I. CALL TO ORDER AND PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Regular Meeting of the Alamosa City Council was called to order on the above date by Mayor Josef Lucero at 7:00 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

II. ROLL CALL

Council Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Vigil to approve the agenda as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

C. Board/Commission Business

1. Board Applicant Appointments

The Historic Preservation Advisory Committee has one position available with a term ending 06/01/2021. New applications have been received from Scott White, Mary Anne Talbott, and Michelle Stone. Ballots were cast with Scott White receiving 4 votes, Mary Anne Talbott receiving 1 vote, and Michelle Stone receiving 3 votes.

The Library Board has three positions available with terms ending 06/01/2019, 06/01/2020, and 06/01/2021. Current member Mary Walsh has requested reappointment and new applications have been received from Amanda Wilner and Michelle Romero. Ballots were cast with all applicants received 7 votes total, however they were voted into their terms by the score, with the lowest score receiving the longest term. Mary Walsh was voted in with the lowest score at 11 with a term ending 06/01/2021, Amanda Wilner was voted in with a score of 13 with a term ending 06/01/2020, and Michelle Romero voted in with a term ending 06/01/2019.

The Personnel Board has three positions available with terms ending 06/01/2018, 06/01/2021, 06/01/2022. New applications were received from Kindra Lambert and Amanda Hill. Ballots were cast with Kindra Lambert and Amanda Hill both receiving 7 votes each. Council voted the applicants into the terms by way of score voting and Kindra Lambert was voted into the 06/01/2022 term while Amanda Hill was voted into the term ending 06/01/2021.

The Planning Commission has two positions available, one for the Ward 3 position and one for the Ward 4 position with terms ending 06/01/2021 and 06/01/2018, respectively. Current member Debbie Clark requested

reappointment to the Ward 3 position and new application were received from Christopher Lopez and John Adams. New applications for the Ward 4 position were received from Michael Carson and David Mize. Ballots were cast for the Ward 3 positions with Debbie Clark receiving 0 votes, Christopher Lopez receiving 5 votes, and John Adams receiving 2 votes. Ballots were cast for the Ward 4 position with Michael Carson receiving 3 votes and David Mize receiving 4 votes.

The Recreation Advisory Board has three positions available with terms ending 06/01/2018, 06/01/2021, and 06/01/2021. Current members Paul Duarte and David Mize requested reappointment. New applications have been received from John Adams. If Council votes Mr. Mize into the Planning Commission seat, they do not vote for him on this ballot. Ballots were cast with Paul Duarte receiving 7 votes and John Adams receiving 7 votes. Council did not vote for David Mize as he was appointed to the Planning Commission.

The Tree Board has three positions available with terms all ending 06/01/2021. Current members Marilyn Loser and Adam Moore both requested reappointment. Ballots were casts and both members received 7 votes for their reappointment.

Councilor Daniel moved, seconded by Councilor Vigil to reappoint and appoint the following to the various City boards:

- John Adams appointed to the Recreation Advisory Board with a term ending 06/01/2021.
- Marilyn Loser reappointed to the Tree Board with a term ending 06/01/2021.

The motion carried unanimously.

D. Business Brought Forward by City Staff

1. Public Works

 Public Hearing and Second Reading, Ordinance No. 15-2017, Alley Vacation, Block 1, Callbreath's Addition

Pat Steenburg reviewed this ordinance with Council.

Mayor Lucero opened the public hearing at 7:35 p.m. and asked for those wishing to speak on this ordinance.

There being no one wishing to speak, the hearing closed at 7:36 p.m.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to finally adopt Ordinance No. 15-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

b. First Reading, Ordinance No. 16-2017; Partial Alley Vacation, Block 210, Washington Addition, City of Alamosa

Pat Steenburg presented information to Council. The westerly portion of this alley has been vacated in the past to accommodate development demands in the area. This property was not in city jurisdiction but has become since the Tucker-Wagner Annexation that did so recently. Now that the alley is in the city, the adjacent property owners would like to proceed with the vacation request. The partial vacation of the alley has created what is essentially a dead-end road with no outlet other than across private property. The alley is not accessible to emergency vehicles for this reason, no City utilities exist in the alley, and staff can foresee no need to maintain the public right of way as it exists today.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Griego to approve Ordinance No. 16-2017 on first reading and set for a public hearing on Wednesday, July 19, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

c. First Reading, Ordinance No.17-2017; Alley Vacation, Block 5, Alamosa Addition, City of Alamosa

Pat Steenburg presented information to Council. This is one of the few blocks in the city that has three individual, connecting alleys in the shape of an "H" and this vacation request is for the middle leg of this alley system. Currently, and for quite some time, the alley has been encroached upon by trees, mature landscaping, fences, and private occupation, contains no apparent public utilities, and has no signs of recent use. The petitioners are hoping the vacation and consolidation

of the alley into their private property will alleviate some historic vandalism in the alley.

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Vigil to approve Ordinance No. 17-2017 on first reading and set for a public hearing on Wednesday, July 19, 2017 or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

2. Finance

a. Resolution No. 16-2017 amending Ordinance 17-2016 for the 2017 Budget also known as the 2nd Budget Amendment.

Judy Kelloff presented information to Council reviewing the several changes that occurred throughout the year. Those changes included increases in the general fund revenue for grants received; changes in the general fund expenditures including an increase in Municipal Court for the JAG Grant, an increase to payroll expense for court security previously provided by contract, a re-class of balance of the bailiff contract to personnel, an increase in IT for Cole Park WIFI, Court Web Payment Hosting, batteries for police operations, and an increase in Finance for the cost of outside accounting review services. There was also increases in non-departmental line items, decrease to the police operations line item, and an increase in street maintenance for the tool truck purchase.

The enterprise fund saw changes with an increase in the water department for interest on water projects, a decrease for sanitary sewer projects erroneously listed and an increase in the sewer department as a reclassification and an increase in the sanitation department for the increase of a garbage truck. The employee benefit fund has an increase in dental insurance cost, and the parks and recreation fund saw an increase for the loan proceeds to pay for the Multipurpose building and an expense increase for the same.

Council further discussed this resolution.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to adopt Resolution No. 16-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

b. Approval of Community Banks bid for Multi-purpose facility lease purchase funding

Ms. Kelloff presented information to Council. The City sent out a request for proposals to all local banks for tax exempt lease purchase financing for the \$2,258,407 ice rink multi-purpose facility. Responses were received from all banks except Frontier. Sunflower bank and Del Norte Bank declined to make a proposal.

Heather Brooks informed Council that the difference between Community Banks and the next lowest bidder was a difference of \$174,427. Council thanked staff for putting it out to the banks in the community.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to approve proposal of Community Banks of Colorado and parent NBH Banks to provide tax exempt lease purchase financing for the construction of the ice rink/multipurpose facility at up to \$2.4 Million, at a rate of 3.07% plus any LIBOR based adjustments prior to closing, fixed for the twenty year life of the agreement, and authorize the Mayor to sign the acceptance of the proposal. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Police

a. Public Hearing and second reading, Ordinance No. 14-2017, an ordinance approving an intergovernmental agreement with State of Colorado, Department of Higher Education, by and through the State Board for Community Colleges and Occupational Education, for the use and benefit of Trinidad State Junior College to provide security services for the Trinidad State Alamosa Campus from the Alamosa Police Department

Heather Brooks reviewed this ordinance with Council. There were minor changes made following the first reading of the ordinance which were to reflect more finely tuned budget estimates and language that allowed flexibility for reimbursement of training and other personnel matters.

Mayor Lucero opened the public hearing at 7:54 p.m. and asked for those wishing to speak on this ordinance.

There being no one wishing to speak, the hearing closed at 7:55 p.m.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to finally adopt Ordinance No. 14-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

4. Parks and Recreation

 Resolution 15-2017 to act as the fiscal agent for the Alamosa RIO! (Recreation Inspires Opportunities) coalition for the grant application for the Tier II Inspire Initiative Implementation Grant from the State Board of the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund

Andy Rice presented information to Council. This resolution is to be the fiscal agent for the Alamosa RIO! coalition for the grant application for the Tier II Inspire Initiative Implementation Grant from the State Board of the Great Outdoors Colorado Trust Fund.

Heather Brooks also informed Council that as part of the application,

the City has to do a 100%, 75%, and a 50% budget; the underpasses are at the 100%, but should the budget get dropped to 75% or 50%, they get dropped off from the budget.

Council further discussed this item.

Councilor Vigil moved, seconded by Councilor Daniel to adopt Resolution No. 15-2017. The motion carried unanimously.

5. Fire

 First Reading, Ordinance No. 18- 2017, An ordinance approving an intergovernmental agreement with the Alamosa County Fire Protection District to provide fire protection services for the south half of the Alamosa County Fire Protection District

Fire Chief Don Chapman presented information to Council. As far back as the 1950's the City Fire Department and Fire District operations for the south half of Alamosa County have been operating out of the same facilities and using the same personnel in Alamosa. There are agreements in place between the two agencies that cover the use of the facilities, however, there are no agreements that have been found which address the use of personnel, apparatus and equipment used by the Fire Department. This MOU covers the use of personnel, apparatus, equipment and related costs. It also provides the option for the City and District to jointly fund equipment when it is feasible and cost effective.

Council further discussed this item.

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Vigil to approve Ordinance No. 18-2017 on first reading and set for public hearing on Wednesday, July 19, 2017 or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard. The motion carried unanimously.

6. City Manager/Legal

a. Discussion Regarding Council Compensation

Heather Brooks presented information to Council. Several Council members have indicated interest in placing a question on November's ballot pertaining to Council compensation. Because the Charter sets out the compensation guidelines for City Council, only a vote of the registered city voters can change the guidelines. As directed, staff conducted a survey in 2016 of similar and regional communities to provide a comparison of compensation provided by other councils and boards. A summary of that survey relating to the average and median comparable were: Average Comparable for Council Members of \$383.31 and average comparable of \$514.14 for Mayor. The Median

comparable is \$232.75 for Council Members and \$400 for the Mayor. Alamosa is currently at \$400 for Council Members and \$600 for the Mayor.

Council further discussed this issue and voiced their opinions and concerns related to placing a question related to the compensation of Council on the ballot.

Councilor Griego moved, seconded by Councilor Stefano to direct staff to prepare language regarding council compensation to be placed on the ballot for November. The motion carried 4 to 3 with Councilors Daniel, Hensley and Coleman casting the no votes.

Heather Brooks informed Council that staff will be very busy these next few months with the CIP project and preparation for the budget. She also informed Council that the Parks building has begun being built. She also gave them information regarding rumors regarding the Motorway building being used by the Early Iron Club and the concern of it not being an open and transparent process.

Liz Hensley presented information regarding the marketing board meetings she attended regarding the Motorway building and stated she will be attending another meeting a week from tomorrow and will have these concerns addressed.

Streets: The Street Department continued with repairs of soft spots and patching; 669 potholes were repaired. Gravel roads were bladed. Began painting bike lanes. Solid Waste: Commercial waste hauled totaled 343 T.; residential waste hauled totaled 202 T. Eighteen special pick-ups were completed. Three toters and three dumpsters were delivered. Two toters were repaired and five dumpsters.

Recycling: A total of seventy bales of various materials were made. Ninety five bales (54.19 T.) were shipped. A total of six tons of glass was made. Land fill savings totaled \$926.65. Revenues totaled \$5,174.64. Nine yard waste containers were delivered.

Building Inspection: Twelve building permits were issued for a total valuation of \$529,687.62. Building permit fees totaled \$1,484.50 and construction use tax totaled \$452.17. A total of 30 various inspections were conducted. Three general contractor licenses were issued and three limited licenses. One certificate of occupancy was issued for a single family dwelling and one for a multi- family dwelling.

Water: A total of 82,383,000 gallons of water were pumped for municipal use. Water treatment plant production was 72,783,123 gallons. Turn off /ons for occupant change and repairs totaled 33. Eleven meters were re-read. Fifteen curb stops were cleaned out and four repaired. Water pumped at the front nine on the Golf Course totaled 2,810,000 gallons and 4,735,904 gallons for the golf course booster pump/back nine. There were twelve call outs after hours on water related issues. Four new water services were installed. Ten meters were pulled /swapped out. Fourteen meters were checked for leaks. Two fire plugs were repaired. One leak was dug up and repaired in the meter box. Continued work on flushing dead end water mains and verification of meter size in the system. Installed water taps on West 7th St. and the 1700 block of Edison Ave. Replaced the mechanical seal on 12th St. well. Am West completed work on the Water treatment Plant SCADA system. Flushed for discolored water after fire on the 400 block of 6th St. Twenty two shut offs were done for nonpayment.

Wastewater: Total discharge for the month was 49.63 million gallons. Completed webinar on Net DMR changes for reporting to the State. Assisted with locates and Bac testing, and unloaded chemicals at the water plant. Motor on screw pump #1 burned out; a new capacitor was wired in. This did not correct the problem; it was determined that the motor was bad. Mowed weeds around plant. Cleaned and calibrated the effluent ph/temp. probe. Repaired blow outs on basin #2 and lateral on basin #1.Ordered and received oil for screw pumps. Assisted with repairs on rooftop unit at the Water Treatment Plant.

East Alamosa: A total of 3,908,571 gallons of water were treated and supplied to East Alamosa. Eight sanitary sewers were checked for plugs; four unplugged. Four manholes were cleaned and four sewers were cleaned and flushed. One water main break was repaired. Pumps were pulled at Price, McKinney- McQuerry and Rodeo lift stations and cleaned impellers of debris. Cleaned Sunnyside, McKinney McQuerry and Rodeo lift stations. Repaired AC water line in Southway Construction yard. Flushed at numerous sites after fire on 6th St and water main break. Replaced #2 float at McKinney lift station. Place Brush well house booster station on line.

Sewer: Four new sewer services were installed. Seventeen sewers were checked at customers' requests, six were unplugged. Seventy two sanitary sewers were inspected; eleven blocks of sewer line were cleaned. Six sewers were cleaned and flushed and six manholes were cleaned out. Assisted with float repairs in basin #2 at WWTP. Replaced screw pump #3 motor and capacitator. Pulled screen and cleaned out beaver dams on discharge line at WWTP. Cleaned Wal Mart and Murphy lift stations. Pulled pumps at West 7th, Tremont, Lift station #1 at the Golf Course, Wal Mart, Riverwood and West 11 St. and cleaned impellers of debris. Checked all lift stations daily.

May 2017 Report

- Met with a local Internet Service Provider (ISP) regarding WiFi system for the Alamosa Family Recreation Center and Cole Park. ISP was unable to provide a WiFi system for ether location in the time frame needed. A WiFi system could be accomplished within budget for the Alamosa Family Recreation Center by IT, but not Cole Park. IT then researched, purchased and installed a WiFi and Camera system for the Softball Fields at the Recreation Center.
- Upon Council approval, IT researched, purchased and installed a WiFi and Camera system for Cole Park just in time for SummerFest.
- Upgraded our RecPro Server and all clients to latest version.
- Identified and repaired a long standing issue with the new Windows Update Server that was causing our update services to fail due to the large number of updates that needed to be performed.
- Reviewed our current backup system performance, upgraded all backup services to the latest version available, updated all local image files of critical offline computer systems, updated all Firewalls and ensured AntiVirus software on all City owned computer systems were up to date in response to the worldwide Wanna Cry virus outbreak.
- Attended the Mountain Connect Broadband Development Conference.
- Attended the monthly COG Broadband Steering Committee meeting.
- Sent out monthly Phishing and Virus reports to all network users.
- Developed and published a website designed to educate the public on Senate Bill 152 issues. That website can be found at www.cityofalamosa.org/sb152.



City of Alamosa Monthly Activities Report June 2017 Public Works Department

Streets: The street department mounted the Art Sculptures for the downtown Artscape. Painted all bike lanes prior to Ride the Rockies. Patched 130 potholes. Assisted Gardner Excavating with dirt haul to ranch irrigation ditch repairs. Assisted Parks and Rec with removal and installation of bucking chutes at the fairgrounds. Assisted Recycling with yard waste haul. Swept Hwy 160 curb from Richardson Ave. to Market St on the north side. Patchwork completed on streets to be over-laid in 2017. Bladed gravel roads and downtown alleys. Bladed the parking lot at 6th and State Ave. trimmed trees and weeds around shop compound. Took the grader to the library for the Build a Better World reading program. Conducted traffic control for the Round-Up parade. Set up road closures for Round Up dance and Rails and Ales block parties at San Juan Ave. and Main St. Assisted Airport with sweeping of runway and taxiways. Set up road closure for Mullins Ave. construction. Pushed waste piles at 20th St. yard as needed. Assisted Gardner Excavating with trench cuts across Murphy Dr. for Mullins Ave. construction.

Solid Waste: Commercial waste hauled totaled 306 T.; residential waste hauled totaled 214 T. Thirty four special pick-ups were completed. Five toters were delivered. Three toters were repaired and two dumpsters.

Recycling: A total of 82 bales of various materials were made. 114 bales (66.29 T.) were shipped. A total of eight tons of glass was made. Land fill savings totaled \$1,133.56. Nine yard waste containers were delivered, making a total of 33 new customers for yard waste service this season.

Building Inspection: Twenty four building permits were issued for a total valuation of \$2,766,981.00. Building permit fees totaled \$11,574.50 and construction use tax totaled \$1,807.26. Plan review fees totaled \$1,485.63 for the month. A total of 29 various inspections were conducted. One general contractor license was issued. One certificate of occupancy was issued for a commercial building.

Water: A total of 102,025,000 gallons of water were pumped for municipal use. Water treatment plant production was 94,291,867 gallons. Turn off /ons for occupant change and repairs totaled 37. Forty one meters were re-read. Seventeen curb stops were cleaned out and six were repaired. Six new water services were installed. Two leaks were repaired in meter boxes. Twenty seven meters were checked for leaks. Five meters were swapped or pulled. Water pumped at the front nine on the Golf Course totaled 4,751,000 gallons and 5,539,000 gallons for the golf course booster pump/back nine. Twenty four turn offs were done for non -payment. Locates were done for fiber optic project for Blanca Phone Co. Water trucks were filled for the Ride the Rockies event. Twenty lead and copper tests were completed for the State. The Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) was completed and submitted. Lines were flushed for discolored water at Adcock Drive and at Tenth and State. There were two call outs after hours on water related issues. Continued verification of meter sizes in the system and flushing dead end water mains.

Wastewater: Total discharge for the month was 49.44 million gallons. All routine testing for the month was completed and attended weekly safety meetings. Sprayed down both clarifiers. Mowed weeds around the plant twice during the month. Chain and a blow out on Basin #1 were repaired. Colorado Rural Water conducted a study session for employees. The motor for screw pump#1 was switched out, wired and put on line. Met with Director to sign and submit the net DMR.

East Alamosa: A total of 6,767,579 gallons of water were treated and supplied to East Alamosa. Highway 17 well pumped 18,078,158 gallons. Ten sanitary sewers were checked for plugs. Two manholes were cleaned and two sewers were cleaned and flushed. Pumps were pulled at Rodeo,

McKinney- McQuerry and Blanca Vista lift stations and the impellers were cleaned of debris. Cleaned Blanca Vista, McKinney-McQuerry and Sunnyside lift stations. Completed locates for Rural Electric Cooperative. Located and got elevations on water lines at the Rio Grande Farm Park. Submitted the paperwork for the CCR report to the State for East Alamosa. Completed rereads.

Sewer: Six new sewer services were installed. Nine sewers were checked at customers' requests, six were unplugged. Seventy one sanitary sewers were inspected; twelve blocks of sewer line were cleaned. Six sewers were cleaned and flushed and five manholes were cleaned out. All lift stations were checked daily. Completed flushing of dead end sewer lines. Made repairs to the diffuser in basin #2 at the WWTP. Took copper test to start baseline at the WWTP. Cameraed collection line on Cottonwood Dr. to locate taps for contractors building in the area. Pulled screen and cleaned out beaver dams on the discharge line at WWTP. Pulled pumps at West 7th, Tremont, lift station #1 at the Golf Course, Wal Mart, Riverwood and West 11th St. and cleaned impellers of debris. Hauled off grit and cleaned splitter box at WWTP.

Below is a statement regarding major issues covered by the City IT Department:

June 2017 Report

- Upgraded the Audit Server to the latest version. This AD Audit Server collects security log files from all our servers and presents them in a single report for easy review. Utilizing these log files IT can identify physical security threats and respond to such with greater efficiency than reviewing individual server logs.
- Upgraded our Online Utility and Municipal Court Online Payment software to the latest version. This upgrade ensures that citizens utilizing online payments receive the very latest in cyber security as provided by our software vendor Tyler Technology.
- Installed a "Panic Button" system on all computer systems within the Police Department, the Public Library, the City Clerks, Finance, Public Works, Admin, IT and Legal. This system allows employees at those locations to request assistance of all other employees on the system.
- Attended a Webinar from Dell EMC regarding their latest Server Platform, Switch Platform, Firewall Platform and Storage Platform.
- Attended a meeting with VMware regarding management options of their software. At this time, IT will continue utilizing the software we currently own. The ROI for the enterprise level software is not sufficient to justify the increased cost at this time. IT will continue to evaluate the ROI as our systems grow in complexity.
- Per our 5 year replacement plan, IT replaced all the batteries in our server rooms Uninterruptable Power Supplies (UPS). These systems ensure our network and computers services remain online during brownouts, power failures and power interruptions. UPS batteries are rated for 3 to 5 years of use.
- Performed an upgrade on our Police Records Management System (RMS) to the

- latest version.
- Met with a local contractor regarding pricing for a fiber line to the new Cemetery/Parks building.
- Converted non-networked printers in to networked printers throughout the entire city so those printers could be added to the print contract we maintain with Gobins. This contract supplies printer toner and service to the more than 12 specialty printers maintained throughout the City.
- Diagnosed a problem with the broadcast side of our Extron system in the Council Chambers. This problem was causing extreme blurriness in both the projector and Council monitors. We were able to correct the problem with an amplified broadcast.
- Purchased ESRI Business Analyst Software and installed said software on the GIS Analyst computer system.
- Updated the Alamosa Artscape Page to include:
 - o pictures and a map of art installations downtown
 - Uploaded interview videos to youtube, ch191 and the website
- Attended the Brazos Receivables (eTicketing) meeting and began the pilot use of the E-Ticketing handhelds.
- Brandon Gallegos attended training on Ubiquiti wireless products and achieved a UBWA Certificate (Ubiquiti Broadband Wireless Admin).
- Sent out monthly Phishing and Virus reports to all network users.
- Reviewed the security logs created by the Security Audit system. The system allows IT to review potential physical security breach attempts of the entire network in one comprehensive location.
- Patched all City owned computers to the latest patch and vulnerability fixes from Microsoft. This monthly patching helps protect our computers from malicious software, resolve general windows issues/bugs, and provide access to new windows features.

In Monte Vista, we performed the following items:

- Worked with Caselle to resolve inability to run DB backups within Caselle. This
 issue seems to recur with every update Caselle releases.
- Programed all employees' credentials into the new NDE Lock System.
- Installed NDE locks on NW, SW, entrances of City Hall/PD, created a vestibule entry at the back of City Hall/PD and replaced the lock on the SE side of the PD. The NDE uses the ENGAGE gateway for real-time connectivity and lockdown. With this system in place, locks can be audited, and employee access can be controlled from the cloud.
- Created a dedicated Virtual Machine the enables Kids Connection to efficiently operate Caselle from remote. This configuration allows the City to utilize a cheaper DSL network connection vs spending \$90.00 a month for a fiber connection.
- HR has been utilizing a failing printer for quite some time. We attempted to repair the printer with a maintenance kit, however the printer needed more work than was cost effective. We replaced the printer with an Multi Function Printer allowing HR to confidentially print, receive and transmit faxes and scan information.

- After securing the network from outside influence over the past year, IT has began the process of configuring a secure VPN tunnel to allow authorized employees to work from remote locations. These tunnel with be built utilizing City owned and City Maintained equipment only. These VPN tunnels are included with the current firewall system we utilize, and as such, do not incur an additional cost to utilize.
- Utilizing a volume license copy of Windows 10 that we repurposed from HR's computer when we replaced the computer this year we upgraded the WWTP from Windows 8 to 10. This enabled the computer at the WWTP to be able to connect to the servers and all of the network resources at City Hall for the first time.
- Re-utilizing an older computer system and a donated projector and mount from Alamosa, we Installed a permanent projector system for City Council and Municipal Court. We re-utilized the old projector from Council Chambers and an old laptop from the PD to create a mobile projection system for the old Council Chambers to be utilized as a training center with internet access. The total cost to the city was approximately \$30.00 for cabling.
- With the Fiber line from SLVREC installed at the Rio Grande County Jail, we worked with the City of Alamosa to create a joint camera system for both the Rio Grande County Jail and the Alamosa County Jail. Alamosa provided the \$1000.00 worth of equipment in both sites. This new Court Camera System allows the Judge in both Municipal Courts to contact either jail, without the need for expensive prisoner transport. Total cost to the City of Monte Vista was the ongoing fiber service via SLV Rec of \$90.00 a month.
- Attended the monthly Departmental meeting.
- Installed a printer maintenance kit to extend the useful life our our water bill printer.
- Recorded the City Council meeting of 6/1/17 and placed the recording on YouTube.
- Recorded the City Council meeting of 6/8/17 and placed the recording on YouTube.
- Sent out monthly Phishing and Virus reports to all network users.
- Performed patch services on all existing and newly created servers. This monthly patching helps protect our servers from known vulnerabilities.

Jun 1, 2017 - Jun 30, 2017





Subject/Title:

Award of Bid, 2017 Sewer Main Replacement Project

Recommended Action:

That Council award the 2017 Sewer Main Replacement Project to RMS Utilities Inc. in the amount of \$209,500.40 as the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

Background:

In April of 2016, a section of sewer main in Twelfth Street west of State Avenue was identified as in need of emergency replacement because of the complete erosion of the top section of pipe. This created a situation that could have caused the street to settle into the void created by a failure in the main that would have required a more costly repair. Then, in July of 2016 a section of sewer main in Second Street did fail, requiring another emergency repair, this section of main, however, was previously identified as in need of replacement, placed in the CIP, and scheduled for replacement in 2017. As per both the CIP and the additional work needed on the main in Twelfth Street, staff released an RFP for the complete replacement of the remaining suspect areas of each main in early June of this year and received 3 qualified bids, the results of those bids are included below for your review and consideration.

\$230,000 was originally budgeted for this project which was intended to cover both the pipe replacement and street patching. The low bid was \$33,781 above the budgeted amount, and this bid does not include the additional estimated \$40,000 required to patch the street, for a total estimated overrun of \$73,781. Staff recommends that we reduce the scope of the project as discussed further below, and award the bid to RMS Utilities in the amount \$209,500.40. This will allow the complete replacement of the Second Street main and the most needed section of the Twelfth Street main and the patching of each. It will require shortening the replaced portion of the Twelfth Street main by about two blocks, but those two blocks are less pressing than the 2nd street portion of the project. This will also require the deferment of a smaller scheduled main replacement that was budgeted at \$17,500. Deferment is always a difficult decision but staff feels that the Second and Twelfth Street mains have a much higher priority.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to award the contract to RMS Utilities Inc. as the lowest responsible and responsive bidder?

Alternatives:

Council may award the contract in whole to RMS Utilities Inc., may award one section or another to

RMS Utlities, Inc., or award the contract in whole or part to another bidder, or reject all bids and provide staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

\$232,000 was originally budgeted for this project and this estimate was intended to cover both the pipe replacement and street patching. The low bid was \$33,781 above the budgeted amount, and this bid does not include the additional estimated \$40,000 required to patch the street, meaning the total overrun as bid is \$73,781. Staff recommends reducing the scope of the Twelfth Street replacement project and the deferment of a lower priority \$17,500 project and award of bid to the low bidder in the amount of \$209,500 which will allow for the replacement of the most suspect sections of main and guarantee that funds will be available to patch the resulting trenches.

Legal Opinion:

The City Attorney will be present for comment.

Conclusion:

This award will address necessary sewer main replacement before more costly repairs are necessary.

Subject/Title:

Motion to approve the creation of a Blanca Vista Dog Park

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council approve the creation of a second Dog Park at Blanca Vista Park.

Background:

In 2015, the City's first Dog Park at Lee Fields was created based on public feedback expressing the desire for an official Dog Park. The success of this facility led to the idea of creating a second dog park somewhere on the north side of the city. In October of 2016 and again in April of 2017, public forums were held to garner feedback on locations for a second dog park and the Community Recreation Advisory Board expressed their support for the project. Subsequent individual comments were accepted as well. A park at either the North or South end of Blanca Vista Park emerged as the primary preferred location(s) with the "water-access" amenity being the most common reason cited. Subsequent follow up public comments identified the south side of Blanca Vista Park (see Appendix A) as preferable with "proximity to town, access to the water for the dogs, and available shade" again the most common reasons cited in support of the south location. Materials, including fencing and gates, were budgeted and purchased by the Parks and Recreation Department in 2016. A waste disposal bag dispenser and one or two benches would also be installed.

In consultation with the Ranch Lessee and the Public Works Department, a 1 to 1 1/2 acre space with a Parking lot can be created *without any loss in grazing acreage* by using an existing ranch fence as a southern border. A non-barbed fence would be put in for the Dog Park parallel to the ranch fence, allowing for a future pedestrian and cycling trail around the entire perimeter of Blanca Vista Park which is part of the GOCO Inspire project plan (see Appendix A).

The natural hourglass shape of the existing parcel would allow for future segmentation with, for example, big dogs and little dogs which was also separated at the Lee Fields Dog Park about a year after installation. The Blanca Vista Park would be fenced on three sides allowing for water access and at least one double gate would be added for controlled ingress and egress. A portajohn would also be used as at the regular Blanca Vista Pavilion area. Construction of the Park would begin this summer and be completed by September 2017 at the latest.

A proposed park layout map is attached (Appendix A).

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to proceed with the creation of the Blanca Vista Dog Park?

Alternatives:

While Council is free to select or develop any number of alternatives, those listed below are examples.

1. Approve the proposed Blanca Vista Dog Park as presented

- 2. Approve the proposed Blanca Vista Dog Park with conditions and/or changes.
- 3. Decline to act at this time and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

Staff expects no current financial impact with the installation of the Blanca Vista Dog Park because the materials were already purchased in 2016. Maintaining the facility, including porta-john costs, should be less than a \$300/year.

Legal Opinion:

City Attorney will be present if there are any legal questions regarding this action.

Conclusion:

Allowing the addition of a Dog Park to the very popular Blanca Vista Park is a step in the natural progression of increased recreational amenities for our community that will enhance both our citizen's quality of life and visitor experiences.







Resolution No. 17-2017; The request of Colorado Rural Housing and Development Corporation for final plat approval for Montaña Azul Estates, Filing 6.

Recommended Action:

That Council conduct a public hearing and unless evidence to the contrary is presented at said public hearing, approve the final plat of Montaña Azul Estates, Filing 6 by approving Resolution 17-2017 as per the recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Background:

This item was scheduled for review and consideration by the Planning Commission during their regularly scheduled meeting in May but staff pulled item from the agenda because the submission of a traffic study that failed to report appropriate levels of service required by Section 17-67(g)(1) of existing code of ordinances. Level of service (LOS) is a qualitative measure describing operational conditions within a traffic stream as defined in the Transportation Research Board's Highway Capacity Manual (1985 edition) as amended and updated from time to time. LOS is generally described in terms of such factors as speed, freedom to maneuver, traffic interruptions, comfort, convenience, and safety. Levels of service are expressed in terms of six (6) levels, designated A through F, with LOS A indicating the best service and LOS F indicating the worst. The philosophy that the character and environment of the city will be greatly affected by the design of subdivisions and the plats that are approved by the City, makes the planning, layout and design of a subdivision of the utmost concern. The residents must have available to them within the area safe and convenient movement to points of destination or collection and modes of travel to achieve this objective should not conflict with each other or abutting land uses. The existing ordinance requires that the street system within the proposed subdivision provide LOS A on all proposed streets and at all proposed intersections, and shall be adequate to maintain current LOS's on all abutting streets and intersections. It also states, that, in no instance, shall the planning commission or city council approve any proposed subdivision that fails to meet this standard unless the subdivider provides traffic mitigation measures that will maintain or improve current LOS on such adjacent streets and intersections.

The applicant was made aware of the requirement for the traffic study in October of 2016 and the initial report was received at 1:07 p.m. on May 24, 2017, less than five hours prior to the Planning Commission meeting. This left staff and the members of the Planning Commission very little time to review, respond, and react to the submitted report. The report did however clearly indicate predicted LOS B on all minor street approaches and major street left turning movements during both the morning and evening peak hours so staff removed the item from the planning commission agenda. The new report, by the same engineer, has been revised to indicate predicted LOS A on all minor street approaches and major street left turning movements during both the morning and evening peak hours, basing the revision on what staff understands to be the use of a different microsimulation model to calculate the levels of service.

Staff has identified a few minor changes to the utility design that will be addressed during the construction phase of the project. The lot sizes are compliant with existing ordinances and the development is a natural extension of previous filings completed by the applicant. An executed Subdivision Improvement Agreement and Performance Guarantee will be obtained prior to plat

recordation as per Section 17-90 of the City Code of Ordinances.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the final plat of Montaña Azul Estates Filing 6 as presented and recommended by the Planning Commission?

Alternatives:

Council may approve the plat as presented, deny the request of the applicant or send the request back to the Planning Commission with further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

No significant fiscal impact is anticipated.

Legal Opinion:



Stackhouse: I don't believe that's changed. We will have a cross access easement through Sonic and also a driveway off Main St.

Adcock: Okay, I thought it was just through Sonic.

Clark: Which parking space will you do away with?

Stackhouse: It's not shown on this drawing; we're just out of space and this is the plan that would show the reduction of just one space.

Manzanares: Any other questions or a motion?

M/S/C. Adcock, Travis. Motion made to approve the request of Vertical Construction Management for a variance from the required off street parking of 23 spaces to 22 spaces. The property affected is Lot 1, Sangre Tract Replat and Lot 12, Block 1, Callbreath's Addition, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 1310 Main St. (Unanimous)

Adcock inquired if with the changes to the new zoning code this type of minor variance could be handled by staff and Steenburg replied that it would most likely be added to administrative approvals.

This is final action on the request.

Next item:

The request of Del Sol Plaza, LLC and Owens Town n' Country Limited Partnership LLLP for a lot line adjustment. The property affected is the Villa Mall Subdivision Replat, being a replat of Lot 3 of the Villa Mall Subdivision and of Lot 4, Plaza Del Sol Subdivision, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 688 Del Sol.

The public hearing opened at 6: 05 p.m.

Manzanares: Please state your name and address for the record.

Owens: Lohn Owens, 6203 Rd 12 South, Alamosa, representing Del Sol Plaza and Owens Limited Partnership. We've sold this lot and there was not enough space for the required parking for the dental clinic. We are asking for a lot line adjustment for the three additional parking spaces.

Manzanares: Thank you. Questions?

Steenburg: I just want to make note the rest of the parking lot more than meets the requirements.

Adcock: So the variance is just the three spaces?

Owens: It goes back to the island, we are actually sharing the parking lot but instead of leasing the property to him, he (Dr. Harding) requested to purchase instead of a long term lease.

Steenburg: What they are trying to do is move the lot line so the lot to the north has the required parking.

Adcock: So the variance is just the three spaces?

Steenburg: It is not a variance; it is a lot line adjustment. They are adding to that lot but not creating a new parcel. It is taking square footage from the large parcel to meet the parking requirements for the smaller lot.

Manzanares: Thank you; are there more questions, or a motion?

The public hearing closed at 6:06 p.m.

M/S/C. Travis, Clark. Motion made to recommend approval of the request of Del Sol Plaza, LLC and Owens Town n' Country Limited Partnership LLLP for a lot line adjustment. The property affected is the Villa Mall Subdivision Replat, being a replat of Lot 3 of the Villa Mall Subdivision and of Lot 4, Plaza Del Sol Subdivision, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 688 Del Sol. (Unanimous)

This is final action on this request.

Planning Issues:

The request of Community Resources and Housing Development Corporation for review of a final plat. The property affected is Montana Azul Estates, Filing No.6, located in a fraction of the NE ½ of Section 8, Township 37 North, Range 10 East, New Mexico Principal Meridian, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, situated west of Craft Drive and south of Tremont Street.

The public hearing opened at 6:09 p.m.

Manzanares: Who here would like to speak on behalf of this request?

McGranahan: My name is Chris McGranahan, LSC Transportation Consultants; the rest of our project team doesn't appear to be here. We completed the traffic study so I can answer any questions related to the study. I am not sure if anyone else was planning on coming, but I want you to know I am here to answer any questions.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on behalf of this request?

Lucero: Janet Lucero, with Community Resources and Housing, 1016 West Ave. and I am here with Martin Reynolds our engineer to request final plat approval.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on behalf? Against? Leroy, please state your name and address.

Martinez: Leroy Martinez, 13224 Hwy 285 South and I'm one of the adjacent property owners to this project. I'm not opposed to growth in Alamosa but I am opposed to growing it in this manner where you put this many people in those small lots like is requested here when there is no reason to crowd people in this area where we have too much land and not enough people.

I'm not against growth, believe me, I sold the property to these people. Watching it grow and Craft St. is busy and they go fast; I'm assuming they are putting ingress and egress lanes on Craft. The speed limit is 40-50 mph and you feed them across from the Workers Housing Apartments, for migrant workers I guess and we are going to double up with this many more lots and granted they can go back to Adcock and feed on to Tremont. Craft is the future Main St. of Alamosa and as long as the schools continue to grow and Wal Mart is out there. I know they did a count out there they claim. I don't think we need to have this many vehicles feed into Craft in the morning or evening. To crowd this many families into this small area, there's no reason for it. I don't know which one of you would like to live like this or put your family five foot across from your neighbor. There's no reason for that.

I think they were doing a good job before but I don't agree with what they are doing now. That's about all I have to say.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else to speak against this request? We will close the public hearing and take questions from the Commission.

The public hearing closed at 6:14 p.m.

Manzanares: Leroy, I have a question for you. Are you against the number of units and using the street and they go out one area rather than two additional areas?

Martinez: Right, I think they need to make the lots bigger the way they started - it was uniform and it looks good. Grow it the way it should be.

I'm a native to this country, native to Alamosa and so when you see something like this happening, we're going the wrong direction with it. We're going to have more and more people moving here. Why crowd them like that; we don't have to - good neighbors need elbow room. It doesn't matter where you're at, you have to have it. Craft St will have to have wider approaches and feed it back to Tremont and it would be alright. I still don't like the small lots.

Manzanares: Right, so it the small lots and access.

Martinez: What he's been doing has been excellent, it looks good, it's good growth for our community and we need it but we don't need this kind of stuff, what they are proposing now. We absolutely don't need it and that's my thinking on it.

Manzanares: Thank you. It makes sense to me. You go to the Denver area and you have busier, fast streets and one entrance that might serve a circle in a subdivision and then another entrance to a street and they are driving faster than allowed.

Bervig: Mr. Chairman, I have a question. I don't know the lot size and square footage. I commend Mr. Gold and what he has done in the past but 48 lots in that small area? Craft Dr. is busy now and I don't like the plan. They have way too many lots.

Steenburg: To address the lot size, our ordinance requires 7,000 sq. ft. in that zoning district. Most of these lots are approximately 8,000 sq. ft.; some are 10,000 sq. ft. These lots are similarly sized to many lots in the city.

Manzanares: Okay.

Adcock: May I talk to the gentleman who did the traffic study? I know Craft is a very busy street, I read your report and that's a lot of cars at those hours. You don't recommend any kind of extra lane until they add more houses?

McGranahan: We looked at the Colorado Highway Dept. and they have access code and their requirements for arterial roads in urban areas which Craft Dr. would fall under so we looked at the CDOT access codes and they suggested for a right turn lane more than 50 vehicles in one hour as a trigger and we predicted about 20. For the left turn lane coming from the south the CDOT trigger is 20 vehicles in one hour and we have 11. So what our report says is that these 48 homes won't require the lane but in the future it could. If it goes off to the west and could connect to future homes if they were built to the west but that is not the case with these 48 homes.

Clark: Was the traffic study done when school was in session?

McGranahan: I can give you the exact date – May 17th and it was done constantly from about 6:45 am until about 5:30pm to catch morning peak hour and the afternoon peak hour and counted when school was in session and the counts look higher because the school does add some to counts.

Adcock: I live off First St. and sometimes it's really hard to get on Craft.

Bervig: How to get 48 cars at the peak hour. How much bigger are the other lots to the north?

Steenburg: They are very similar, some are a little bigger. They are not dimensioned.

McGranahan: With the building footprint on this plat it makes the lots look bigger to the north.

Adcock: So Adcock Drive will go all the way through there? It won't have a stop?

McGranahan: Adcock would connect to the site and the volume would be low I would expect Adcock to have a stop sign.

Adcock: But they could go all the way to Tremont?

McGranahan: They could and that's important if there is an incident at one of those other points. We don't expect a lot to use Tremont but they could.

Clark: Tremont is not a through street?

Adcock: It is to the end of Adcock.

McGranahan: I like our access east - west and it could extend to the west if future development does.

Manzanares: Pat, I see you checking the lot size on the previous filing?

Steenburg: About 9,000 sq. ft., all the ones on the south are 8,500- 8,100 sq. ft. As I said, these lots all meet our requirements.

McGranahan: If there is an accident at one point there is another access. There are lots of benefits for two access points, the existing and the proposed development.

Steenburg: And for the Commissions' notice, we have worked extensively with the applicant and the Fire Chief, Don Chapman to guarantee emergency access on the west end and Lot 86 at the end won't be sold or developed until that road is extended so if they need to get a big tower truck they can still get out there.

Bervig: That is a 60 ft. right of way?

Steenburg: Yes.

Bervig had additional comments but they were not audible due to microphone problems.

McGranahan: Our traffic study shows it works acceptably, the delay is pretty low - for this specific project and does not show the need for traffic turn lanes or signals at this time. Over time with more development that may change.

Adcock: How many cars did you figure this particular development generates?

McGranahan: A single family home generates roughly nine and a half trips per day- one way trips.

Adcock: How many vehicles?

McGranahan: During peak hour, these homes each will generate three quarters of a trip per hour in, 32 trips in the morning, evening peak hour about one per household so about 48 new trips.

Adcock: So you're saying they have one car per house?

McGranahan: No, I'm saying in the peak hour one car comes or goes. They may have five cars but they parked or at work or sitting at someone's house. Of the ten trips throughout per day, only two of them happen at rush hours. We may have one resident that makes a lot of trips or one that lives by themselves and does not drive often. On the average, about one during the peak hour per home in

the morning and the evening. In the peak hour about one every one minute, 15 seconds. Forty eight cars per hour is less than one a minute at peak times. You wouldn't expect to see six cars in a row, it may be an anomaly, it's a car less than one a minute.

Manzanares: Any other questions? My issue is the possibility of modular homes, just an opinion basically.

Steenburg: That's handled at the building permit point. As long as it meets our codes and requirements it can be done. We have a moratorium right now on manufactured homes, there is some distinction between modular and manufactured homes. A home that meets IRC codes we've adopted are perfectly legal. Some you don't even know they are not site built.

Manzanares: A manufactured home still has a tag on it for highway and a modular does not?

Reynolds: A manufactured home is built under HUD code requirements and is built on a permanent chassis not brought in on a trailer and will continue to remain on it.

Adcock: If you put in turning lanes does that eliminate 138 & 137?

McGranahan: To me, it depends on how wide our right of way is, our traffic report suggests while we don't recommend turn lanes at this point, we should have room in the future. We wouldn't want to plat homes and not have room for a turn lane.

Steenburg: It is 80 ft. What our code requires is a level of service A (LOS), so they meet the requirements. They meet the requirements for the lot size, the traffic flow LOS. Everything meets the requirements of our current code. Right now, this application meets the requirements.

Manzanares: And what we base our recommendation on it what we have here presented to us.

Steenburg: In light of our existing code not what we think it should be.

McGranahan: Our study lays out kind of a baseline of what those triggers might be. We can check any of the new projects against that threshold.

Adcock: I think what bothers me is the fact you did put in the report if they add any more homes they need to put in turn lanes.

McGranahan: We would need to check that; if it was eight homes, probably not. If it was 150 homes maybe so. It depends on how many and where.

Clark: How much more could they add?

Steenburg: It depends on their connectivity; there is a lot of property that could be developed.

McGranahan: It would be something a similar study could figure out pretty quickly, depending on development in the future. It depends on how many homes. We are nowhere near the threshold.

Manzanares: I think to maintain consistency. Thank you. A motion?

Martinez: I don't think he's considered how many vehicles can be parked there, each family will have two cars minimum. There isn't even enough parking. You have to look in the future, if this is all the growth I guess it's all right I think we need to look into the future. They wrote them up so you can change regulations.

Manzanares: Thank you.

Adcock: I live in that area and I know how busy Craft Dr. can be.

Manzanares: I know growth is happening and in the northwest side also. I my area that I represent we have concerns with traffic near the high school, just as this area with the elementary school. At what point are signals, lights considered?

Steenburg: The needs for signal are controlled by warrants that are clearing defined in the uniform traffic code. This area here isn't even close.

Clark: Even if I don't agree with the amount of lots, it is in with what is allowed.

M/S/C.Travis, Cooper. Motion made to recommend approval of Community Resources and Housing Development Corporation final plat. The property affected is Montana Azul Estates, Filing No.6, located in a fraction of the NE ¼ of Section 8, Township 37 North, Range 10 East, New Mexico Principal Meridian, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, situated west of Craft Drive and south of Tremont Street. (four yes's -Travis, Cooper, Manzanares, Clark, two nays -Adcock, Bervig)

The recommendation will go to City Council for consideration on July 19, 2017 at the regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter.

Next item:

The request of Christine Caton for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a single family dwelling (Use Group R-1) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is Alamosa Addition #1, Block 19, Fractions of Lots 6-8, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 431 3rd St.

The public hearing opened at 6:43 p.m.

Manzanares: Is there someone here to speak for this?

Lancaster: Mary Lancaster, 431 3rd St. Alamosa, CO 81101. I am here representing Chris. I'm going to be one of the people in the building in the apartments and in the middle part I'm hoping to have a B & B

Ms. Lancaster presented a power of attorney from Ms. Caton.

Manzanares: Is there anyone else that would like to speak for this? Against? We will close the public hearing.

The public hearing was closed at 6:45p.m.

The B & B aspect has some issues that are a bit different from what was stated on the application (apartments)

Ms. Lancaster had not seen the drawing that Ms. Caton had submitted when applying for an apartment use and could not answer questions regarding kitchen, bathroom access.

After further discussion is was determined the application would be tabled until further information regarding the change of use as stated on the application (apartments) from what was requested at the hearing (bed & breakfast) could be researched as to zoning requirements.

M/S/C. Adcock, Bervig. Motion made to table the request of Christine Caton for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a single family dwelling (Use Group R-1) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is Alamosa Addition #1, Block 19, Fractions of Lots 6-8, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 431 3rd St. (Unanimous)

It was recommended Ms. Lancaster make an appointment with the building official prior to the next meeting and discuss code requirements regarding a B & B.

The applicant was informed it would be heard at the next regular hearing on July 26th

Other business:

It was brought up if there was any code addressing tires on roofs of residences. Staff is not aware of any ordinances specific to this issue.

Other issues brought up were blight in the alley off Victoria and First St. near the bowling alley and the zoning issue on the sober living house on Main St.

After no further business the meeting was adjourned at 6:55 p.m.

Subject/Title:

Resolution No. 17-2017; The request of Colorado Rural Housing and Development Corporation for final plat approval for Montaña Azul Estates, Filing 6.

Recommended Action:

That Council conduct a public hearing and unless evidence to the contrary is presented at said public hearing, approve the final plat of Montaña Azul Estates, Filing 6 by approving Resolution 17-2017 as per the recommendation of the Planning Commission.

Background:

This item was scheduled for review and consideration by the Planning Commission during their regularly scheduled meeting in May but staff pulled item from the agenda because the submission of a traffic study that failed to report appropriate levels of service required by Section 17-67(g)(1) of existing code of ordinances. Level of service (LOS) is a qualitative measure describing operational conditions within a traffic stream as defined in the Transportation Research Board's Highway Capacity Manual (1985 edition) as amended and updated from time to time. LOS is generally described in terms of such factors as speed, freedom to maneuver, traffic interruptions, comfort, convenience, and safety. Levels of service are expressed in terms of six (6) levels, designated A through F, with LOS A indicating the best service and LOS F indicating the worst. The philosophy that the character and environment of the city will be greatly affected by the design of subdivisions and the plats that are approved by the City, makes the planning, layout and design of a subdivision of the utmost concern. The residents must have available to them within the area safe and convenient movement to points of destination or collection and modes of travel to achieve this objective should not conflict with each other or abutting land uses. The existing ordinance requires that the street system within the proposed subdivision provide LOS A on all proposed streets and at all proposed intersections, and shall be adequate to maintain current LOS's on all abutting streets and intersections. It also states, that, in no instance, shall the planning commission or city council approve any proposed subdivision that fails to meet this standard unless the subdivider provides traffic mitigation measures that will maintain or improve current LOS on such adjacent streets and intersections.

The applicant was made aware of the requirement for the traffic study in October of 2016 and the initial report was received at 1:07 p.m. on May 24, 2017, less than five hours prior to the Planning Commission meeting. This left staff and the members of the Planning Commission very little time to review, respond, and react to the submitted report. The report did however clearly indicate predicted LOS B on all minor street approaches and major street left turning movements during both the morning and evening peak hours so staff removed the item from the planning commission agenda. The new report, by the same engineer, has been revised to indicate predicted LOS A on all minor street approaches and major street left turning movements during both the morning and evening peak hours, basing the revision on what staff understands to be the use of a different microsimulation model to calculate the levels of service.

Staff has identified a few minor changes to the utility design that will be addressed during the construction phase of the project. The lot sizes are compliant with existing ordinances and the development is a natural extension of previous filings completed by the applicant. An executed Subdivision Improvement Agreement and Performance Guarantee will be obtained prior to plat

recordation as per Section 17-90 of the City Code of Ordinances.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the final plat of Montaña Azul Estates Filing 6 as presented and recommended by the Planning Commission?

Alternatives:

Council may approve the plat as presented, deny the request of the applicant or send the request back to the Planning Commission with further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

No significant fiscal impact is anticipated.

Legal Opinion:



Minutes of the Meeting

The regular meeting of the Planning Commission was called to order on the above date at 6:00 p.m. by Chairman Mark Manzanares. Present were the following members: Shirley Adcock, Debbie Clark, Farris Bervig, Darrel Cooper and Scott Travis. A quorum was declared. Staff present: Pat Steenburg, Harry Reynolds, and Julie Scott.

Agenda Approval: M/S/C. Clark, Adcock. Motion was made to approve the agenda as presented. (Unanimous)

Approval of the Minutes: M/S/C. Clark, Travis. Motion made to approve the minutes of the May 24, 2017 meeting as presented. (Unanimous)

Public Comments: None.

Regular Business - Conduct Public Hearings – Zoning Board of Adjustments

The request of Vertical Construction Management for a variance from the required Off Street Parking requirements. The property affected is Lot 1, Sangre Tract Replat and Lot 12, Block 1, Callbreath's Addition, City of Alamosa. Alamosa County also known as 1310 Main St.

The public hearing opened at 6:01 p.m.

Manzanares: Step forward please and state your name and address for the record.

Stackhouse: My name is Tim Stackhouse, Civil Consulting Engineers, Inc.; I'm here representing Vertical Construction Management on the Starbucks. We are requesting a variance for a reduction of one parking spot from the requirements. I'm here to answer any questions you might have.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on behalf this request? Against? We will close the public hearing. Questions?

The public hearing closed at 6:02 p.m.

Adcock: I have a question that doesn't pertain to this. You are now taking a driveway entrance off of Main Street instead of coming through Sonic?

Steenburg: That is the original design.

Stackhouse: I don't believe that's changed. We will have a cross access easement through Sonic and also a driveway off Main St.

Adcock: Okay, I thought it was just through Sonic.

Clark: Which parking space will you do away with?

Stackhouse: It's not shown on this drawing; we're just out of space and this is the plan that would show the reduction of just one space.

Manzanares: Any other questions or a motion?

M/S/C. Adcock, Travis. Motion made to approve the request of Vertical Construction Management for a variance from the required off street parking of 23 spaces to 22 spaces. The property affected is Lot 1, Sangre Tract Replat and Lot 12, Block 1, Callbreath's Addition, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 1310 Main St. (Unanimous)

Adcock inquired if with the changes to the new zoning code this type of minor variance could be handled by staff and Steenburg replied that it would most likely be added to administrative approvals.

This is final action on the request.

Next item:

The request of Del Sol Plaza, LLC and Owens Town n' Country Limited Partnership LLLP for a lot line adjustment. The property affected is the Villa Mall Subdivision Replat, being a replat of Lot 3 of the Villa Mall Subdivision and of Lot 4, Plaza Del Sol Subdivision, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 688 Del Sol.

The public hearing opened at 6: 05 p.m.

Manzanares: Please state your name and address for the record.

Owens: Lohn Owens, 6203 Rd 12 South, Alamosa, representing Del Sol Plaza and Owens Limited Partnership. We've sold this lot and there was not enough space for the required parking for the dental clinic. We are asking for a lot line adjustment for the three additional parking spaces.

Manzanares: Thank you. Questions?

Steenburg: I just want to make note the rest of the parking lot more than meets the requirements.

Adcock: So the variance is just the three spaces?

Owens: It goes back to the island, we are actually sharing the parking lot but instead of leasing the property to him, he (Dr. Harding) requested to purchase instead of a long term lease.

Steenburg: What they are trying to do is move the lot line so the lot to the north has the required parking.

Adcock: So the variance is just the three spaces?

Steenburg: It is not a variance; it is a lot line adjustment. They are adding to that lot but not creating a new parcel. It is taking square footage from the large parcel to meet the parking requirements for the smaller lot.

Manzanares: Thank you; are there more questions, or a motion?

The public hearing closed at 6:06 p.m.

M/S/C. Travis, Clark. Motion made to recommend approval of the request of Del Sol Plaza, LLC and Owens Town n' Country Limited Partnership LLLP for a lot line adjustment. The property affected is the Villa Mall Subdivision Replat, being a replat of Lot 3 of the Villa Mall Subdivision and of Lot 4, Plaza Del Sol Subdivision, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County also known as 688 Del Sol. (Unanimous)

This is final action on this request.

Planning Issues:

The request of Community Resources and Housing Development Corporation for review of a final plat. The property affected is Montana Azul Estates, Filing No.6, located in a fraction of the NE ½ of Section 8, Township 37 North, Range 10 East, New Mexico Principal Meridian, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, situated west of Craft Drive and south of Tremont Street.

The public hearing opened at 6:09 p.m.

Manzanares: Who here would like to speak on behalf of this request?

McGranahan: My name is Chris McGranahan, LSC Transportation Consultants; the rest of our project team doesn't appear to be here. We completed the traffic study so I can answer any questions related to the study. I am not sure if anyone else was planning on coming, but I want you to know I am here to answer any questions.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on behalf of this request?

Lucero: Janet Lucero, with Community Resources and Housing, 1016 West Ave. and I am here with Martin Reynolds our engineer to request final plat approval.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else that would like to speak on behalf? Against? Leroy, please state your name and address.

Martinez: Leroy Martinez, 13224 Hwy 285 South and I'm one of the adjacent property owners to this project. I'm not opposed to growth in Alamosa but I am opposed to growing it in this manner where you put this many people in those small lots like is requested here when there is no reason to crowd people in this area where we have too much land and not enough people.

I'm not against growth, believe me, I sold the property to these people. Watching it grow and Craft St. is busy and they go fast; I'm assuming they are putting ingress and egress lanes on Craft. The speed limit is 40-50 mph and you feed them across from the Workers Housing Apartments, for migrant workers I guess and we are going to double up with this many more lots and granted they can go back to Adcock and feed on to Tremont. Craft is the future Main St. of Alamosa and as long as the schools continue to grow and Wal Mart is out there. I know they did a count out there they claim. I don't think we need to have this many vehicles feed into Craft in the morning or evening. To crowd this many families into this small area, there's no reason for it. I don't know which one of you would like to live like this or put your family five foot across from your neighbor. There's no reason for that.

I think they were doing a good job before but I don't agree with what they are doing now. That's about all I have to say.

Manzanares: Thank you. Is there anyone else to speak against this request? We will close the public hearing and take questions from the Commission.

The public hearing closed at 6:14 p.m.

Manzanares: Leroy, I have a question for you. Are you against the number of units and using the street and they go out one area rather than two additional areas?

Martinez: Right, I think they need to make the lots bigger the way they started - it was uniform and it looks good. Grow it the way it should be.

I'm a native to this country, native to Alamosa and so when you see something like this happening, we're going the wrong direction with it. We're going to have more and more people moving here. Why crowd them like that; we don't have to - good neighbors need elbow room. It doesn't matter where you're at, you have to have it. Craft St will have to have wider approaches and feed it back to Tremont and it would be alright. I still don't like the small lots.

Manzanares: Right, so it the small lots and access.

Martinez: What he's been doing has been excellent, it looks good, it's good growth for our community and we need it but we don't need this kind of stuff, what they are proposing now. We absolutely don't need it and that's my thinking on it.

Manzanares: Thank you. It makes sense to me. You go to the Denver area and you have busier, fast streets and one entrance that might serve a circle in a subdivision and then another entrance to a street and they are driving faster than allowed.

Bervig: Mr. Chairman, I have a question. I don't know the lot size and square footage. I commend Mr. Gold and what he has done in the past but 48 lots in that small area? Craft Dr. is busy now and I don't like the plan. They have way too many lots.

Steenburg: To address the lot size, our ordinance requires 7,000 sq. ft. in that zoning district. Most of these lots are approximately 8,000 sq. ft.; some are 10,000 sq. ft. These lots are similarly sized to many lots in the city.

Manzanares: Okay.

Adcock: May I talk to the gentleman who did the traffic study? I know Craft is a very busy street, I read your report and that's a lot of cars at those hours. You don't recommend any kind of extra lane until they add more houses?

McGranahan: We looked at the Colorado Highway Dept. and they have access code and their requirements for arterial roads in urban areas which Craft Dr. would fall under so we looked at the CDOT access codes and they suggested for a right turn lane more than 50 vehicles in one hour as a trigger and we predicted about 20. For the left turn lane coming from the south the CDOT trigger is 20 vehicles in one hour and we have 11. So what our report says is that these 48 homes won't require the lane but in the future it could. If it goes off to the west and could connect to future homes if they were built to the west but that is not the case with these 48 homes.

Clark: Was the traffic study done when school was in session?

McGranahan: I can give you the exact date – May 17th and it was done constantly from about 6:45 am until about 5:30pm to catch morning peak hour and the afternoon peak hour and counted when school was in session and the counts look higher because the school does add some to counts.

Adcock: I live off First St. and sometimes it's really hard to get on Craft.

Bervig: How to get 48 cars at the peak hour. How much bigger are the other lots to the north?

Steenburg: They are very similar, some are a little bigger. They are not dimensioned.

McGranahan: With the building footprint on this plat it makes the lots look bigger to the north.

Adcock: So Adcock Drive will go all the way through there? It won't have a stop?

McGranahan: Adcock would connect to the site and the volume would be low I would expect Adcock to have a stop sign.

Adcock: But they could go all the way to Tremont?

McGranahan: They could and that's important if there is an incident at one of those other points. We don't expect a lot to use Tremont but they could.

Clark: Tremont is not a through street?

Adcock: It is to the end of Adcock.

McGranahan: I like our access east - west and it could extend to the west if future development does.

Manzanares: Pat, I see you checking the lot size on the previous filing?

Steenburg: About 9,000 sq. ft., all the ones on the south are 8,500- 8,100 sq. ft. As I said, these lots all meet our requirements.

McGranahan: If there is an accident at one point there is another access. There are lots of benefits for two access points, the existing and the proposed development.

Steenburg: And for the Commissions' notice, we have worked extensively with the applicant and the Fire Chief, Don Chapman to guarantee emergency access on the west end and Lot 86 at the end won't be sold or developed until that road is extended so if they need to get a big tower truck they can still get out there.

Bervig: That is a 60 ft. right of way?

Steenburg: Yes.

Bervig had additional comments but they were not audible due to microphone problems.

McGranahan: Our traffic study shows it works acceptably, the delay is pretty low - for this specific project and does not show the need for traffic turn lanes or signals at this time. Over time with more development that may change.

Adcock: How many cars did you figure this particular development generates?

McGranahan: A single family home generates roughly nine and a half trips per day- one way trips.

Adcock: How many vehicles?

McGranahan: During peak hour, these homes each will generate three quarters of a trip per hour in, 32 trips in the morning, evening peak hour about one per household so about 48 new trips.

Adcock: So you're saying they have one car per house?

McGranahan: No, I'm saying in the peak hour one car comes or goes. They may have five cars but they parked or at work or sitting at someone's house. Of the ten trips throughout per day, only two of them happen at rush hours. We may have one resident that makes a lot of trips or one that lives by themselves and does not drive often. On the average, about one during the peak hour per home in

the morning and the evening. In the peak hour about one every one minute, 15 seconds. Forty eight cars per hour is less than one a minute at peak times. You wouldn't expect to see six cars in a row, it may be an anomaly, it's a car less than one a minute.

Manzanares: Any other questions? My issue is the possibility of modular homes, just an opinion basically.

Steenburg: That's handled at the building permit point. As long as it meets our codes and requirements it can be done. We have a moratorium right now on manufactured homes, there is some distinction between modular and manufactured homes. A home that meets IRC codes we've adopted are perfectly legal. Some you don't even know they are not site built.

Manzanares: A manufactured home still has a tag on it for highway and a modular does not?

Reynolds: A manufactured home is built under HUD code requirements and is built on a permanent chassis not brought in on a trailer and will continue to remain on it.

Adcock: If you put in turning lanes does that eliminate 138 & 137?

McGranahan: To me, it depends on how wide our right of way is, our traffic report suggests while we don't recommend turn lanes at this point, we should have room in the future. We wouldn't want to plat homes and not have room for a turn lane.

Steenburg: It is 80 ft. What our code requires is a level of service A (LOS), so they meet the requirements. They meet the requirements for the lot size, the traffic flow LOS. Everything meets the requirements of our current code. Right now, this application meets the requirements.

Manzanares: And what we base our recommendation on it what we have here presented to us.

Steenburg: In light of our existing code not what we think it should be.

McGranahan: Our study lays out kind of a baseline of what those triggers might be. We can check any of the new projects against that threshold.

Adcock: I think what bothers me is the fact you did put in the report if they add any more homes they need to put in turn lanes.

McGranahan: We would need to check that; if it was eight homes, probably not. If it was 150 homes maybe so. It depends on how many and where.

Clark: How much more could they add?

Steenburg: It depends on their connectivity; there is a lot of property that could be developed.

McGranahan: It would be something a similar study could figure out pretty quickly, depending on development in the future. It depends on how many homes. We are nowhere near the threshold.

Manzanares: I think to maintain consistency. Thank you. A motion?

Martinez: I don't think he's considered how many vehicles can be parked there, each family will have two cars minimum. There isn't even enough parking. You have to look in the future, if this is all the growth I guess it's all right I think we need to look into the future. They wrote them up so you can change regulations.

Manzanares: Thank you.

Adcock: I live in that area and I know how busy Craft Dr. can be.

Manzanares: I know growth is happening and in the northwest side also. I my area that I represent we have concerns with traffic near the high school, just as this area with the elementary school. At what point are signals, lights considered?

Steenburg: The needs for signal are controlled by warrants that are clearing defined in the uniform traffic code. This area here isn't even close.

Clark: Even if I don't agree with the amount of lots, it is in with what is allowed.

M/S/C.Travis, Cooper. Motion made to recommend approval of Community Resources and Housing Development Corporation final plat. The property affected is Montana Azul Estates, Filing No.6, located in a fraction of the NE ¼ of Section 8, Township 37 North, Range 10 East, New Mexico Principal Meridian, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, situated west of Craft Drive and south of Tremont Street. (four yes's -Travis, Cooper, Manzanares, Clark, two nays -Adcock, Bervig)

The recommendation will go to City Council for consideration on July 19, 2017 at the regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. or shortly thereafter.

Next item:

The request of Christine Caton for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a single family dwelling (Use Group R-1) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is Alamosa Addition #1, Block 19, Fractions of Lots 6-8, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 431 3rd St.

The public hearing opened at 6:43 p.m.

Manzanares: Is there someone here to speak for this?

Lancaster: Mary Lancaster, 431 3rd St. Alamosa, CO 81101. I am here representing Chris. I'm going to be one of the people in the building in the apartments and in the middle part I'm hoping to have a B & B

Ms. Lancaster presented a power of attorney from Ms. Caton.

Manzanares: Is there anyone else that would like to speak for this? Against? We will close the public hearing.

The public hearing was closed at 6:45p.m.

The B & B aspect has some issues that are a bit different from what was stated on the application (apartments)

Ms. Lancaster had not seen the drawing that Ms. Caton had submitted when applying for an apartment use and could not answer questions regarding kitchen, bathroom access.

After further discussion is was determined the application would be tabled until further information regarding the change of use as stated on the application (apartments) from what was requested at the hearing (bed & breakfast) could be researched as to zoning requirements.

M/S/C. Adcock, Bervig. Motion made to table the request of Christine Caton for a Permitted Use by Special Review to allow a single family dwelling (Use Group R-1) in a Commercial Business zone. The property affected is Alamosa Addition #1, Block 19, Fractions of Lots 6-8, City of Alamosa, Alamosa County, also known as 431 3rd St. (Unanimous)

It was recommended Ms. Lancaster make an appointment with the building official prior to the next meeting and discuss code requirements regarding a B & B.

The applicant was informed it would be heard at the next regular hearing on July 26th

Other business:

It was brought up if there was any code addressing tires on roofs of residences. Staff is not aware of any ordinances specific to this issue.

Other issues brought up were blight in the alley off Victoria and First St. near the bowling alley and the zoning issue on the sober living house on Main St.

After no further business the meeting was adjourned at 6:55 p.m.

WHEREAS, all necessary infrastructure and utilities are available to the property; and


WHEREAS, the Planning Commission of the City of Alamosa has recommended that this subdivision be approved;

Subject/Title:

First Reading, Ordinance No. 20-2017, an Ordinance Approving An Intergovernmental Agreement with the Alamosa School District to Provide a School Resource Officer from the Alamosa Police Department to the Alamosa School District

Recommended Action:

Approve the Ordinance on first reading and set it for a public hearing on August 2, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or soon thereafter entering into the intergovernmental agreement with the Alamosa School District to provide a school resource officer from the Alamosa Police Department in the Alamosa schools.

Background:

For the last several years the Alamosa Police Department has been working with the Alamosa School District to provide a School Resource Officer in the Alamosa Schools, primarily Alamosa High School, but also Ortega Middle School and occasionally Alamosa Elementary School. The position was initially established with grant money, but that grant has expired. The School Resource Officer's salary is split between the City and the School District, but the officer remains a full-time employee of the Alamosa Police Department.

The officer provides a program of law and education-related issues to the school community, including parents, on such topics as: tobacco, alcohol, and other drug issues, and in addressing violent situations, violence prevention, and other safety issues in the school community, and can gather information regarding potential problems such as criminal activity, gang activity and student unrest, and attempt to identify particular individuals who may be a disruptive influence to the school and/or students. The Police Department feels it is a very good use of officer time and fosters the Department's commitment to community policing.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to enter into this intergovernmental agreement for a school resource officer with the Alamosa School District?

Alternatives:

- (1) Approve the ordinance on first reading and set it for public hearing on August 2nd.
- (2) Decline to approve the ordinance on first reading, and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

The cost of the City's portion of the officer's salary is less than \$25,000. The officer is available in emergencies for other duties, but otherwise is dedicated to the school resource position.

Legal Opinion:

City Attorney will be available to discuss any legal issues pertaining to the Agreement.

Conclusion:

This agreement ensures the continued provision of a school resource officer in the Alamosa schools, which has proven a beneficial aspect of community policing.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER AGREEMENT

City of Alamosa Police Department
Alamosa Public School District

This Agreement is entered into this 14th day of August, 2017, by and between the City of Alamosa Police Department, hereinafter referred to as "City" and, the Alamosa Public School District, hereinafter referred to as "District."

Both entities are political subdivisions of the State of Colorado. Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado Constitution and C.R.S. Section 29-1-201, *et seq.*, encourages, permits and authorizes intergovernmental agreements to accomplish mutually beneficial objectives such as shared public safety responsibility. The City and the District have determined that public safety is enhanced by the cooperation between their entities set forth in this Agreement.

THEREFORE

For and in consideration of the mutual promises, terms, covenants, and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. Purpose of Agreement:

The purpose of this Agreement is for the City to assign a police officer to provide law enforcement services as specified herein; full-time to the District at the Alamosa High School, with the option to work in the same capacity at Ortega Middle School and the elementary school.

The police officer will work with school personnel in providing alcohol and other drug education, maintaining a safe campus environment, serving as law enforcement problem-solving resource persons, and providing the appropriate response regarding on-campus or school related criminal activity.

2. Term:

The term of this Agreement shall be from August 2017 until the end of the 2017-2018 school year, May 2018, provided the term may be mutually extended by the parties as they deem necessary to satisfy attendance requirements that may have been affected by weather or other factors. During days that schools are not in session, the officers shall perform regular police duties at a duty station as determined by the Chief of Police.

3. Termination:

This Agreement may be terminated without cause by either party upon 30 days prior written notice.

4. Relationship of Parties:

The City and assigned police officer shall have the status of an independent contractor for purposes of this Agreement. The police officer assigned to the District shall be considered to be an employee of the City and shall be subject to its formal control and supervision. The assigned officer will be subject to current procedures in effect for other Alamosa police officers, including attendance at all mandated training and testing to maintain state law enforcement officer certification. This Agreement is not intended to and will not constitute, create, give rise to, or otherwise recognize a joint venture, partnership, or formal business association or organization of any kind between the parties, and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be only those expressly set forth in this Agreement. The parties agree that no person supplied by the District to accomplish the goals of this Agreement is a City employee and that no rights under City civil service, retirement, or personnel rules accrue to such person.

5. Consideration:

In consideration of the assignment of police officer to work with the District as provided herein, the District agrees to pay the City 50% of the officer's salary and benefits. This amount will not exceed \$25,000 per school year. The amount will be billed by the City to the District for each paycheck issued to the officer. The District will not be responsible for payment of overtime, unless it is requested by the District. The officer's weekly District schedule will be mutually agreed upon in consultation with the principal of the school the officer is assigned to. The officer may be asked to attend afternoon or evening events in lieu of regular day duty. The City will maintain a budget for expenditures under this Agreement. Payment from District to City is due upon District's receipt of an itemized statement of cost from the City.

6. Officer Responsibilities:

The Officer assigned to the District shall:

- 6.1. Provide a program of law and education-related issues to the school community, including parents, on such topics as: tobacco, alcohol, and other drug issues, bullying, use and abuse of social media and related criminal offenses and in addressing violent situations, violence prevention, and other safety issues in the school community.
- 6.2 Act as a communication liaison with law enforcement agencies; providing basic information concerning students on campuses served by the officer.

- 6.3 Provide informational services and be a general resource for the school staff on issues related to alcohol, and other drugs, violence prevention, gangs, safety and security.
- The officer will gather information regarding potential problems such as criminal activity, gang activity and student unrest, and attempt to identify particular individuals who may be a disruptive influence to the school and/or students.
- 6.5 When a crime occurs, the officer will take the appropriate steps consistent with a Colorado law enforcement officer's duties. These will specifically include, but are not limited to, compliance with C.R.S. § 22-32-146.
- 6.6 The officer will present educational programs to students and school staff on topics agreed upon by both parties.
- 6.7 The officer will refer students and/or their families to the appropriate agencies for assistance when a need is determined.
- 6.8 The officer will attempt to advise the school principal prior to taking any legal action, subject to the officer's duties under the law, in an attempt to foster a cooperative decision making process good for all involved.
- The SRO shall not act as a school disciplinarian, nor make recommendations regarding school discipline. The School Resource Officer is not to be used for regularly assigned lunchroom duties, as regular hall monitors, bus duties or other monitoring duties. If there is an unusual/temporary problem in one of these areas, the SRO may assist District employees until the problem is solved. Provided further that nothing required herein is intended to nor will it constitute a relationship or duty for the assigned police officer or the City beyond the general duties that exist for law enforcement officers within the state.

7. Time and Place of Performance:

The City will endeavor to have the police officer available for duty each day that school is in session during the regular school year. The City is not required to furnish a substitute officer on days when regular the School Resource Officer is absent due to illness or police department requirements. The officer's SRO activities will be restricted to the assigned school grounds except for:

- 7.1 Follow up home visits when needed as a result of school related student problems.
- 7.2 School related off-campus activities when officer participation is requested by the principal and approved by the City.
- 7.3 In response to off-campus, but school related, criminal activity.
- 7.4 In response to emergency police activities.

8. District Responsibilities:

District will provide the police officer an office and such equipment as is necessary at his/her assigned schools. This equipment shall include a telephone and filing space capable of being secured and access to a computer. The City will provide personal equipment to include all uniforms and a fully equipped police patrol vehicle that will be parked on campus when the officer is working

AN ORDINANCE APPROVING AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH THE ALAMOSA SCHOOL DISTRICT TO PROVIDE A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER FROM THE ALAMOSA POLICE DEPARTMENT TO THE ALAMOSA SCHOOL DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the City of Alamosa Police Department and the Alamosa School District currently cooperate through an intergovernmental agreement to provide for an officer from the Alamosa Police Department to be stationed at one or more of the schools within the Alamosa School District as a school resource officer; and

WHEREAS: public safety and crime prevention is enhanced by the presence of a school resource officer in the schools, where the officer can provide a program of law and education-related issues to the school community, including parents, on such topics as: tobacco, alcohol, and other drug issues, and in addressing violent situations, violence prevention, and other safety issues in the school community, and can gather information regarding potential problems such as criminal activity, gang activity and student unrest, and attempt to identify particular individuals who may be a disruptive influence to the school and/or students; and

WHEREAS: C.R.S. § 22-32-146 specifically envisions an on-campus role for school resource officers; and

WHEREAS: Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado Constitution and C.R.S. Section 29-1-201, et seq., encourages, permits and authorizes intergovernmental agreements to accomplish mutually beneficial objectives such as shared public safety dispatch services; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of Alamosa as follows:

- Section 1. <u>Approval of Intergovernmental Agreement</u>. The Intergovernmental Agreement between the Colorado Alamosa School District and the City of Alamosa Police Department attached to this Ordinance is hereby adopted and approved, and the Police Chief is directed to execute Agreement on behalf of the City of Alamosa;
- Section 2. <u>General Repealer</u>. All other acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with the sections adopted in this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.
- Section 3. <u>Recording and Authentication</u>. This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.
- Section 4. <u>Publication and Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage

shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.

Section 5. <u>Declaration of Public Interest</u>. This ordinance is necessary to preserve the peace, health, safety, welfare, and to serve the best interest of the citizens of the City of Alamosa, Colorado.

Subject/Title:

Motion to Approve the Proposed Eagle Scout Project Installing an Archery Range at the Oxbow Recreation Area

Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council approve the Proposed Eagle Scout Project to install an Archery Range at the Oxbow Recreation Area.

Background:

Joshua Kelly (Boy Scout Troop 309) presented the Recreation Advisory Board with a proposed Eagle Scout Project to install an archery range at the Oxbow Recreation Area (two maps attached) at their February 21, 2017 meeting.

He presented a diagram (Range Lane Layouts attached) of what the range would look like with walking paths made from concrete or gravel and several targets at different lengths for people to use. Lanes of 20, 40, and 60 yards are fixed, but the lanes that are 100 yards are adjustable. He suggested using hay bales or wooden boxes as targets that are both cheap and easily replaceable. Although the diagram indicates two 100-yard shooting lanes, it is possible that they would not be implemented at this time depending on resources available for the project. Issues discussed:

- Overshot arrows someone really experienced could only shoot ½ a mile (1,320 feet). North River Road is approximately 2,100 feet away. Competitive archery averages 90 yards.
- Arrows missing the target there are at least 2 yards between every firing lane in case an
 arrow deflects. Safety signage to be placed will specifically address when someone is on a
 lane, no one should be shooting.
- Community interest there are a lot local bow hunters and the nearest range is 30 miles away. Joshua pointed out that it would be a safe place to go instead of people using their back yards.
- Different location on City property Joshua thought anything close would work and being on City owned would help tremendously, since they wouldn't have to buy or lease a location. However, this location is ideal because of the parking and accessibility to the public.

The Recreation Advisory Board at their April 11, 2017 meeting further discussed the proposed archery project.

Issues discussed:

- Possibility of hitting the cows on the other side of the fence
 - Cows are not permanently in the grazing unit behind the range, but are rotated out during the year for a limited number of weeks.
 - Ranch Lessee (Alan Simpson) did not have any serious issues with the layout, fencing modifications, or danger to his livestock.
 - Established buffer area behind range should provide an ample safety area between the range and the ranch for most archery activities.
- Increase parking lot size lot could expand both to the north or the southeast when need arises.
- Target material it is up to the Eagle Scout to choose the materials, but they could be modified later by Parks & Rec as they wear out.

Upon discussion conclusion, the Recreation Advisory Board voted unanimously to have staff move forward to propose the archery project to City Council.

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to approve the proposed Eagle Scout Project installing an Archery Range at the Oxbow Recreation Area as presented?

Alternatives:

While Council is free to select or develop any number of alternatives, those listed below are examples.

- 1. Approve the proposed Eagle Scout Project archery range installation as presented.
- 2. Approve the archery range installation with conditions and/or changes.
- 3. Decline to act at this time and give staff further direction.

Fiscal Impact:

Staff expects little or no financial impact with the installation of the lanes as proposed by this Eagle Scout Project. Maintaining the facility, especially target and backstop replacements, should be less than a \$750/year and be funded by the Parks & Rec Department.

Legal Opinion:


City Attorney will be present if there are any legal questions regarding this action.

This agreement formalizes the cooperative relationship between the City and the District with respect to use of apparatus and equipment.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF ALAMOSA

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This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is entered into this _____day of _____, 2017, between the City of Alamosa (City), and the Alamosa County Fire Protection District (District). The constitution and statutes of the State of Colorado, as provided in Article XIV, Section 18 of the Colorado State Constitution and Part 2, Article 1, Title 29 of the Colorado Revised Statutes, authorize political subdivisions to enter into contracts which may be of mutual benefit to such entities.

2. Purpose

The City and the District have entered into this agreement in order to allow for joint operations of the City Fire Department and for Fire Operations for the south half of the Alamosa County Fire Protection District.

3. Statement of Mutual Interest and Benefit

Both the City and the Fire District are responsible for providing fire suppression and rescue services within their jurisdictional boundaries.

This MOU is designed to establish a cooperative relationship between the two agencies. The agreement will allow for joint operations which will provide better service to their respective response areas and allow for reduced costs to both entities.

4. Cooperators Agree:

4.1 Facilities:

a) The joint use of facilities is covered by a separate agreement which covers the use and costs associated with the facilities.

4.2 Personnel:

a) The City and the District in most respects use the same personnel for operations of their respective Fire Departments. The personnel thus are volunteers (or in the case of the Chief, an employee) for the City, pursuant to the volunteer agreements they have with the City, and are volunteers of the District pursuant to the separate agreements

they have with the District. Such fact of the dual relationship held by each firefighter does not create a joint venture between the City and the District, whose operations are entirely separate from one another except in so far as expressed through written cooperative agreements such as this one and the agreement governing joint use of facilities. No such agreement, however, shall create any joint venture between the City and the District.

- b) All personnel are subject to the hiring practices and personnel policies set forth by the City and District with respect to their position with each separate entity.
- c) The City shall be solely responsible for hiring the Fire Chief, who shall serve as Fire Chief for both the City and The District. The City may consult with the District for such hiring, but shall have the final decision with respect to such hiring. The Chief shall hire and coordinate Administrative Staff in each department, such that all administrative staff shall have the same role with each entity.
- d) During emergency calls adequate staffing will be provided to allow for additional call coverage in either the City or the District. The Command Staff will make necessary arrangements to insure coverage is in place. At no time shall either entity be without adequate personnel to respond to calls.
- e) Both entities will cover their own employment costs (salaries, insurance, and benefits), volunteer stipends, and personal equipment for firefighters associated with their individual operations. Each entity shall have its own insurance policies, which will be responsible for the shared employee/volunteer as their interests appear in any given incident.

4.3 Apparatus

- a) Recognizing that the City and The District have both common and unique needs for apparatus, each entity will purchase their own apparatus as needed. When it is feasible and cost effective for a joint purchase a written co-ownership agreement will be executed prior to the time of purchase.
- b) Both parties agree that their apparatus can be used by the other entity when needed. Expenses incurred during the operation of the apparatus, including primarily fuel, and any damages to the apparatus, will be covered by the entity using the apparatus. The parties will not attempt to apportion maintenance and wear and tear of the apparatus based upon usage, but rather each will bear the maintenance and wear and tear costs of their own apparatus.
- c) When the District utilizes the City Fleet Facility for apparatus and equipment maintenance, the District agrees to pay the City for the cost of parts, supplies and labor on a pass-through basis.

4.4 Equipment

a) Recognizing that the City and District have both common and unique needs, each entity will purchase their own equipment. When it is feasible, equipment costs will be coshared on an equal basis at time of purchase. The Departments' Command Staff will be responsible to make sure all purchases are fair and equitable to both entities.

4.5 Dispatching Services

a) Both the City and District are dispatched by The Colorado State Patrol. The City is billed for all dispatching costs associated with the Department. The District agrees to

reimburse the City for its share of the Dispatching costs. The cost share will be determined by the percentage of the total call response the District responds to.

Additionally, it makes most sense to delegate the development and promulgation of Alamosa's standard construction specifications to the Director of the Department of Public Works, without need for action by Council to approve such specifications. This ordinance accomplishes those objectives

Issue Before the Council:

Does Council wish to adopt Ordinance No. 19-2017 on first reading?

Alternatives:

- 1) Adopt Ordinance No. 19-2017 on first reading and set for public hearing on August 2, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard.
- 2) Decline to Adopt Ordinance No. 19-2017 and instruct staff to prepare an ordinance for adoption of the 2012 Standard Construction Specifications.
- 3) Give staff further direction on other approaches to updating the *Code of Ordinances* with respect to the Standard Construction Specifications.

- **NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Council of Alamosa as follows:
- **Section 1.** Repeal and Replacement of Chapter 16, ARTICLE I, Section 16-1. Section 16-1 of The *Code of Ordinances of Alamosa*, *Colorado* is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

Sec. 16-1. - Standard Construction Specifications – authority to adopt.

- (a) The Director of the Department of Public Works is hereby authorized to adopt, and amend as from time to time as the Director deems appropriate, Standard Construction Specifications that shall govern the maintenance and construction of all streets, sidewalks, storm sewers, waterlines and sanitary sewers and other public ways, places and utilities located or to be located in the city. A copy of the most recent Standard Construction Specifications shall be maintained on the city's website and in the Department of Public Works, and shall be made available to members of the public at a charge no greater than necessary to cover costs of copying.
- (b) All construction work by any person in and of any street, sidewalk, storm sewer, waterline, sanitary sewer, or other public way, place, or utility shall be in conformance with the Standard Construction Specifications adopted by the Director of the Department of Public Works. The landowner shall have a duty to remove all nonconforming construction which may have occurred in violation of this chapter within three (3) days after being notified by the City of the nonconformance. If the landowner fails to cause such removal within three (3) days, the city shall remove the same, and the landowner shall be responsible for the actual costs to the city of such removal. Such costs shall be assessed and recovered in the manner provided by sections 14-53 and 14-54.

- (c) Any notice required to be given by this section shall be in writing and shall be mailed to the owner or lessee by ordinary first-class or certified mail at such owner's or lessee's address as shown by the assessor's records, and such notice shall be effective upon mailing.
- **Section 2.** Amendment of Chapter 16, ARTICLE II, Division 2, Section 16-37. Section 16-37 of The *Code of Ordinances of Alamosa*, *Colorado* is hereby amended to delete the phrase "1987, as amended, adopted in section 16-1" from the end of the section such that the section reads, in its entirety:

Sec. 16-37. - Grades, supervision.

All walks, curbs and gutters shall conform to established grade to be furnished by the city manager or the city engineer and shall be constructed under the supervision of such manager or engineer or other inspector appointed by the city council who shall have power to compel a strict compliance with the terms and specifications of the City of Alamosa Standard Construction Specifications.

- **Section 3.** Severability: Should any section, clause, sentence, or part of this Ordinance be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect, impair or invalidate the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.
- **Section 4.** <u>General Repealer</u>. All other acts, orders, ordinances, resolutions, or portions thereof in conflict with the sections adopted in this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.
- **Section 5.** Recording and Authentication. This ordinance, immediately upon its passage, shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and City Clerk, recorded in the City book of Ordinances kept for that purposes, and published according to law.
- **Section 6.** <u>Publication and Effective Date</u>. This ordinance shall take effect ten (10) days after publication following final passage. Publication both before and after final passage shall be by the title of this ordinance, which Council determines constitutes a sufficient summary of the ordinance, together with the statement that the full text of the ordinance is available for public inspection and acquisition on the City's website and in the office of the City Clerk.
- **Section 7.** <u>Declaration of Public Interest</u>. This ordinance is necessary to preserve the peace, health, safety, welfare, and to serve the best interest of the citizens of the City of Alamosa, Colorado.

INTRODUCED, READ AND APPROVED on first reading the 19th day of July, 2017, and ordered published by title and reference as provided by law with notice of a public hearing to be held for consideration of the adoption of said ordinance on the 2nd day of August, 2017, at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter may be heard, or on such subsequent date to which the public hearing or Council consideration may be continued.
