no consideration of the effect on competition of the granting or disapproving of the license shall be made. *See* C.R.S. § 12-47-301(2).

Pursuant to Colorado liquor regulation 47-310(E), when considering whether or not an applicant is of good moral character, the licensing authority may consider, among other factors, whether the applicant or licensee has a criminal history of crimes of moral turpitude. By way of example, crimes of moral turpitude shall include but not be limited to, murder, burglary, robbery, arson, kidnapping, sexual assault, illegal drugs or narcotics convictions. Furthermore, if criminal history is considered, then pursuant to C.R.S. § 24-5-101, the licensing authority shall also consider evidence of rehabilitation. Such evidence may include, but not be limited to, evidence of no criminal history record information, educational achievements, financial solvency, community standing, lack of additional arrests or convictions, or the lack of parole or probation violations since the date of last conviction. The intent of this section is to expand employment opportunities for persons who, notwithstanding that fact of conviction of an offense, have been rehabilitated and are ready to accept the responsibilities of a law-abiding and productive member of society.

III. FINDINGS

The location of the premises for which the license is sought is 408 4th Street in Alamosa, Colorado. This location is within the Alamosa City Limits and falls under the jurisdiction of the Alamosa City Council sitting as the Local Licensing Authority.

In the two years preceding the date of application acceptance, there has not been a denial of a Hotel/Restaurant License application for the reason that the reasonable requirements of the neighborhood were satisfied by the existing outlets.

It appears from the application documents that Applicant is entitled to possession of the premises where it proposes to exercise the license applied for, and that the possession will continue throughout the initial term of the license, if granted.

The sale of liquor on the proposed premises is not a violation of City of Alamosa zoning, building, and fire laws or regulations.

The premises, 408 4th Street, is not within 500 feet of a school.

The evidence presented at the public hearing supports the proposition that there is a need and desire for the issuance of this liquor license. The applicant operates a well known and respected established restaurant in the community, and that business would be enhanced by the ability to provide alcohol with the meals it offers.

IV. CONCLUSIONS

Applicant has satisfied Council that there is a need and desire in the neighborhood for the issuance of the hotel/restaurant liquor license applied for. Therefore, the Alamosa City Council acting as the Local Licensing Authority hereby GRANTS the Application submitted by Linda Cade, d/b/a Wize Apples, for a new hotel/restaurant liquor license at 408 4th Street, Alamosa, Colorado.
